Mod Rails

Top finishes at 63" x 84"

To make the quilt pictured:



You need:

- 3 5/8 yards of navy
- 2 ¾ yards of various solid colorful pieces the minimum you need for one block is 3 2"x11" strips of fabric
- $\frac{1}{2}-\frac{5}{8}$ yard of fabric for the binding. I used colorful scraps from the fabrics I used in the quilt.

<u>Cut:</u>

From navy:

240 – 2"x11" strips

From various colored solid fabrics:

- From each color, cut 3 2"x11" strips
 - Use a variety of colorful strips. Cut enough for 48 blocks. Since I was using all upcycled fabrics, I started with what I had plenty of—reds...then I looked around for fabrics that would provide contrast to the red while showing contrast with the navy as well.

Construct blocks:

This quilt is made up of 1 block. It is a classic rail fence block made up of 7 rails. It looks like this: Each block uses 4 navy 2"x11" strips and 3 colorful 2"x11" strips.



To make block:

Sew one navy strip to a colorful strip. Then sew another navy, then another colorful, on to that group until your block looks like the one pictured above. Press seams to one side. Use $\frac{1}{2}$ seam allowances. Before sewing into quilt, the block should measure $11^{"}x11^{"}$.

Make 48. Use a variety of colorful solids if you want yours to look like mine.

How to make this quilt:

- 1. Construct your blocks.
- 2. Place blocks as in this diagram by putting every other block at a 90 degree angle to the one beside it. Put colors in a pleasing arrangement to you.



- 3. Sew the blocks together as per the layout. First sew together in rows, and then sew the rows together, nesting seams as needed.
- 4. Press well.
- 5. Sandwich, using whatever type of batting and backing you prefer
- 6. **Quilt** as desired. (I used a walking foot and quilted in circles to help reinforce the modern look. The rail fence quilt pattern is a very old, OLD pattern, so I was trying everything I could to help it look more modern.)



7. Bind, using whatever method you wish.

It's that easy!!!!

Your quilt is finished!

Enjoy!

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Note: I used all upcycled fabrics. The navy fabric (a really nice sheet from Ikea) limited how big this quilt ended up being. When I ran out of navy, I stopped making blocks.
