In January 2023, our AmeriCorps VISTA member Allison Osredker ended her 12-month term of service with JRBP and Missouri Smallflows Organization. Here is a note from Allison about her experience:

"During my time as an AmeriCorps VISTA member for the James River Basin Partnership I gained experience working with non-profit organizations, building partnerships, organizing events, and so much more. This position has been extremely enriching not only for my professional development, but it has also expanded my interest in conservation work as a whole.



Highlights of my service include networking, hands-on field experience with water quality monitoring and soil testing, learning about grant research and writing, and visiting classrooms to teach water quality lessons.

My favorite part of my service experience is how much independent development I had. It pushed me out of my comfort zone to reach out to organizations, individuals, and department heads to work with them projects or ask for their financial support. I gained a lot of public speaking experience - which no one can ever have enough of! There have been so many opportunities through my service that I never would have had otherwise. I never felt pressured to "prove" myself like in many past entry level positions. During my service year, I was always in a very encouraging environment where everyone wanted me to succeed, gain experiences that would benefit me, and prepare me for my future."

Right as Rain: Rain Barrel Rebates


Prepare for spring showers by installing a new rainwater harvesting system...and get paid to do it! Residents of Greene and Christian Counties are eligible to receive a one-time rebate as a direct reimbursement at a rate of \$0.50 per gallon, up to \$300. To qualify, rainwater harvesting systems must hold a minimum of 50 gallons and be closed installations.

Why capture rainwater?

- Reduce Pollutant Runoff collect water that would otherwise carry pollutants into your local storm drains
- Minimize Erosion slow down water that would otherwise contribute to erosion
- Conserve Drinking Water Use rainwater for non-potable applications to reduce demand on potable water resources
- For Springfield Homeowners: Show Your Yard Ethic rainwater systems are part of the Yard Ethic certification program, learn more at yardethic.com

Earth Day 2023: Save the Date

JRBP will be hosting our annual Earth Day cleanup on Saturday April 22, at Lake Springfield. This is a FREE event open to anyone who would like to get out and make a difference in their community. We will have shoreline, lake, and river cleanup opportunities available. Pre-registration is required. Trash bags and gloves will be provided.

Experienced floaters have the option to float a 4.75-mile section of the James River from Creighton Access to the



Southwood Access. Shuttling from Southwood to Creighton Access will be provided. Bring your own boat or call and reserve one of ours for free. A limited number of canoes are available on a first come first serve basis, so don't delay. Paddlers may also paddle to remote shorelines of Lake Springfield to pick up trash.

If paddling isn't your thing, grab a trash bag and walk the shorelines of Lake Springfield and the James River. We will have multiple shoreline cleanup opportunities available including the Tailwaters Access and Clay Henshaw Memorial Access, all starting from the Lake Springfield boathouse.

- Aqua Bugs Use the dichotomous key to find the correct ID. App contains a full list of macroinvertebrates so you can learn more about each one.
- Merlin Bird ID ID's birds from photos, sounds, or through simple questions.
 Must download regional packs.
- iNaturalist ID's plants and animals from a photo, can be submitted to received ID input from other users.
- Shroomify Use the dichotomous key to narrow down your ID and see a list of mushrooms commonly found during each month.
