

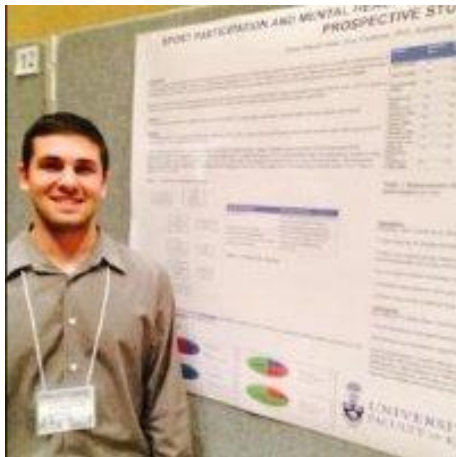
EARLY CAREER COMMITTEE
