WELCOME CLASS OF 2022!

Asheville City Schools Foundation Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis to Asheville High and SILSA students. Applicants should fit these criteria:

- Enrolled as a senior at Asheville High or SILSA
- Attending an accredited 2 or 4 year college or university
- Demonstrated financial need as indicated by a FAFSA EFC of \$14,000 or less (some exceptions may apply)
- Earned a weighted GPA of 2.75 (some exceptions may apply- several of our multi-year scholarships require a 3.0 or above)
- Supported the community through volunteer service

What does ACSF look for in applicants? Our scholarship committee takes a number of factors into consideration when reviewing applicants, including: academic history, community involvement, extra-curricular involvement, work experience, leadership, communication skills, maturity, self-awareness, financial need and expected family contribution, outside scholarships and grants awarded, type of school/university (public or private), and length of time spent in ACS.

APPLICATION TIMELINE

We have **one online application for all scholarships**. The application process opens **November 1st** and all applications are due **January 31st**. All applicants are **required to have at least two sessions** with the AHS Writing Center for application support. We typically receive 70-80 applications each year.

Our scholarship committee reviews the applications, reads the essays, and interviews the final round of eligible students. **In February**, students are notified by email if they have received an interview to be considered for a scholarship. Interviews are held in **late March**.

In early April, students are notified that they have received a scholarship. Specific scholarship details will be announced in **late May**.

Information and support sessions will be available throughout **October-March**. Please contact **Brandon Whiteside**, Scholarship Coordinator, with questions or concerns at any point throughout this process.

ANNOUNCING NEW SCHOLARSHIPS

The Asheville City Schools Foundation is honored to remember the following vibrant members of our ACS community through the creation of the **Chris Merrill Memorial Scholarship** and the **Patricia Ann Griffin Memorial Scholarship**, established in loving memory by their families and friends in 2021.

CHRIS MERRILL MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Chris Merrill was a beloved son, brother, and friend. Known for his quick wit, entrepreneurial spirit, and deep loyalty and care for his loved ones, he touched the lives of everyone who was fortunate to spend time around him. Chris was driven to be a natural leader and demonstrated an incredible work ethic. He graduated with honors from AHS in 2004. A captain of both the Cougars' soccer and basketball teams his senior year, he was also a tenacious player for his HFC and Storm travel teams. He went on to obtain a business degree from NC State University and then pursued a successful career in online marketing, including the establishment of several companies. Chris loved outdoor activities including camping, snowboarding, water skiing, and tubing on Lake Keowee. He had a passion for NC State sports and supported the Wolfpack teams as a season ticket-holder. He liked little more than rubbing in NC State's annual football victory over Carolina to his family full of Tar Heels.

PATRICIA ANN GRIFFIN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Patricia Ann Griffin grew up in Asheville, the second oldest of five children, and attended Asheville City Schools. Patricia graduated from Stephens-Lee High School in Asheville in 1959. After attending Stillman College for one year, she received a B.A. from Mars Hill College in 1971. She received a M.A. in Education from Western Carolina University in 1985. She retired from the Asheville City Schools in 2003 after working over 30 years as a teacher, assistant principal, principal, and administrator. She cared deeply about her students and dedicated her career to doing what she could to improve the outcomes of traditionally marginalized and overlooked students, especially Black students in the school system.



Throughout her time with Asheville City Schools, she mentored many younger colleagues who strived to excel as educators. Patricia received numerous awards and accolades throughout her long career. She loved to laugh, dance, travel, enjoy life, spend time with her loved ones.

**THE FOLLOWING ARE TYPICAL SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED BY ACSF
-AWARDS MAY VARY BASED UPON DONOR DISCRETION-**

The Asheville Promise Scholarship is a community funded, last dollar scholarship up to \$1,000. Preference is given to In Real Life After-School alumni, IRL after-school mentors, DREAM interns, and/or first generation college attendees.

The Bill Dechant Memorial Scholarship is a one-time award of \$1,000 to a student who exhibits good character and leadership skills, has maintained a good academic average, and has a history of playing Field Hockey.

The Bruce & Jean Larson Community Service Scholarship is a four-year renewable scholarship of \$4,000 to one student payable at \$1,000 each year for 4 years (subject to satisfactory performance and progress). It is awarded to a student who will attend a four-year college or university, has a concern for others as demonstrated by significant community service activities throughout high school, and has an interest in and respect for cultural diversity as demonstrated by relevant school and community activities.

The Charles and Eleanor Wykle Scholarship is a one-time award of \$2,000 to a student with strong academic achievement, a history of participation in school activities, and good character. Preference given to first generation college attendees, and/or students of color.

The Chris Merrill Memorial Scholarship is a one-time award of \$4,000 to a student who will attend a NC publicly funded four-year or community college. The student must have participated in team sports at Asheville High School, and have shown evidence of leadership as well as true caring for the well-being of their teammates.

