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Waking up to Death

The Vitality of Death is the first book written by my teacher, philosopher Peter Koestenbaum. The paradox of this title may challenge our minds to deeply consider the meaning of our funerals and memorial services. Our usual thoughts of death, funerals, and memorial services can evoke negative feelings and anxiety. This natural re-

sponse may be exaggerated in our modern idealized world. The productive, consuming American culture of the latter part of the 20th century has created an attitude of abundance and entitlement.

The dawn of the 21st century is revealing the inability of the earth to sustain this level of human consumption. Death may also represent an end to this paradise. The 2nd Noble Truth of the desires of the ego is abundantly clear. In our attempt to deflect the pain of this truth, we try to minimize our exposure to this discomfort. We simplify the funeral/burial process and even eliminate some of these memorial services. Psychologists inform us that by minimizing the traditional process of grieving, we may hinder our healing process that is necessary after a loss.

Our traditional funeral and memorial services were developed about 500 years ago. The obvious changes of time, culture, and life patterns have necessitated changes in the format. However, we should maintain some important aspects that support the healing process of the family. Many traditional cultures have emphasized a familiarity with death and the loss of a loved one. The commonality of death should encourage all of us to become familiar with the purpose and meaning these services.

Much of our lives have been sanitized by modern efficiency. Our relationship with death has also been altered. There is a tendency to minimize our contact with our loved one after death. We may think that the less contact we have with death may help us retain our memories of the person's life. However, this path robs us of the emotional impact of death, as we try to minimize the pain of loss.

Although death may be a constant part of the news or TV, it is distant and impersonal. When a loved one or close personal friend dies, we feel the loss deeply and our present mindset is challenged. It can offer an invitation to wake up to the rare, precious nature of life. The loss of a loved one fully engages us in the reality of life and death. Our hearts are truly open to hear the wisdom of the Buddha's Teachings. In this time of loss, Shin Buddhist funerals and memorial services offer a means of assessing the meaning of our lives. Over many centuries, the format of these services has provided a process of grieving.

Our contemporary life style has led to an expectation of personal convenience, instant gratification, and avoidance of negative experiences. These expectations differ from the Buddha's Teachings of the Three Marks of Existence: "Impermanence," "Interdependence," and "attachment to ego." The opportunity to awakening to these truths of the Buddha may occur as we experience the loss of a loved one. The mature mind realizes that life does not occur as we would like it to be. The impermanence of individual lives is shockingly vivid with the death of a loved one. However, the lessons of interdependence and compassion can support us in our loss. Our attachment to the physical form of that person can be healed by realizing the ongoing connection of a spiritual connection of memories.

The various memorial services provide the opportunity to hear these healing words of the Buddha. These truths do not turn our attention away from the unavoidable, but instead provide us with a compassionate reality. We are all connected with the compassion love of interdependence. But our limited minds cling to the physical forms of separateness. The Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu, reminds us of the Wisdom and Compassion that continues to support us. The memorial services provide many opportunities for the family and friends to gather to honor the deceased by their continued memories. We are not forgotten simply because we are physically absent.

BTSd has just created and will distribute a booklet on The Death of a Loved One. Shin Buddhism has recognized the overwhelming sense of loss that occurs. Ceremonies have been developed to help family and friends through the grief of this difficult transition. These services reflect the wisdom of the Buddha, to honor the deceased by a proper grieving process over time. This little booklet is intended to help family and friends understand the meaning, significance, and process of Shin Buddhist services and other activities following the death of a loved one. The experience of their death may be their final message for us to wake up to the beauty of Light and Life.

Key highlights from the Board of Directors Meeting held on Thursday, June 14:

