



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MESSAGE FROM HILLARY

As you read this newsletter, you'll see Heal the Ocean celebrating, and being feted for, our success at getting the Rincon septic-to-sewer project finished, and certainly we do love hearing the stories of surfers shouting with glee at being able to surf a "septic-free Rincon!"

However, as much as we love the fun of celebration, we are wasting no time getting into the biggest phase of our Mission: *Getting wastewater out of the ocean.*

During the 15 years it took us to work on getting the Rincon septic-to-sewer project built, we were asked many times, "Why do you think it's so great to collect all this stuff and spew it into the ocean?"

We said then, and we say now, "Just wait." Getting septic systems into the sewer systems we likened to sweeping a floor into a dustpan (the wastewater treatment plant). The emptying of the dustpan, we knew, needed work. We knew we would get to it, and we told our detractors so.

Today, Heal the Ocean is working with every wastewater and water district on the Santa Barbara south coast to help them access \$625 million in state Water Bond (Proposition 1) funding to transform wastewater treatment plants on the south coast into recycled water plants. This means getting wastewater out of the ocean.

HTO is in the unique position of facilitating this work. Through our excellent contacts with the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB), which is administering funds for Facilities Upgrade Planning grants, and through our meaningful communication with the Department of Water Resources (DWR), which is managing the fierce California drought, and also through our excellent contacts with reputable engineering firms (RMC Water, Santa Monica, and Dudek, Santa Barbara) to help us strategize, Heal the Ocean is a strong force for change.

Every day, we are working with district managers, consultants, state agencies and engineers, arranging meetings and working out solutions, to establish a path to move forward on this issue.

At the same time, James Hawkins, HTO Policy Director, has been doing deep, meticulous research, to support our advocacy efforts on recycled water – from Indirect Potable Reuse (IPR) or Direct Potable Reuse (DPR), or Title 22 tertiary water for irrigation. On pages 10 of this newsletter, you will see James's Infographic, with impressive numbers for the amount of water that can be saved by turning ocean discharge pipes around. In addition, HTO members will soon receive a white paper authored by James and titled "Purified Water: A New Water Resource for California."

We could do none of this work without you, our dear supporters. We would like you to think of your financial help being multiplied 10 times, 100 times, no...1,000 times over...because your funding of Heal the Ocean is resulting in millions of dollars of State funding for all of our South Coast wastewater plants to turn their pipes around.

"Turn the Pipes Around!" has in fact become a new song in our office, and as you read this, a popular Santa Barbara band is in the process of turning it into a rock and roll piece. We can't wait to hear it played.

PLEASE NOTE: Due to confusion on the part of the public, Heal the Ocean needs to clarify that we are not involved with Groundswell's "Rincon Enhancement Project," which proposes to raise funds to install a paved or gravel path to the Rincon beach from the South Parking lot, and to work with State Parks to install interpretative signs and overlooks, and investigate feasibility of sewer hookup of South lot bathrooms. Whatever funds Groundswell is raising for its project is NOT an extension of Heal the Ocean's work at the Rincon, and we regret any confusion for people who think they may be donating to us.

HTO Executive Director Hillary Hauser was all smiles after HTO not only received a Commendation from the Regional Water Quality Control Board on January 19, 2015, but also from the California State Senate and the County Board of Supervisors. The Commendation was presented to Heal the Ocean in recognition of HTO's great success in working with the Carpinteria Sanitary District (CSD) to bring the Rincon Septic-to-Sewer project to fruition. Paying tribute from the County Board of Supervisors were Janet Wolf – 2nd District Supervisor – and Eric Friedman – speaking for 1st District Supervisor Salud Carbajal. Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson's salute was made by her aide, James Joyce. The Regional Board Commendation was read by RQWCB Board member (and HTO Co-Founder) Jeff Young.

In the audience were surfers who helped raise funds for sewer engineering studies; Rincon homeowners (Steve Halsted – who led the Rincon homeowner drive for funds to pay for legal work –spoke in praise of HTO); Penfield & Smith (now Stantec) engineers who worked on the project; CSD Manager Craig Murray with CSD board members; and HTO Board members, staff and supporters. There was a standing ovation when Hillary introduced those in the audience who helped with the project, and ended her words with appreciation and thanks to all involved. It is not lost on us that Heal the Ocean started in 1998 during a public protest at the County Administration Building and 16 years later we were now "upstairs," being feted for finishing what we told the public we would do way back then.

