JACKSON/SCHNYDER NATURE PRESERVE THE SECOND OLC PROPERTY

The Ouabache Land Conservancy (OLC), through Sycamore Trails RC&D Council, has closed on its second property, the Jackson/Schnyder Nature Preserve! This beautiful property was donated to the Conservancy by Marion T. Jackson. It is a short distance west of St. Mary-of- the-Woods College and consists of 20 acres, mostly mature woods. During the 1930's, Mr. Julius Schnyder, who had immigrated from Switzerland as a small boy prior to World War I, purchased the tract, which is along Little Sugar Creek in Vigo County. As an adult, Mr. Schnyder worked much of the year in the coal mine owned by St. Mary-ofthe-Woods. During summers, Mr. Schnyder worked the four-acre field near the east edge of the property with a large draft horse and horse-drawn tools. They raised various berries, garden vegetables, and other truck crops, and sold their surplus to the college and area residents.

In 1969, the Schnyders sold the property to Marion Jackson, an ecology professor at Indiana State University and, after retirement, at St. Mary-of-the- Woods. He

used the area for research and for teaching field ecology, plant taxonomy, and environmental conservation to numerous students from ISU (36 years) and St. Mary's (4 years).

The forested section is rolling with two deep ravines which harbor intermittent streams. The canopy is about 60 to 90 feet high, and no cut stumps are present, because Marion honored the wishes of the Schnyders that he cut no trees. About 25 species of trees are present, with hickory, oak, ash, and tulip being the most common. Also included is the uncommon Kentucky coffee tree. Spring wildflowers are especially showy, including celandine poppy, nodding trillium, and larkspur.

The primary purpose of the site is for research and teaching at any and all levels, and for field trips for organizations and individuals. Since this is a protected area, timber harvest and hunting are excluded. The former cultivated area will be planted to warm season grasses to provide habitat diversity within the tract.

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OTHER OUABACHE LAND CONSERVANCY PROPERTIES

OLC currently has nine prospective properties that may be protected in the coming months or years. We are interested in reviewing additional prospects at any time. Once we receive our 501(c)(3) tax exempt status from the IRS, we will accept our first protected property as a legacy from Sycamore Trails RC&D. It is a conservation easement on the beautiful, 250-acre farm of James O. McDonald, located near New Goshen in Vigo County. This farm contains outstanding woods, fields and wetlands and is home to a vast array of wildlife. Several board members participated in the annual monitoring of its conservation easement on April 13, 2008.

MOSSY POINT MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

OLC will be negotiating another legacy from Sycamore Trails RC&D. This is a management agreement on Mossy Point Nature Preserve, a 191-acre property on Sugar Creek in Parke County that is owned by the Indianapolisbased Central Indiana Land Trust, Inc. Mossy Point is a high-quality, ridge and ravine forest,

containing hemlocks, oaks and hickories. It is part of the Sugar Creek habitat that provides homes to wood thrushes and several species of warblers. STRC&D was a partner with CILTI during Mossy Point's acquisition.
