<ul> <li>Desperate Desire – in EVERY scene, not just for the whole book</li> <li>Misbelief – this runs your proto</li> </ul>	•
<ul> <li>Longing - what your character needs to feel whole</li> <li>Purpose - Why your character is on the planet; their mission; their vocation</li> <li>Obstacles</li> </ul>	•
• Stakes – Why the hell does any of it matter? (( IN EACH SCENE ))	•

<ul> <li>Maybe the desire changes over the course of the scene</li> <li>Cliffhangers not always necessary! BUT, end the chapter with another obstacle so that you set yourself up for the r</li> </ul>	next
chapter and create profluence.	•
