embers and friends of NSUC gathered at Mount Seymour United Church on March 25th to mark a milestone in our history. We began with the Installation of the Revs. Emily and Marcus Hartlief at 3pm, then moved on to a potluck feast, and a program celebrating our first 50 years. The Installation service drew twenty ministers and denominational wellwishers, joining scores of current and former congregation members, including a strong contingent of "expats" from Vancouver Island.

During the ceremony, former NSUC ministers Harold Rosen, Rev. Linda Weaver Horton, and Rev. Stephen Atkinson read sacred texts from world religions during the choir anthem of All Lifted Hearts. Rev. Chris Jablonski, a mentor to Emily and Marcus, had everyone in the pews belting animal sounds in an engaging story entitled Snake Alley Band. We watched a slide show of images from our past 50 years, created by Malcolm Mallory. Rev. Jablonski's sermon reminded us all of what truly Makes You Come

Alive. Board President John Biasucci led the congregation in the Act of Installation and our ministers received gifts of two paintings: one by Jilly Watson, and another created by the children.

Linda Pratt and her dinner team performed kitchen wizardry in presenting a non-stop array of tasty entrees and side dishes contributed by guests. Old friends, our co-ministers' families, and RE grads from decades past traded stories with newer members over

dinner and cake. Jim Stephenson led a 30-minute program that recognized members by the decades and culminated with the presentation of certificates honouring our 50-year members. Norma Elrod read Do you Remember When...? which covered our first 25 years. Past President Leslie Gibbons presented highlights from recent decades. Kerry Burke's band and dancing finished off the evening.




Our creativity can lead us to new understandings of what is possible. In this sense, it is a spiritual task to vision and imagine. Let us dream and build together.

3-6 Year Olds

Stories from our Unitarian Universalist (UU) heritage were the focus for three of last month's Spirit Play sessions. They heard about John Murray whose arrival in North America, bringing Universalism with him, started as a high seas adventure. Jon Hus, one of our early Unitarian forebears, believed in a more liberal view of church than was common for the time and he paid dearly for his beliefs. They heard more about the symbol of UUism, the Flaming Chalice, discussing the whole idea of community and inclusion. One child asked if Donald Trump would be welcome in our UU church. Joy, in her wisdom, answered that he would be if he acted respectfully. Parents, never doubt that your children are listening to you. The little ones also learned about different sacred places, places where people, throughout time, have gathered to worship.

OUT WHOLE LIVES for Kindergarten - Grade 1

We are happy to announce that we will be offering the Our Whole Lives (OWL) program for children in Kindergarten - Grade 1, with facilitators Lesley Giroday, Kit To and Blair Thompson leading the children's sessions and Lynn Sabourin coordinating parent sessions.

Our Whole Lives (OWL) for K-1 supports parents in educating children about birth, babies, bodies and families. Following a Parent Meeting and Parent/Child Orientation, the 8 sessions engage children with stories, songs and activities and include a weekly HomeLink – homework suggestions for parents and children to do together, aimed at promoting dialogue between parent and child.

All programming will be on Tuesday evenings starting on April 4^{th} and concluding on June 6^{th} . We will need at least 6 children for this to be a go.



7-8 Year Olds

UU Super Heroes abound and our Primary Class has been interacting with their stories. The story of Unitarian Transcendentalist minister, Theodore Parker, focused on him as a child listening to his inner voice, or conscience, in choosing not to kill a small turtle while playing outside. Most of us can thank Lewis Latimer, an Edison Pioneer, who helped perfect the early light bulb, did the crucial drawings of the first telephone for Alexander Graham Bell, invented a toilet for trains and an early air conditioner and helped to found a UU church. The kids made their own inventions from found objects. They looked at the life of Lydia Maria Child, an abolitionist and writer, who created a magazine just for children at a time when none existed. At the risk of her own social position and livelihood, she continued to express her ideas about freedom and dignity for all. The story of Superman, UU actor Christopher Reeve, is inspiring; after an equestrian accident that left him a quadriplegic, he worked tirelessly raising awareness and funds for spinal cord research. He always dreamed of leaving his wheelchair and walking again. Unfortunately, Reeve died in 2004 and never realized that dream. But he did leave a wonderful legacy through his foundation and an uplifting message of hope.