While Heal the Ocean is being feted at State, County and Regional levels for our success in a 15-year battle to get septic systems off the beaches in South Santa Barbara County, we are still battling for stronger septic regulations in Santa Barbara County so that a 15-year war doesn't break out every time there is a movement to fix a problem area.

Throughout 2014, Heal the Ocean participated in a stakeholder process led by County Environmental Health Services to develop a Local Area Management Program (LAMP) that complies with AB 885 – a state law authored by then-State Assemblywoman Hannah-Beth Jackson and others governing septic systems. In AB 885 there is a provision (Tier 2) for individual counties to develop their own, tailored regulations according to their particular needs. This Tier 2 provision is called the Local Area Management Program (LAMP).

Heal the Ocean objected to the draft LAMP that came out of the year-long stakeholder process and we approached the Regional Water Board for intervention, testifying that the proposed regulations were weak, and ultimately unable to target areas needing repair or require upgrade where upgrade is needed.

The Regional Water Board supported our request, the draft LAMP went back to the stakeholder committee, and a revised draft was developed that sets up a regulatory path through an "Advanced Management Protection Program" to identify and address areas with existing polluting septic systems. The Regional Water Board is currently evaluating this draft and determining their preferred path forward for the Advanced Management Protection Program, conferring with HTO regarding details. The Regional Board is expected to punt its draft back to the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors by late spring or summer of 2015.

HTO continues to monitor this issue closely because it is critical that the County develop regulations that address pockets of existing septic systems – at risk of polluting adjacent groundwater or surface water bodies – without precipitating additional long and expensive fights – like at Rincon.


PERMEABLE PAVERS PAVE THE WAY TO GROUNDWATER RECHARGE

In February 2015 Heal the Ocean submitted two letters of support for the City of Santa Barbara's dual applications for stormwater grant funding from the State, and we were more than happy learn that the City has been awarded over \$3.4

These projects will replace asphalt with "permeable" pavers that allow rainwater to seep through to the soil – recharging groundwater and reducing the urban runoff that pollutes the City's creeks and, eventually, the ocean. The pavers will be installed in the 600 and 700 blocks of Quarantina Street, at Alice Keck Park and Memorial Gardens, the Plaza de Vera Cruz alley, and at two City parking lots at 620 Laguna Street.

At Heal the Ocean, we believe that stormwater is also a waste of water. Instead of it being needlessly

disposed of in the ocean (after picking up all the waste, oil and other pollutants in the streets), we need to use it productively as a water resource. The permeable paver does just that by converting rainwater into groundwater.

Heal the Ocean salutes the Santa Barbara City Creeks Division for its proactive pursuit of state grant funding for projects such as this.

HTO ATTACKS CONFETTI

After the Summer Solstice parade of 2015, Heal the Ocean got a call from a concerned business owner on State Street, who invited us over to look at the storm drains in the block of the Arlington Theater. These drains were stuffed full with confetti, some of which was made out of mylar and plastic products, which would look very attractive to fish if it ended up in the ocean after a rain event.



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After our dialogue with the City Creeks Division on this issue, the Creeks Division began to price out various solutions. In May 2015 HTO met with Cameron Benson, director of the Creek Division and Jim Dewey, Facilities and Energy Manager of the City Public Works Department, who reported their proposed pilot program for upcoming State Street parades.

Big Green, a Santa Barbara environmentally-savvy cleaning organization, will prep and place place "silt fencing" over all catch basins and drop inlets located along the parade routes for Solstice and Fiesta, which will then be swept by the traditional street sweepers following the festivities.

Once again, Heal the Ocean salutes the City Creeks Division for their aggressive action on a storm water issue - this one being made of confetti!

HTO LEADS CHARGE ON RECLAIMING WASTE(D)WATER OUR BIGGEST PROJECT YET!

