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

Garcia: The Bald Eagle's Toupee features* a site-specific mural and a new adaptation of the 2016 installation War Nest. Other works include a video trailer for a forthcoming video game, produced with the Plug In Studio, that follows the experience of a veteran returning home and re-acclimating to civilian life.

With a focus on the visual, literary, performative and creative practices of veterans, the National Veterans Art Museum Triennial explores a century of war and survival while challenging the perception that war is something only those who have served in the military can comprehend. Throughout history, art has provided a frame to create meaning out of the complicated experience of war, seek justice and imagine reconciliation. The NVAM Triennial draws on this history to connect today's veteran artists with the history of veteran creative practices and their impact on society over the past century. The NVAM Triennial exhibition opening coincides with the Veteran Art Summit, featuring a series of presentations, workshops, panels and discussions on May 3-5, 2019 at the Chicago Cultural Center, National Veterans Art Museum and the DePaul Art Museum.

The NVAM Veteran Art Summit brings together veteran artists from across the United States to strengthen the veteran art community. Exploring what it means to be an artist and a veteran today, the Summit offers opportunities for veteran artists to learn from their peers through presentations, workshops, panels, and discussions. The Summit also offer collaborative and networking opportunities.

PERFORMING ARTS PROGRAM

RETURN TO THE BODY

Throughout our history, veterans have extended their bodies with intentional strategies of creating new space, new possibilities for understanding our experiences of war and militarism. Likewise, the veteran artists included in this series, by way of embodiment, negotiate those strategies. The deweaponization of the body, queering the veteran's experience, and performative challenges to erasure are but some of the strategies deployed.

Operating within and upon a field of complex and shifting narratives and relationships, personal and collective histories, these artists reimagine, and by reimagining, redefine their existences, and the broader society's relationship to their existences. This return to the body manifests itself by the isolation of military gesture, through sound, by embodiment, in an effort to re-contextualize the body and its use.

Spoken word theatre, procession, and a performance laboratory are the containers by which these veteran artists extend an invitation for consideration, towards creating new folds, or more humbly to see, to perceive folds and possibilities where previously we have not.

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Themes of the Triennial: While the NVAM Triennial performance pieces are not finalized as of the publication of this resource guide, the performance artists' practices variously address several themes integral to the overall Triennial, including reparation, reconciliation, justice, trauma, and making meaning out of war. Additionally, the artists all are challenging the construct of "the veteran" in our imagination - inviting us to consider who is conjured by the term, why that is, and how veteranness is enacted in various places and forms.

PROCESSION

The performers in this series, *Return to the Body*, enact procession as a reparative space. "Body" here is understood as a return to the sensorial, to the body as a site of communication and pleasure, as well as the collective body as a relational space to seek meaning, and as a means to achieve common purpose.

In the last century, soldiers returning home from war and military service have often met on the processional ground, the active commons of the people. This has taken many shapes: protests, military parades, welcome home functions, funeral procession parades. It is a space where the individual rejoins the collective body. Towards what are we moving at the present moment? *PROCESSION* is about moving in the same/similar direction as other people. It's a collective action.

PROCESSION ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES



Kiam Marcelo Junio, Chicago, Illinois, Navy, 2004-2011

Kiam Marcelo Junio is a holistic healer and interdisciplinary artist. Their research and artwork center around queering identities, Philippine history, creation myths, herstories, personal/collective healing through collaborative practices, and inner shadow work. Kiam served seven years in the US Navy as a Hospital Corpsman. Their work has been exhibited, screened, and performed throughout Chicago at Boyfriends, Roots & Culture, Defibrillator, Links Hall, Museum of Contemporary Art, Hyde Park Art Center, the Bijou Theater, the Field Museum, and in New York City, Mexico City, Montreal, and Cadiz. Nicole Goodwin, New York City | Army, 2001-2004

Nicole Goodwin was born and raised in Bedstuy, Brooklyn until she was 15. She then moved to the South Bronx and joined the Army at the age of 21, staying in Germany for three years, and returned in 2004 with her child, who stayed in California while Goodwin was deployed to Iraq. Goodwin is the author of *Warcries* (2018), a Ragdale Alice Judson Hayes Fellowship Recipient, 2017 EMERGENYC Hemispheric Institute Fellow, and the 2013-2014 Queer Art Mentorship Queer Art Literary Fellow. Goodwin's *Ain't I a Woman?* was presented on May 18th, 2017 as a "public action" on a sidewalk in Greenwich Village.

