Newfoundland and Labrador	 30 minutes of playing, air exchanges, masks on instruments & people Distancing must occur UPDATE Jan. 2021: Singing - some singing, as long as 6', singing forward, no masks required, but with 30 min limits and 2 rotations of air Instrumental - the same as singing but with bell covers Masks required in common areas for Gr. 7-12 ONLY. New Brunswick	 Music K-8 within cohorts with social distancing Wind instruments are permitted if all health and safety protections measures are observed Number of students participating in bands and choirs should be limited 	
Nova Scotia	 Rehearsals of up to 50 permitted following physical distancing UPDATE Jan 2021: singing in class is now allowed (social distanced, grades 4-12, masked), recorders are now allowed and bell covers are suggested, rather than required 	Nova Scotia Band Association recommends: - Wear a mask when playing, use a bell cover and don't share materials UPDATE Jan 2021: (see pdf doc sent by J.