When the City of Santa Barbara fired up its public process to reinstate its Desalination Plant, Heal the Ocean went before the Santa Barbara City Council and presented our plan to fund an Indirect Potable Reuse Study with RMC Water, Los Angeles, for the upgrading of both quantity and quality of the recycled water in the City's existing recycled water facility – now being rebuilt to include ultrafiltration. Working with RMC, we ultimately expanded the scope of that study to include the assessment of groundwater recharge opportunities with advanced treated recycled water across the Santa Barbara County south coast.

We have now presented the results of our scoping plan for the RMC study – the Santa Barbara Regional Groundwater Recharge Feasibility Study – to each of the sanitary and water district managers in the region and, as a result of these meetings, have provided an important template on which the districts

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have begun to formulate their own feasibility studies for advanced water recycling. As a result of our encouragement and assistance, these districts are now working to fund these studies through the Facilities Planning Grant Program from the State Water Board in order to get in line for California Water Bond (Proposition 1) funding to construct advanced water recycling facilities (see "Water Bond Funding Opportunities" on page 9). We have made enormous progress in recent months, including:

City of Santa Barbara: The largest part of HTO's study with RMC Water is centered on working to upgrade the City's recycled water plant to produce at least 5 mgd of high-quality "gold standard" recycled water as a potential new water supply. As part of the Regional Water Quality Control Board permit requirements for its Desal Plant, the City is conducting a study with Carollo Engineers to evaluate advanced water recycling

opportunities. HTO is coordinating with the City Public Works Dept. to make sure their study includes everything we've had outlined in the RMC study to fully evaluate the feasibility of advanced water recycling supplies.

Goleta Sanitary District, Goleta West Sanitary District and Goleta Water

District: After meeting throughout April and May 2015 to present our RMC proposal for their comments, the district managers of the Goleta agencies are now putting themselves in place to apply immediately for a Facilities Upgrade Planning grant, which will include phases of water quality all the way to Direct Potable Reuse (DPR).

Carpinteria Sanitary District and Carpinteria Valley Water District:

These agencies are currently in the middle of a facilities upgrade plan, initiated on their own with the assistance of the same RMC consultant Heal the Ocean is working with.

The district managers hope to determine if Carpinteria's groundwater basin can be utilized for recharge with highly treated recycled water.


Montecito Sanitary District and Montecito Water District: Both Montecito agencies

have commissioned a study through Dudek Engineering to evaluate the condition of Montecito's groundwater basin in order to determine next steps in improving its water supply. HTO has provided a third of the funding for this study, thanks to a generous donation provided by HTO Board Member **Thomas Dabney**.

In coordination with consultants from both RMC Water and Dudek, Heal the Ocean will be also working hard to help public agencies to secure funding for wastewater plant upgrade, as well as to educate the public on the benefits of recycled water projects.


WATER BOND FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Money, money - where to get it?

Approved by voters in November 2014, Proposition 1 (the Water Bond) authorizes a total of \$725 million for water recycling projects - a huge boon to statewide efforts to reuse a wasted resource. The State Water Board will be administering these funds and recently released draft guidelines for water recycling funding. Key details include:

- Recycled water facilities planning grants are now available for up to **75% of planning costs** for up to a total of \$75,000;
- Recycled water projects will be eligible for a maximum of 35% of eligible construction costs for **up to \$15 million**;
- The "match" of funds required by the State grant can be provided by the State with 1% low interest financing, which reduces the financial hit to ratepayers.

HTO is offering any and all assistance to secure funding to get recycled water projects to groundbreaking, whether it be help on applications, consultant expertise, or information for Districts that pursue these projects.






A SIGNIFICANT NEW WATER SUPPLY

Potential recycled water supplies could supply or offset over a third of total water demand across the south coast.



OTHER ISSUES HTO IS WORKING ON...

CLIMATE ACTION PLANNING

In May 2015, HTO submitted comments to the County of Santa Barbara outlining our concerns with the County's lack of a coordinated



and comprehensive adaptation planning process for climate change. We have applauded the County's efforts on sea level rise planning to date but, as this newsletter went to print, we don't' feel the County's draft Energy and Climate Action Plan addresses other

critical areas of adaptation, from dwindling water resources to more intense wildfires fueled by rising temperatures and a drier climate.