Joseph Lefthand, Chicago, Illinois | Marine Corps, 2000-2004

Joseph Lefthand is an artist and administrator. A veteran of the 2003 invasion of Iraq, Lefthand works at the intersection of art and social practice, exploring the role of body movement, performance, and abstraction as alternative modes of communicating and engendering social discourse. Doing so has allowed Lefthand to question and reframe the weaponization of his body and mind into a vehicle for education and transformation, whether it be through deliberate engagement of the natural world through site-based work, or the exploration of foreign policy and inherited conflict through ceremony, ritual, and performance. Lefthand additionally facilitates workshops for both school-aged youth and the School of the Art Institute of Chicago branch of CreatiVets, a non-profit that partners with art and design colleges around the nation to provide professional arts instruction for veterans who've served in theaters of conflict overseas. https://www.instagram.com/josephlefthand/

Army Reserve, 1999-2002; Army, 2002-2006

Anthony Torres, Jr. was born in Brooklyn and raised in Utica, New York. He began his military career as a Civil Affairs Specialist in the Army Reserve from 1999-2002, then on active duty as a mental health specialist at Fort Hood, Texas from 2002-2006. In 2004 he was attached to the 115th Field Hospital and served on a 12-month deployment to Abu Ghraib Prison, Iraq. While deployed, he provided mental health treatment to both U.S. troops as well as Iraqi detainees. Following an honorable discharge he relocated to Miami and worked as a psychology technician at the Miami VA Medical Center from 2008-2013. He holds a MS in Psychology from Carlos Albizu University and a Master's degree in Social Work from Barry University.

Hipólito Arriaga III (Community Outreach/Writer/Performer) Miami, Florida Marines, 2003-2007

Born and raised in the South Bronx, Hipólito Arriaga III in 2003, at age 19, joined the Marine Corps despite the U.S. already being at war with both Afghanistan and Iraq. After four years, including two deployments to Iraq, he separated from the military honorably. His experiences overseas pierced him heavilyafter returning home he began seeking healing for the various injuries he had sustained, physically, emotionally, and spiritually, eventually leading him on a journey of self-discovery. He also serves as a Wilderness Expedition Leader with No Barriers Warriors and serves as a Facilitator with Warrior Writers.

In the hyper-reality of performance, we are taken on a spiritual journey of emotion which transcends conventional systems of separation that usually impede us connecting on deeper levels.—Hipólito Arriaga III

This is Not a Drill (in-progress) by Jefferson Pinder, Chicago, Illinois

Through *This is Not a Drill* (in-progress)., Jefferson Pinder trains a team of performers to venture into the deep south during Summer 2019. Taking inspiration from Goat Island's *How dear to me the hour when daylight dies*, he aggressively prepares black bodies for stylized militancy in the face of history and white nationalism.

Jefferson Pinder's work provokes commentary about race and struggle. Focusing primarily with neon, found objects, and video, Pinder investigates identity through the most dynamic circumstances and materials. His work has been featured in numerous group and solo shows including exhibitions at The Studio Museum in Harlem; the Wadsworth Athenaeum Museum of Art in Hartford, Connecticut; Showroom Mama in Rotterdam, Netherlands; The Phillips Collection, and the National Portrait Gallery in Washington, DC. Pinder's work was featured in the 2016 Shanghai Biennale, and at the Smithsonian Museum of African American History and Culture. In 2016, he was awarded a United States Artist's Joyce Fellowship Award in the field of performance and was a 2017 John S. Guggenheim Fellow. http://www.jeffersonpinder.com/

In early 2019, the Triennial's performance curators put out a call asking for performing artists and musicians who are veterans to apply for its Veteran Art Summit laboratory and residency. Accepted artists participated in a one-week residency the week prior to the summit, and debuted their work at the event.