1. Beginning next year, the order of Memorial Day services will change. The Cypress View service will be scheduled for 11:00 a.m. following the Mt. Hope service that takes place at 9:30 a.m.
2. Yukari Williams will be assisting Rev. Akahoshi with preparing the the onaijin for services.
3. Re-roofing work on the south side of the annex was completed. The PV solar installation should be completed in early July.
4. The quiet exhaust fan installation is scheduled to be completed before the start of Obon dance practices. The fans are meant to remove some of the heat from the annex hall.
5. Approved the cost of installing a storage container. The container will give us more flexibility with our facility space needs.
6. Approved installation of a Fire Alarm system for the main building. The system is voluntary but will be life-safety code compliant. Partial funding comes from 90th Anniversary donations.
7. Funds were approved for carpet replacement in the Hondo-level elevator lobby and pre-function area.
8. The temple will be represented at the 2018 Japanese Friendship Garden Gala, June 21.
9. Approved the participation fees for the Pride Parade, July 14.
10. Assistant Ministers Noriko Kawai and Laverne Imori will attend the July MAP Session at the JSC.
11. Congratulations to Roy Muraoka who will be recognized at the 2018 Nisei Week Pioneer Luncheon, August 15.
12. The Board thanked Roy Okuhara for his 25 years of service in teaching Dharma School.

On Being Humble and Authentic

In his book, *Dharma Breeze: Essays on Shin Buddhism*, Dr. Nobuo Haneda writes that the “ultimate goal in Buddhism...according to Shinran...is to become humble.... We must know our ignorance, the limitations of our intellects.”

Dr. Haneda goes on to say that “we are moved by a person who is humbly and dynamically seeking – a person who is permeated by the truth of impermanence.... When we meet such a person, we cannot help being shaken by him [or her] [Such a person] speaks to us in a silent and quiet, yet powerful way.”

While these statements seem simple, they have tremendous depth in their underlying foundation. A person, who engages in deep self-reflection and acknowledges his or her own greed, anger and ignorance, leads a life of little or no pretense. Removing one's masks and becoming more authentic with everyone requires a confidence that comes from entrusting in Amida Buddha's infinite wisdom and compassion. With the realization that he/she is embraced unconditionally despite shortcomings, that person is transformed and acts with gratitude and humility.

Such a person does not necessarily speak from a pulpit, nor publishes books, nor wears priest's robes, but quietly supports the Dharma, his or her teachers, and the Sangha.

I am grateful to have encountered such a person. His name was T. Jack Matsui, a humble and devout Shin Buddhist, who died on May 12, 2018, at the age of 95. His connection with the Buddhist Temple of San Diego was through his sister and brother, Fusako Matsui and Taro Matsui, both active members and devout Shin Buddhists themselves. Uncle Jack made sure they, and their mother, were always remembered at our monthly Shotsuki services.

As I listened to the eulogies and remembrances at his funeral, I was reminded of Dr. Haneda's words. There was a common thread as each person spoke of the man they knew.

His friend, Diana Johns wrote: “Dear Jack, thank you for modeling how to be the best kind of human being. Kind, funny, generous of time and spirit, and compassionate. It was always a happy slice of time when we had a chance to shoot the breeze. Your spark is already missed.”

This was the Uncle Jack that I, and so many others, knew. He was, indeed, as Diana described him – “the best kind of human being.” He loved a good laugh, to tease and to be teased in return. Uncle Jack was gracious, hard-working, dedicated and humble. He was also sincerely concerned about the future of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism in America. He was fierce about staying true to Shinran's teachings, but open to how those teachings might be presented to today's Sangha.

When Seattle first introduced a morning meditation session several years ago, he asked me, “what are you meditating for?” When I answered that we weren't meditating to achieve enlightenment, but merely sitting in gratitude and preparing ourselves to hear the Dharma, he didn't lecture me to say, “We're Shin Buddhists and we don't meditate. His response was simply, “Oh, okay.”

To this day, I'm not certain whether he approved of our meditation sessions or not. If not, he certainly didn't share that opinion with me. On the contrary, he always encouraged me to continue my studies of Shin Buddhism and to help share the gift of Shinran's teachings.

In life we encounter many dynamic and memorable people. Uncle Jack was that person who shook my life, who opened my mind and heart by speaking to me in a quiet, yet powerful way. He was humble and authentic. That's why the stories shared at his funeral, the memories of this man, were so similar and familiar. He wore no mask. The man that Diana knew was the man we all knew – a humble man who lived his life guided by the Dharma.

As we enter the season of O-Bon, I look forward to celebrating *Kangji-E*, this gathering of joy with you. Let us celebrate the memories of those who – like Jack – quietly, but with tremendous force and foresight, impacted our precious lives. Namo Amida Butsu
May there be peace in the world and may the Buddhist teachings spread.

BTSD O BON FESTIVAL “GATHERING OF JOY” ACTIVITIES
