## LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We acknowledge the original stewards of the land and we acknowledge our elders.

We acknowledge our responsibility to the land and resources, and the original stewards of this land - the Indigenous people of this world who have also been exploited and oppressed to enrich colonial and settler powers.

We acknowledge that for thousands of years this land on which the University of Toronto operates, has been the traditional land of the Huron-Wendat, the Seneca, and the Mississaugas of the Credit.
