





The Life and Work of SHINSAKU HAMADA

Shinsaku Hamada (1929-2023) passed away peacefully in 2023, at the age of 94.

"By the time I was in high school, I had honed my pottery skills alongside the craftsmen at Hamadagama Pottery and was able to use the wheel to make large pieces such as large plates and large vases," Shinsaku recalled. He acquired outstanding pottery skills from a young age. In addition, while helping his father Shoji Hamada with his Mingei (Folk Crafts Movement), he was able to see and interact with Shoji's art and crafts from all over the world. He was able to learn about art and crafts from Shoji, which helped him develop his high level of aesthetic sensibility. Shinsaku's works, born from his masterful pottery skills and his sense of beauty, have a restrained elegance.

濱田晋作の生涯とその仕事

濱田晋作(1929-2023)は、2023年に94 歳で静かに生涯を閉じました。

「自分は高校生の頃には、濱田窯の職人たちと肩を並べて陶技を磨き大皿や大壺などの大作のろくろもできるようになっていた。」と本人が述懐していたように、卓越した陶技を若いころから身に付けていました。また、父の濱田庄司の民藝運動の手助けをしながら庄司の古今東西の美術工芸品を間近で見て接し庄司から美術工芸に対する見識の薫陶を受けたことにより、高い審美眼を持つようにもなりました。晋作の高い陶技と審美眼により生まれてきた作品群は抑制の効いた気品を備えています。

Despite having mastered the basics of pottery from a young age, he did not make his debut as a potter until around the age of 40. This was because he served as an assistant to Shoji Hamada, helping him with his pottery, the Mingei Movement, and his activities overseas. This was also due to Shinsaku's own cautious nature. Although he made his debut as a potter later in life, he had a long career, continuing until he was about 90 years old. Shinsaku often said, "In any society, it's natural for the second generation to be good, and natural for them to be bad." Throughout his life as a potter, he was always compared to his great father; at times he felt the pressure of this and at other times he felt its benefits.

Shinsaku was more of a craftsman (technician) than an artist, and when he taught me the principles of pottery during my training as a young man, he gave more technical guidance than spiritual, creative ideals. As mentioned, Shinsaku was an introverted person who was cautious about many things. He was also passive about the Mingei Movement and connections with overseas countries and had no interest in political movements, honor, or status improvement. Many people hoped that he would achieve similar success to his father and were initially disappointed. Over the years, however, he quietly devoted himself to pottery at Hamadagama Pottery, continued to protect the Shoji Hamada Memorial Mashiko Sankokan Museum established by Shoji Hamada, and continued to send high-quality Mashiko ware to the world. Gradually more people came to understand his attitude. A regular patron was impressed, saying, "The more you look at Shinsaku's works, the more you use them, and the longer you spend time with them, the better they get."

Pucker Gallery has been holding exhibitions of the three generations of Hamadagama Pottery for many years, and it is very meaningful to have the opportunity to show the individuality of each of the three generations—Shoji, Shinsaku, and me (Tomoo). I hope that more people will take this opportunity to see and use Shinsaku Hamada's quiet yet powerful works and experience the happiness of spending time with them.

—Tomoo Hamada Director, Hamadagama Pottery ただ、若いころから陶芸の基礎が完成していたにも関わらず、意外なことに陶芸家としてのデビューは40歳ごろからと遅い方でした。この理由としては、濱田庄司の作陶や民藝運動、海外での活動などを手助けするアシスタントを務めていたことと、晋作自身の慎重な性格が原因でした。陶芸家としてのデビューは遅かったものの、その代わりその後の作陶人生は90歳ごろまでと長いものでした。「どこの世の中でも、二代目は良くて当たり前、悪くて当たり前。」が口癖だった晋作は、常に偉大な父親と比べられ、時に重圧を時に恩恵を感じながらの作陶人生を通しました。

