IRE ÓG Annacarty-Donohill were crowned county intermediate hurling champions following their victory over Silvermines at the Ragg on October 10, 1994. The newspaper heading in *The Nationalist* the following week said: "Crosse point decisive in top class encounter".

Westside expanded on the vital score: "It was riveting stuff in the end. They'd been locked together at half-time but Éire Óg had slightly the better of matters in the second half and slowly edged one, two, and then three up. But just with the tape in sight an awkward hop goal-wards catches defence and goalie hesitant about whose ball it was and in nips Eoin Ryan of 'The Mines' to flick home the equaliser. In the last minute Anthony Crosse wins a vital

one, ships a tackle from Noel Sheedy and balances for the stroke that scrapes inside the right post. He'll hardly ever again point a more crucial one."

FIRST TITLE

Éire Óg's road to glory started with the first round of the West intermediate championship on August 21. Four teams took part in the championship, the others Golden-Kilfeacle, Lattin-Cullen and Sean Treacys, and the competition was played as a four-team league with the top two qualifying for the final.

Éire Óg's first outing was against Lattin-Cullen at Sean Treacy Park and they came through by 3-12 to 1-13. Their next opponents were Sean Treacys and they defeated them by 2-12 to 0-5 at Cappawhite on September 3. Their final game produced the tightest result

Lattin got off to a flying start and led by 0-5 to nil at the end of the first quarter. John Quinn's penalty restored some parity but Éire Óg still trailed by 0-8 to 1-3 at the interval. The eventual winners made a storming start to the second half scoring 1-3 without replay in the first four minutes to go from 2-down to 4-up. But Lattin weren't finished and with nine minutes to go were level. However, it was Éire Óg, who found the winning scores. Anthony Crosse and John Quinn got the points and Tim Heffernan sealed a very fine win with a last goal for a 3-8 to 0-12 victorious score. Vinny Ryan captained Éire Óg to their fist ever win in this grade.

In the county semi-final Éire Óg played Carrick Davins at Boherlahan on October 16. The West champions dominated the first half and led by 0-10 to 0-2 at the interval. Early in the second half Davins had corner back, Peter Walsh, sent off and about the same time a long range free from Vinny Ryan went all the way to the Carrick net. Éire Óg led by 1-11 to 0-2 at this stage but Davins put in a strong rally that yielded two goals and the lead fell eventually to five points. SENIOR HURLING

Éire Óg also played senior hurling in 1994, in combination with Golden-Kilfeacle. The combo were one of seven teams to play in the knock-out senior hurling championship. The team had a bye in the first round and went straight into a semi-final against Clonoulty-Rossmore. The sides played a draw, 3-14 each at Cappawhite on July 31. The replay was a week later at Sean Treacy Park, again a close encounter that Clonoulty won by the minimum of margins on a scoreline of 1-14 to 2-10.
