The Policing Project seeks a full-time **Senior Program Manager or Associate Director** with a background in the social sciences to lead its research and assessment projects. The Policing Project is working with the California Department of Justice and the Center for Policing Equity to develop a guidebook for police departments on how to collect, assess, and report on traffic stop and pedestrian data. We are in the early stages of a 2-year study to assess police-community engagement efforts across the country. And we are working with teams of social scientists—and in partnership with police departments—to conduct rigorous assessment and cost-benefit analysis of various policing practices, including proactive policing and vehicle pursuits. We are looking for a dedicated project manager to participate in and help oversee all of this exciting work.

**Responsibilities**

The Senior Program Manager/Associate Director will report to the Director of the Policing Project and will be responsible for:

- Assisting with planning, design, and implementation of our research projects;
- Coordinating with our many partners;
- Conducting site visits and focus groups;
- Writing reports, blog entries, and academic publications describing our research;
- Helping to supervise student externs.

**Desired Experience and Qualifications**

- M.A. or Ph.D. in a social science or related discipline;
- Strong research, writing, and communications skills;
- Familiarity with research design, quantitative methods, cost-benefit analysis, and/or program assessment;
- Project management experience, particularly with multi-member/multi-team projects;
- Knowledge of policing or related criminal justice fields.