芸術家というより職人(技術者)的な気質だった晋作は、若いころの陶芸修行中の私に対する陶芸の心得の指導をした際にも、精神的な創造的な理念よりは技術的な指導の方が多かったです。晋作は先に述べたように内向的な性格で、様々な物事に対して慎重でした。民藝運動や海外との関りに対しても消極的で、名誉や地位向上などの政治的な動きにも関心の無い人でした。ですので、濱田庄司の後を継いだ時に同等の活躍を望んでいた関係者からは当初は期待外れな印象を持った方もいたようです。ただ、長い年月を経て、濱田窯にて静かに陶芸に打ち込み続け、濱田庄司が開館した濱田庄司記念益子参考館を守り続け、品格の高い益子焼を世に送り続けた姿勢に、徐々に理解者が増えて行きました。「晋作さんの作品は、見れば見るほど、使えば使うほど、長く付き合えば付き合うほど良くなってくるんだよな。」と、常連のお客様が感心していました。

パッカーギャラリーにおいても、長年にわたり濱田窯の三代の展覧会を開催頂いて来まして、庄司、晋作、友緒の三代それぞれの個性を皆様に見ていただく機会を得てきたことは大変有意義なことです。この機会に濱田晋作の静かで且つ力強い作品群をご覧いただき、ご愛用頂き、作品と共に過ごす幸福を味わう方々が増えていくことを望みます。



SHINSAKU HAMADA

Shinsaku Hamada was born in 1929 as the second son of Shoji Hamada. A year later, the Hamada family moved to Mashiko in Tochigi Prefecture. He studied industrial art at Waseda University in Tokyo and thereafter traveled with his father to assist him during demonstrations and lectures. Hamada held his first solo exhibition at the Mitsukoshi Department Store in 1970, and has since had numerous landmark exhibitions there. In 1978, Hamada became a Kokugakai National Art Association member and was named Director of the Shoji Hamada Memorial Mashiko Sankokan Museum. In 1999, he received the 27th Shimotsuke Citizens Award. Hamada continued to exhibit internationally and work alongside his son, Tomoo, in the compound built by his father, until his death in 2023.



SHOJI HAMADA

Shoji Hamada was born in 1894, graduated from Tokyo Technical College in 1916, and enrolled at Kyoto Ceramics Research. From 1920 to 1923, Hamada travelled extensively to learn about diverse ceramic and folk craft traditions and built a climbing kiln in England at St Ives with Bernard Leach (1887–1979). In 1952, Hamada travelled to the U.S. with Soetsu Yanaqi (1889–1961) and Bernard Leach to give ceramic demonstrations and workshops. After receiving the Tochiqi Prefecture **Culture Award and Minister** of Education Award for Art, Hamada was designated a Living National Treasure in 1955. He was appointed Director of the Japan Folk Crafts Museum and awarded the Okinawa Times Award and Order of Culture from the Emperor. In 1961, Shoji Hamada: Collected Works was published by Asahi Shimbun. In 1973, Hamada received an honorary Doctor of Art degree from the Royal College of Art in London, England. Shoji Hamada died in 1978, a year after the completion of the Mashiko Sankokan Museum, which was built in his home.

TOMOO HAMADA

Tomoo Hamada was born in 1967 as the second son of Shinsaku Hamada and a grandson of Shoji Hamada. He earned undergraduate and graduate degrees in sculpture from Tama Art University in Tokyo. He exhibits, lectures, and gives workshops internationally and was integral in helping the pottery community of Mashiko rebuild after the Tohoku earthquake of 2011. He organized the Shoji Hamada climbing kiln project (2015 and 2018) and fired Hamada's eight chamber climbing kiln after it was restored from earthquake damage. He was the chair for the Mashiko &St. Ives Centenary Project celebrating the founding of Leach Pottery by Bernard Leach and Shoji Hamada in 1920. His ceramic works are included in the permanent collections of numerous museums including the Mashiko Museum of Ceramic Art, the Tochigi Prefectural Museum of Fine Arts, the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, the Victoria & Albert Museum, London, the Asian Art Museum, San Francisco, and the Embassy of Japan in the UK. He lives in Mashiko on the original compound his grandfather built and is the Director of the Shoji Hamada Memorial Mashiko Sankokan Museum.




