Scope and Content Note

This collection of editorial cartoons is a rich documentation of late twentieth century New Orleans/Louisiana politics and politicians (primarily Buddy Roemer, David Duke, and Sidney Barthelemy), crime, racial tension, economy, sports, Mardi Gras, the defunct New Orleans symphony, the 1988 Republican Convention, the Aquarium, the closure of D.H. Holmes, the New Orleans Saints football team, and gambling casinos.

The artist, born In New Orleans on March 10, 1957, is an African American editorial cartoonist whose cartoons have been included in two volumes of *The Best Editorial Cartoons of the Year*. His work first appeared in the now-defunct weekly New Orleans newspaper *The Spectator News Journal*, published between 1982-1986, and this collection houses some examples of Slade's work as published in the *Spectator*. He served on the paper's staff first as a media relations person then managing editor/layout designer.

From February, 1987, to February, 1994, Slade's cartoons appeared in the *Louisiana Weekly*, a black-owned daily newspaper. This collection houses some examples of cartoons published in the monthly publication *The New Orleans Tribune* as well a piece submitted (but not used) for use in literature distributed during the annual convention of Association of American Editorial Cartoonists, held in New Orleans in 1994. One piece concerning the 1992 Presidential race which included David Duke, was reproduced in *USA Today*; another was used in the 1989 Grid Iron brochure when the New Orleans Press Club lampooned David Duke. Included in the collection is a publication proof of Slade's published work, *But I Am Too a Black Cartoonist...Really!*
