CGC testing, Tricks testing, ACT testing

Canine Good Citizen (CGC) testing will be offered on Saturday, January 6, 2024. Start time is 10 am and end time is 12 pm. We will be testing up to 15 dogs for CGC and 15 dogs for CGCA at the WKC Training Center. The cost is \$10.00 for both tests.

Trick Dog testing will be on Saturday, February 3rd, between 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. The cost for Novice and Intermediate is \$10.00 per dog and the cost for Advanced is \$20.00 per dog. Both tests will be at the Training Center.

Please contact Shanna Davies if you need more information about the upcoming CGC and Tricks testing. The sign-up sheet (and payment options) for CGC and Trick Dog can be found on the Registration page of the WKC web site.

WKC instructor Jan Flatten (and helpers) will be offering Agility Course Tests (ACT1 and ACT2) on December 30^{th} . ACT offers a chance to test you and your dog's agility skills in a trial-like setting, with courses that are a little shorter (and in a smaller ring) than regular trials. Maggy Susman and Kolfyre MALEFICENT of Blewett RN, BCAT, RATN, ACT 1, ACT2J, CGC:

Magic completed her Barnhunt Open title, RATO, at the French Creek trial December 8-10. She also passed her first senior run earning a 2nd place. Her next pass in senior she earned 1st place!

Magic and I also attended the Monroe show November 17, 18, 19. This was Magic's first obedience and rally show. Magic earned a perfect score of 100 each day in Rally Novice. She completed her title with a second and a first place ribbon. The day that five dogs earned 100, we did not make the placements! She also earned a 197.5 out of 200 possible points in Beginner Novice on Saturday and Sunday. Friday, Handler error (me pulling the leash) resulted in not qualifying! She's a joy to live with and train!

Jan Flatten: The Flatten girls continue to rock being "oldsters". Ginger (Right, 14yo) earned her Rally Master title in Monroe this past month after earning 3 straight Qs at the WKC Rally Trial in October. No title ribbons were given so you'll just have a picture of how cute she is. She also earned some more Qs in NADAC and hit her 1,000 lifetime points award. She's loved coming back to agility



league this fall after a several year hiatus. Brandi (Left also 14yo) took 3rd place for her division in the spring/summer agility league and really puts her heart into it. Although final results aren't in yet, she probably took 2nd in her division fall agility league. She also earned several Qs in NADAC, but she has definitely slowed down in agility this year. Aspen (Center) finally got her actual title ribbon for the Scent Work Master title she earned this summer (previous pix were with a borrowed title). She's had fun with agility league but her heart really isn't in it so she'll be taking a break. She did earn her Novice Chances title in NADAC and also her Novice Versatility title. I'm so lucky to have these partners!

Becky Smith: Harley Jo & Pete ran Fast Cat at the end of September in Richland and at the Wenatchee Kennel Club Fast Cat in October. They both earned their BCAT titles. In the breed stats at AKC for German Shorthair Pointers, Harley Jo ranks at 35th in the nation and Pete at 89th.

Tami Woolsey: I have forgotten to get in the newsletter that Tolli earned her novice agility preferred title at the October agility trial. We have also had a great time participating in the AKC agility league. Tolli appreciates the people who make that possible!

Tara Barrett: On Nov. 25-26, the dogs and I went to Run Wild (aka Argus) for a Barn Hunt trial. Miss Iskie Biscuit earned her Open title, and, more importantly, behaved like a little angel in the blind and was very good about ignoring the judge and wranglers in the ring. And 12 year old Otter?

On Otter's morning run on Sunday, I looked at the course map pinned to the blind perimeter and my heart sank. The entrance required an immediate left followed by three right turns. It was going to be dark in there, with no light visible past the 2^{nd} turn. We were the last dog in the blind, so there was plenty of time to worry about that tunnel as we waited our turn.

Otter has tunnel issues. We've done remedial training 3 times this year, driving all the way to Monroe to practice. The training sessions, thanks to the wonderful Barb Krause, work very well, involving a light shown down the tunnel and lots and lots of Otter's favorite treats. Each time it leaves her happily doing multiple tunnel runs, with no prompting by me.

The previous day at Argus, Otter had done the tunnel 6 times in a row, leaving the judge and spectators laughing at my enthusiastic goof of a dog. But today was going to be different. She found all the rats, then spontaneously tried the tunnel. I held my breath, waiting, hoping to see her head pop out of the exit. There was a long, long wait, much longer than it should have taken, and then she came back out of the entrance instead, looking about as embarrassed as a Lab can look. One more attempt at the tunnel from the other side, and she turned around immediately and poked her nose out of the tunnel, watching me. I can guess what she was thinking: "Please don't ask me to do this again. It's dark in there. What if I get stuck? What if I get lost, and can't find my way out? And there aren't even any Treats here!"

In fairness to Otter, a hesitation in crawling into small dark confined tunnels was probably a reasonable survival strategy for her ancestors. We ask a lot of our dogs. Sometimes pushing them a little past their comfort zone can help them learn a new thing. And sometimes you just have to recognize that you are asking too much, and scale it back for them. We NQ'd the run, and when the afternoon run had the same tunnel set-up, I decided to scratch her run rather than stress her out.

Otter is fearless about so many things. She can walk calmly past a pack of huge dogs barking threats at her. She loves going out to watch fireworks with me on the 4th of July. She adores new experiences and getting to meet new people. So her Barn Hunt tunnel issue is an uncharacteristic oddity in an otherwise enthusiastic approach to life. We may set a new record in the Barn Hunt world by just how long it is taking us in our search of the elusive RATCH. I think we have reached about 40 Master-level NQs over the last 5 years! But despite the tunnel aversion, Otter still loves running around the ring and climbing over the hay bales. If all the various dog sports offered a "Dog that Had the Most Fun" ribbon at trials, Otter's lifetime collection would be staggering. So as long as she's having a good time, we'll keep trying. And now, writing this, I find I'm already looking forward to next spring!