BEACH BACTERIA OBJECTIVES

The State Water Resources Control Board has initiated what is expected to be a multi-year process to amend California's existing

Statewide Bacteria Objectives, which govern whether beaches violate water quality standards for bacteria – a key measure of the health risks of swimming in contaminated waters. HTO submitted a comment letter in February 2015 outlining our concerns with some of the preliminary changes to the bacteria objectives proposed by State staff.



We will be continuing to monitor this as it develops and working to ensure that amendments protect the health of swimmers, surfers, and all people who go to the ocean for recreation.

STATEWIDE DESALINATION **AMENDMENT**

In April 2015, HTO sent a letter to the State Water Resources Control Board on its proposed regulations for desalination with our recommendations that this Amendment more aggressively address the risk that desalination poses to the full development of recycled water supplies. While State staff maintains that the regulations adequately addresses the issue, HTO remains vigilant on how the use



brine dilution in seawater desalination projects will hinder the development of recycled water supplies that are generally cheaper and more environmentally friendly than

DIRECT POTABLE REUSE EXPERT PANEL

This year we supported the City of Santa Barbara's statement to the State Water Resources Control Board that the severity of the drought necessitates a




more aggressive timeline for the completion of state standards for Direct Potable Reuse (DPR) - which would preclude current regulations on potable reuse that require the use of an environmental buffer and at least a 2 month retention time prior to final delivery to water customers. The SWRCB has convened an expert panel on the issue, and we don't think this panel is not moving fast enough in light of the times. Grant funding during California's drought highly prioritizes DPR, yet wastewater and water agencies don't know have standards by which to engineer wastewater plant upgrades to include DPR.

GAINING ON GROUNDWATER

Heal the Ocean has tackled contaminated groundwater sites since our inception. We have spent years identifying the particular contaminants, with our researchers pulling up data on old landfill sites as well as records of each monitoring well in the City of Santa Barbara. In 2013, we hired then-Cal Poly student Sarah Treadwell to help the Regional Water Board scan stacks of Santa Barbara County hazmat files on contaminated sites into the State's "Geotracker" database. The work by Sarah Treadwell – who was recently hired by the Regional Water Board as a full-time Engineering Geologist - has spearheaded the Regional Water Board project to produce a Priority List of contaminated sites in the City of

Santa Barbara.

HTO received this Priority List at the beginning of May 2015, and we are now researching how to access funding for cleaning up the sites that have been rated High on the list. Our big thanks go to Thea Tryon, Kristina Olmos, and Sarah Treadwell at the Regional Water Quality Control Board for working with us on this project,



and our gratitude goes as well to the Santa Barbara County Fire Department, which helped us get all of the hazmat information out of boxes and up to the Regional Board where it could be scanned into a computerized database.

In trying for a state Local Groundwater Assistance (LGA) grant in 2012, HTO had organized Regional Board staff (Tryon/Olmos) with former Santa Barbara County Fire Chief Michael Dyer and current County Fire Chief Eric Peterson, together with a Geosyntec consultant (Rob Almy) to initiate the project of transferring the data to the Regional Board so that all the information would be in a place where something could be done about the problem.

We didn't get the LGA grant, so we hired Sarah Treadwell to work with the Regional Board and proceeded with the work anyway. We now have our Priority List and the work goes on from here!





BAG HISTORY

In 2010, when HTO learned that Santa Barbara County, in trimming its budget, was considering dropping the \$23,000 price tag of stocking dog bag dispensers, we jumped into action with our Dog Bag Dispenser

program. We started by buying the Bio Bags ourselves, with volunteers stocking the dispensers. Finally we asked County Parks if its rangers could resume their stocking of dispensers, so that HTO could focus on the fundraising. In 2014, HTO was able to raise \$17,800 for non-plastic Bio

HTO Dog Dispenser Program raised \$17,800 in 2014 to send to the County for Bags, and we are already over \$10,000 in 2015!

Bags to stock the dispensers of Santa Barbara South County beaches, and with the arrival of AVS to our program, we were able to report to the County Board of Supervisors in April 2015 that we are already at the \$10,000 mark for 2015.

In 2014, our sponsors and contributors were able to fund 75% of the entire County Doggy Bag dispenser program!

This successful public-private partnership has protected the County program from a budget cut to the bags and helped clean up our beaches and trails since 2010.
