NeighborUp Park View is an emerging network of Park View neighbors who come together to connect, support one another, and work towards creating an inclusive community where all residents can benefit from the changes occurring in the Park View neighborhood.

As a part of DC's New Communities Initiative, Park Morton will be redeveloped into mixed-income housing in the next several years. Many past attempts to transform public housing into mixed-income housing have failed to promote real resident success. Without a shift from the existing culture of fear and division to one of connection and aspiration, public housing residents remain isolated and unable to access opportunity in their own neighborhoods. We are committed to a new community where 100% of residents thrive in the "newly transformed" neighborhood.

NIGGING DEEPER

The idea of sparking a new, diverse neighborhood network seems relatively simple but there's more to it than meets the eye.





WHAT IS COMMUNITY NETWORK BUILDING?

At its core, community network building is a method of sparking a new, more aspirational and connected way of being in new places where well-intended people feel divided and isolated from one another. Community members who work in a wide range of places and contexts have been trying to understand how to get unstuck and move forward together with actionable community change.

WHY NOW IN PARK VIEW?

Park View, like many DC neighborhoods, is undergoing rapid gentrification. After hundreds of conversations this spring and summer, it is clear that many residents, especially those in Park Morton, increasingly feel uncertain about whether they belong in their own neighborhoods. Even with the promise of newly developed "mixed-income" units two years away, the story about newly mixed-income housing is that residents across different backgrounds do not connect with each other and that those divides continue to detract quality of life.

HOW DOES COMMUNITY NETWORK BUILDING WORK?

There are four key ingredients - when cultivated - that produce the kind of action, innovation, and energy needed to sustain ongoing community change:

- > DIVERSE STEWARDS
- > INTENTIONAL SPACES AND PRACTICES
- > FORM FOLLOWS FUNCTION




EARLY SIGNS OF NEW CONNECTIONS AND SHARED ASPIRATIONS:



> A core group of Park Morton and Park View residents across different races and incomes know each other much better and consistently show up to mixed, intentional spaces.









- > This narrative is moving beyond the simple concept of neighbors speaking and helping out neighbors, to include ideas for systemic reforms around racial equity and shared economic opportunity.
- Most importantly, a growing diverse network of over 60 people has increased capacity to come together differently, over and over again, and bring positive change to their neighborhood. Contrasting heavily from traditional programs that may reinforce divisions that already exist.
