- **Folder 1:** Letter addressed to Captain Penniman from M. Florence detailing the duties and practices of the police force's night patrol. New Orleans, February 11, 1828.
 - Report addressed to "His Honor the Mayor", signed Atherton Penniman, describing the actions of officers responding to a riot at the St. Philip Street Ball rooms. New Orleans, February 16, 1828.
 - Document titled "The State of Louisiana v. Sylvain Eteinne & alii . . . Attack & Battery on White Person" listing "coloured persons" who were transferred from Captain Penniman's guard to Captain Dutilles, having been brought before the mayor. February 16, 1828.
 - Document describing the riot at the St. Philip ball room leading to the arrests of Sylvain Eteinne and others. No date, ca. February 1828
 - Document (deposition?) titled "1064 Criminal Court, The State vs. Eteinne Sylvan and Others Unlawful Assembly and Riot". Describing the accusations against Eteinne and the others arrested at the public ball for unlawful meeting without written permission of the mayor. Note on verso that the verdict of Not Guilty was delivered March 6, 1828. No date. Circa February/March 1828.
