Special Welcome To Rev. Ron Phares

Following a busy Candidating Week (April 26th-May 5th) our congregation voted unanimously to call The Rev. Ron Phares as our new Minister! We extend a warm welcome to him as he begins his ministry here at the beginning of August.

Coming This Summer: New Flooring for Sanctuary, Foyer, Offices and Stairs

At the Annual General Meeting on May 26th, the congregation heard about an exciting plan to improve the flooring in our building. At its May meeting, the Board approved a summer renovation project that calls for:



- Installing new flooring in the sanctuary.
- Replacing pews with the comfy chairs.
- Re-carpeting the offices, the entry, and the stairs.

Sightlines to the screen and accessibility will also be improved. The project was recommended by the BEAT: The <u>B</u>uilding <u>E</u>nhancement <u>A</u>dvisory <u>T</u>ask Force, made up of representatives from the New Building Task Force, the Building & Grounds Team, the Finance and Endowment Committee, the Music Team, the Artarians, and the Connections Team.

Funding for the project will come partially from the Lois Kennedy choir bequest, which can be spent on acoustical improvements. Other targeted donations will come from a fund restricted to building enhancement and carpet replacement. We are committed to fundraise the last approximately \$6,000 for the \$26,500 project.

Here are two ways you can participate in our fundraiser and receive a tax receipt:

- 1. <u>Donate an upholstered chair</u> for a minimum contribution of \$100, with an option for a small nameplate of the donor or an honoree.
- 2. <u>Donate \$30 or more</u> and receive a maple leaf pin as a thank you gift for your contribution. (The maple leaf pin is reminiscent of the maple flooring).

This project will take place in July or early August. Please note that during this time, the office may be closed. Please call ahead if you expect to access the church building during this time.

While we can make changes individually, influence the behaviour of family members, and lobby our provincial and national governments on policy issues, many important decisions affecting our carbon footprint are controlled by our local municipal councils. DRAWDOWN'S "Top 100" list of climate solutions ranked in order of greatest impact include land use, electric vehicles, mass transit, bike infrastructure and walkable cities. If you're interested in exploring how we might support each other in monitoring municipal policies affecting climate change, join me in attending the Town Hall for a Green New Deal on Sunday, June 16th, facilitated by Cathy Strickland.



"Soul Matters" is a small group ministry program that uses carefully chosen UU resources, exercises, and questions to inspire soulful inquiry and reflection on universally common themes. Each month, we focus on a new topic.

This is a busier than usual season for Building and Grounds work, with several projects underway.

The first and most impactful is of course the replacement of flooring and many pews on the upper level (see the separate article on page 1 of this newsletter). The B.E.A.T. team has met, considered, consulted, and come up with a plan for the upper floor. Estimates are being assembled and contractors engaged. By September, the project should be completed.

The second project is the removal of the older shed and construction in its place of a new one by and for our Tenant.

The final project is more tree maintenance south of RSB in response to a request of our neighbour. The boiler, given a clean bill of health, has been shut down for the summer.

Our new lease with Kuddles Early Learning Centre comes into effect on July 1, 2019. Terms, in addition to the shed being built at the tenant's expense, include the improved lease rate, a shift in charges to Kuddles for more of the utilities costs, and all of the container and snow removal costs.

his year's NSUC Youth Program was marked in many ways by both enduring commitment, perplexing contradictions, and change. We changed the timing of Youth Group to see what would work best for our youth and their families. Our Advisor Team changed as we 'lost' Bruce Grierson for the year to the Ministerial Search Committee, and we gained Carla Mandy. And sadly, I too am going to be one of the things that will change as my contract as the Youth Program and Connections Coordinator will conclude at the end of August.

I have been touched by the commitments I have seen this year: from Coming of Age mentors and Youth Advisors, to youth who have struggled to figure out how to include church alongside their full schedules and busy teenage lives, to the dedication of the Youth Program Support Team members who have met with me monthly for the past two years. I have also seen that some of our previously 'tried and true' programming (like Movie Nights, Sleep-Overs and Coming

of Age Retreats, and even our regular Youth Group meetings) have missed the mark this year. At the same time, I watched our youth engage deeply in our community in a variety of ways including turning out in number to take the reins on the Haunted House in October, serving faithfully on the Coffee Crew all year long, helping with Sunday morning worships and attending Youth Conferences.

Our teens are a vital part of the NSUC community and they contribute and participate in our community in myriad ways just as our adult members and friends do. We are living in changing times; our ways of serving and supporting our teens and their families need to keep up with these changes. In small (and a few big) ways I have done my best to lean into the questions our changing culture is asking of our youth programming — and indeed of our churches in general. It is tender work to contemplate changing beloved programs, and it will require both curiosity and courage to ask questions and sit with the unknowns that are here.

Next year, as you continue to listen and dream and discern about how the NSUC community can most effectively empower our teens to live with greater depth, meaning and purpose, I wish you much patience and a beginner's mind — but most of all I wish you love, something I have seen and felt in abundance among you during my time here.

About Next Year's Program

Even though there will not be a new Youth Program Coordinator starting in September, the Youth Program is still going ahead, albeit with a few changes.

- There will be no Grade 12 Program next year, as there are no youth in Grade 12.
- Our Youth Advisor Team will administer and facilitate Youth Group with assistance from both Rev. Ron and the Youth Program Support Team.
- Youth Group meetings will return to Sunday evenings, 7-9pm, starting September 8th.
- Youth Advisors will keep weekly activities consistent from month to month to ease planning and to offer more predictability for youth & families. Watch for more info in August and September.
- We are postponing the Coming of Age (COA) program until the Fall of 2020. We have successfully run the COA program with grade 8s and 9s in the past, which will be the case when it is offered for the 2020/2021 church year.




