From Our Board President

write this message in a somber and reflective mood, knowing our community has recently experienced deep losses. I contemplate the recent passing of Mark Mayall, a long-time member of this church, father, grandfather, partner, and a friend who welcomed me to this community, and the beautiful celebration of his life held on November 12th. We also feel loss for the tragic death of Maiken Cooper (formerly known as Dani Cooper), someone who many knew for years and watched grow in our children's and youth programs. Their family and friends are suffering in profound ways, and those who knew Maiken are shocked, and, angry, and saddened. Please grant each other grace, give each other care and compassion, and avail yourselves of the resources and gatherings at the church. And most importantly, be supportive of Maiken's family and loved ones, who have asked for privacy in this time.

I also reflect on the September 11, 2022, General Meeting, and Board activities since then. As a Board, we put forth a democratic process aligned with our bylaws and contractual obligations in which all parties had the opportunity to be heard and members the opportunity to vote. As a Board, we respect the result of that process – the special resolution did not pass, and a second motion to support healing and covenanting processes did pass – and focused our attentions accordingly.

We have heard many concerns about our congregation's process & behaviour over these past months, concerning the use of proxy votes, respecting the vote's confidentiality, communications outside accepted process, and harmful interactions among congregants and between congregants and the Minister.

The Board hears all these concerns and is setting priorities in our agenda to meet the highest needs, to bring healing, and to move toward covenanting.

Earlier in the fall we set three main goals for the Board this year. They are:

- Support the Covenanting Process, including education of the congregation on the purpose of the process
- Obtain assessment of the trends in our congregational behaviours that are supporting and impeding a healthy community.
- Discern next steps for NSUC's Ministry.

These are in tandem with the Ministry Goals:

 Enact a Covenanting process, including education of the congregation on the purpose of the process

- Refine and educate congregation on Ministry Policies and Procedures to clarify purpose, roles & responsibilities
- Leadership development focused on healthy and effective communications.

We are well on our way to supporting the initiatives of Ministry to enact such a covenanting process, but even this goal is responding to feedback that we first need to become ready for that work, so covenanting will be preceded by a healing and restorative justice initiative to bring us back together. Meanwhile, a few of us, myself included, attended the CUC fall gathering this weekend, which focused on Covenanting purposes and processes. Also, important and ongoing is our Stewardship campaign.

Please pledge—we have important work ahead and need your support to keep this congregation and all that we do together alive.

Outreach

Each Sunday, 100% of our offering plate collections, unless otherwise marked, are given to the monthly Outreach Recipient. During the fall months (**September—November**), we collected for these four organizations selected by our Environmental Action Team: <u>The Edible Garden</u>, <u>Food Stash</u>, <u>Seed Change</u>, and <u>Quest Food Exchange</u>. The total collected will be reported in our next Newsletter.

In **December**, the Outreach Recipient is our Pastoral Discretionary Fund, which is used to help with a variety of needs in our congregation and the wider community.

January through May, in memory of Maiken (formerly known as Dani) Cooper, we will divide our Outreach collections evenly between these three organizations that provide mental health support. These organizations were chosen by our Justice, Equity, Diversity & Inclusion (JEDI) Team:

JEDI Spirit Zone: Widening our Welcome

In October, JEDI hosted a Spirit Zone on "Widening our Welcome". Participants brainstormed who might not feel fully welcome here, and how we might fix that. We discussed ways to deepen our hospitality to all people who may benefit from finding a spiritual home in our congregation.

In addition to addressing physical accessibility, we identified some actions that could widen our welcome, including:

- Create a "culture of welcome" where each of us feels responsibility to make newcomers feel welcome.
- Explain our rituals and "church language" to newcomers.
- Explain "how NSUC works" to newcomers.
- Show curiosity (not judgment) when someone holds a belief system that differs from ours.

- Provide more "free events" (potlucks, game nights, movie nights, music nights).
- Unfilled spots in FundFest events could be offered free to new members and friends.
- Incorporate more elements from youth worship, rituals, and conferences into adult worship, as well as their "best practices" in communication and inclusion (Ouch! And Oops! And Robbie's Rule).
- Renew our commitment to being a Welcoming Congregation.

"Our work to dismantle systems of oppression can be done in a loving and gentle way, recognizing that we all make mistakes. We should not be ashamed when someone points out our missteps. We can receive feedback with open hearts, apologize, and vow to do better. Blame and shame do not help us move ahead and should not be part of this work. At the same time, bad behaviour should not be tolerated and should be addressed by calling members back into covenant."


Holiday Office Closures

Building & Grounds

Brian Welwood is the Building and Grounds Chair/contact person during summer months, with **Paul Symons** covering the balance of the year.

Here are some of the issues that we dealt with in the last 5 months with the help of Tom Fullerton, our church Custodian:



Drainage Issues

- After last November's atmospheric river caused a "small" flood in the church basement we bought inflatable "dams" to divert water away from the church basement door.
- Perimeter Drainage Ltd.
 scoped and cleaned our exterior drainage system, removing several small incursions of roots close to the building and a much larger one near the back of our property.
- The pump alarm had been sounding intermittently in the Rod Stewart Building (RSB), even though no rain had fallen in weeks. As far as we could tell, the pumps in the RSB sump had not been serviced in 10 years and were over 20 years old. One was failing badly and the other slightly. Since the RSB is an important source of revenue for the church, we replaced both pumps, controls, etc.



Heating Problems

- Church heaters did not come on this fall when needed. Lime Services replaced parts to fix the problem and did a thorough servicing.
- Lime also serviced two of the older furnaces in the RSB and advised that they should be replaced soon.
- Lime Services found that the expansion tank in the Chelsea House building was leaking and the pump was on its last legs. Parts have arrived and will be installed soon.



Other Items

- Tom power washed the parking lot and repainted the lines and curbs. I'm sure you noticed!
- Old cedars along the east side of the RSB were an eyesore and blocked the neighbor's sunlight. Tom and the neighbour topped or removed them.
- Tom removed a large branch that had fallen on the fence.
- Many other issues were handled by Tom with little or no B&G involvement. We appreciate his willingness to take on additional tasks.

Help Needed!

It has been a busy period for B&G, and expensive too. We are well over budget this year, and our buildings are not getting any younger. We anticipate similar or greater costs next year and into the future.

We lost Mark Mayall to cancer in October. He was a great friend, and also an active and valuable member of the B&G Team. We acknowledge all of his hard work and professional advice over the past 30 or more years. The average age of the active B&G members is over 70, so please contact <u>Paul</u> or <u>Brian</u> to offer your help.