9-10 Year Olds

Our Middle Group continues to **Sing to the Power:** the power of place -the children heard about partnerships between UU congregations in North Ameri-




ca and Hungary and Transylvania. They are examples of earth power in honoring both our own location and the different locations that are dear to others. We talked about our own partner church in Hodmezovaserhaly, Hungary. The power of stillness -they heard a story which connected Henry David Thoreau seeking stillness at Walden Pond with the biblical story of Elijah finding God in the "still, small voice." The power of presence- our power to offer our attention and listening as well as our physical presence, was illustrated in the story of UU Kat Sinclair, who organized a peaceful protest in which participants blocked potentially hateful signs and speech by wearing giant angel wings. The power of silence- children heard about acoustic ecologist, Gordon Hempton's One Square Inch of Silence campaign to preserve spaces in which the only sounds are the sounds of nature. We went outside, listening for every sound we could hear, and categorized sounds as mechanical/electronic, human, or non-human. We talked about how the sounds around us affect us.



1-12 Year Olds

The latest questions from our Inquiring Souls sparking lively discourse included: What is destiny or fate? Do we really have free will? What is climate change and what is our response? and How do "they" know the different stars? Their graphic depictions of their discussions continue to paper the walls in Room 305.

From the Library

Thanks to Marcia Stephenson who allowed us to take some books before the book sale sponsored by the Partner Church Tour group, we can add 10 new books to our library. In the adult collection, the selected books are: Seven Seeds for a New Society by Sharif Abdullah, The Way of the Labyrinth by Helen Curry, The Truth about Canada by Mel Hurtig, Holy War: the Impact of Crusades and Their Impact on Today's World by Karen Armstrong, and Addiction to Perfection by Marion Woodman. We appreciate these donations by the choir members going to Hungary.



At time of writing, NSUC has shown considerable support for the visionary idea of having a large, retractable screen and projector installed in our sanctuary. While Elain Duvall's playful donation roulette idea spurred contributions, we also sensed a

willingness go forward with a more modern approach to "doing church." To that end, John Biasucci and I have consulted with 3 AV specialists regarding specifications, costs and transportability. The system could be in place in 6 weeks.

In other tech news, we have recently added, thanks to a generous donation, a new switched microphone for use in the sanctuary. Also, we now have the capacity to display sanctuary services on the TV in the Fellowship Room, in case of overflow or for other reasons. Nicole Hostinsky can now use the laser printer with the library computer, thanks to Malcolm Mallory.

This winter has put unusual strains on our resources for snow removal, as it has done for local governments. I expect the invoices for hand snow removal and plowing together to exceed \$3000, far more than in recent years. Let's pretend it was a rarity. The youth are beginning to think of spring and the effect of nicotinoid-based insecticides on bees and other pollinators. Have you got flowering bee-friendly plants to share? pring Break has come to an end, and Spring is slowly showing it's beauty in and around us. How wonderful!

The youth had an exciting month in March, despite their usual spring break shenanigans. The youth had their first youth group overnight of the year, which created some fantastic bonding moments. It is that time between night and dawn when the stories and curiosities come out and experiences get shared!

In March the youth started their monthly volunteer commitment at the Belkin House, the Salvation Army, where two to four youth and two adults help to prepare and serve lunch, and clean up afterwards. The Belkin House is a homeless shelter as well as a transition house and offers accommodation to over 200 residents up to 18 months depending on their needs. The youth will now continue to visit the Belkin House on a monthly basis, and in April they will also start running the Belkin House Cafe and learn the skill of being a barista.