The City of Asheville Scholarship is a four-year renewable scholarship of \$10,000, payable at \$2,500 per year for 4 years (subject to satisfactory performance and progress), for Black/African-American students who are committed to pursuing a career in education.

The Deutsch Family Scholarship is a one-time award of \$1,500 to a student who has promoted racial, religious, and cultural harmony while in school.

The John B. Lewis Scholarship is a one-time award of \$1,000 to a student who will attend a NC publicly funded four-year or community college. The student must have participated in team sports at Asheville High School, and show evidence of leadership ability, community service and/or employment experience.

The Dr. Keith Black Scholarship is a one-time award of \$500 to a student pursuing a health-related career, has participated in at least one extra-curricular activity, or works after school and has 3.0.

The Lee H. Edwards Class of '48 Scholarship is a one-time award of \$3,000 to a student in the upper 30% of the class who will attend a NC publicly funded four-year or community college.

The Lee H. Edwards Class of '51 Scholarship is a one-time award of \$2,000 to a student with a history of volunteer service. Students planning to attend vocational schools are preferred.

The Mel Hetland Scholarship is a one-time award of between \$1,000-\$2,000 to a student who identifies as belonging to the Global Majority (i.e. BIPOC), will attend an accredited two or four year college or university, and has a history of community service. Preference given to a student who is the first in their family to attend college.

The Mitchell Carlisle Memorial Scholarship is a one-time award of \$1,000 to a student ranked in the top 20% of their class who has been involved in athletics and participates in school activities.

Paddison Family Foundation Scholarship is a four-year renewable scholarship of \$10,000, payable at \$2,500 per year (subject to satisfactory performance and progress), for students that have demonstrated excellent character, show evidence of leadership ability, and have extensive community service and /or employment experience.

The Patricia Ann Griffin Memorial Scholarship is a one-time award of \$3,000 to a student who has demonstrated a deep commitment towards being an advocate in education and supporting their community through volunteer service. Preference is given to students of color intending to pursue a career in education or another helping profession.

The Pepsi Cola Scholarship is a one-time award of \$3,500 to a student who has demonstrated scholastic achievement and will attend Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College.

The Peterson-Stanley Future Educator Scholarship is a one-time award of \$1,000 to a student who intends to pursue a career in education, demonstrates good character, and has had extra-curricular involvement and/or work experience.

The Reed Scholarship for Applied Awesomeness is a four-year renewable scholarship of \$10,000, payable at \$2,500 per year for 4 years (subject to satisfactory performance and progress), for students that have demonstrated excellent character

The Seth David Shillcock Olson Scholarship is a one-time award of \$1,000 to a student who has participated in AHS athletics, is able to document a history of employment experience, volunteer service to the community, and will be attending a publicly funded 4 year university.

William E. Drake Scholarship is a one-time award of \$2,000 to students who plan to attend UNC Chapel Hill, are in the top 20% of their graduating class, and have worked to help support themselves while in high school.

The SECU Foundation Scholarship is a four year renewable scholarship of \$10,000 (payable at \$1,250 for up to eight consecutive semesters) for a student to attend one of the 16 constituent campuses of the University of North Carolina System. The SECU Scholarship is administered by ACSF and uses the following eligibility criteria:

Student is either a SECU member or is eligible for membership through a parent/guardian. Student or their parent/guardian must be a member at the time of application. **Please note-** SECU Foundation does not accept Local Government Federal Credit Union Memberships*

Student is a senior at a North Carolina public high school who has been accepted to one of the 16 constituent campuses of the University of North Carolina System.

Student is a US citizen and a resident of North Carolina under NCGS 116-143.1 and is eligible for in-state tuition.

Student best exemplifies the “People Helping People” philosophy of SECU, and has demonstrated leadership, excellence of character, integrity, and community involvement.

Student demonstrates scholastic achievement with a maintained 2.5 or higher unweighted grade point average on a 4.0 scale and may be deserving of financial aid.

Will use the scholarship to pay for full-time undergraduate student tuition and fees.


Agrees to continue as a full-time student in good standing with the same university for up to 8 consecutive fall/spring semesters payable at \$1,250 per semester. Scholarships are not transferable without prior approval of SECU Foundation.

Is not a director, employee, or family member of a director or employee of SECU or the SECU Foundation, or a family member of a member of the scholarship selection committee.

*** *Why doesn't SECU accept Local Government Federal Credit Union Memberships?***

My banking is physically done at a SECU, so why am I not considered eligible? LGFCU and SECU are considered to be separate credit unions. These two unions partnered so that members of LGFCU could access the services of SECU's branches and their ATM network.

STUDENT SUPPORTS



The Writing Center - In 2019, ACSF funded the creation and operation of the Writing Center at Asheville High. The mission of the Writing Center is to serve students of all writing abilities during the school day.
