SoulCollage, an intuitive collage process for self-discovery, invites participants to create SoulCollage cards made of collaged magazine images. Each card provides an opportunity for prayer, introspection, and tapping into God's wisdom for the card's maker. Creative expression allows the exploration of deeper meaning in one's spiritual life. Journaling with the cards brings insight and awareness of God's presence in multiple areas of one's life. Participants will make SoulCollage cards, sit contemplatively with them, and journal with the cards using a variety of prompts including the "I Am One Who..." method.

The Episcopal Church is blessed with many buildings that are increasingly burdens to the parishes responsible for maintaining and operating them. Those same buildings though can be the heart of a vibrant missional program of serving the world God so loves as a community center and arts venue through partnering with non-profit and community-based organizations on a no-fee basis. This workshop will explore a vital alternative to "renting" building and, in the process, gaining connections and relationships in the wider community.

We will consider the practical dimensions of transitioning our buildings from bane to blessing. Templates for building use agreements, checklists, rationale, and publicity will be shared with permission to adapt for your situation. This approach, while challenging and risky in certain ways, allows a Christian faith community to maintain that identity over becoming a "landlord" or commercial property manager, selling space for cash. "Renting our building" has become a byword for churches for decades and in the process, often the church becomes the "renter" – at the mercy of the tenants. While there is no one-size-fits-all "correct" approach, this matter of missional identity will be part of the discussion.

The Importance of Lay Eucharistic Ministry in a Local Congregation in the Episcopal Church: The Role of LEM in the Church and Home

The Lay Eucharistic Ministry (LEM) has a dynamic role in every congregation in the Episcopal Church. This training will strengthen and build the vital clergy and lay leadership team in a local congregation. Countless stories tell us that the Lay Eucharistic Ministry inspired numerous individuals to become deacons and priests, as well as inspired them to be great leaders of the Church.

This training invites all interested lay leaders and parishioners to bring their spiritual gifts to the altar and enable them to serve Holy Communion during Sunday worship, at diocesan events, as well as to the sick and homebound at hospitals, assisted living facilities, and private homes.

Compassion in Practice: Practical Support for Those Helping Others

Many people who feel called to serve do so with individuals or groups who have experienced trauma, putting them in a position of experiencing secondary trauma. Although healing occurs in these spaces of deep listening and empathy, in feeling another

person's pain we often also experience it as if it is happening to us. How can the church respond to support people who are doing this work, often out of a sense of vocation? Compassion-based contemplative practices have been shown to support people in these roles, providing them with a way to process trauma, and gives them a specific way to invite the Sacred into this experience, which helps them and those they are serving.

This workshop will directly address the effects of serving those who have experienced trauma, which allows people to continue serving. It also provides a theological and spiritual frame for their service which in itself can provide support.

Social Enterprise for Sustainable Churches

In this workshop, we will do the following: (1) give an overview of what social enterprises and social enterpreneurship are; (2) show how churches and faith communities have engaged in social enterprise in order to create greater capacity for ministry and better sustain their communities and churches; (3) discuss what will be taught in the upcoming 2020 Social Enterprise Academy and how churches might benefit from participation; (4) field any questions folks might have about social enterprise.

The goal of this workshop and the goal of Episcopal Enterprises is to help faith communities develop earned-income strategies and social enterprises to create organizational sustainability and funding for new ministries and services for their communities. In achieving this goal, we aim to spark people's imaginations and engage them in conversations about innovative ways of "being church" today.

Preparing for Prayer Book Revision: Examining the Church's Process and Priorities

The Episcopal Church has entered a new season of liturgical renewal and revision designed to better equip the saints to minister to a world in need. This works begins in the gathered community as we articulate our shared identity and strengthen ourselves for ministry.

The General Convention of 2018 developed a charge for what this process of renewal and revision would need to address in order to effectively equip all Episcopalians for service to the world. This workshop will explore the central aspects of the resolution calling for liturgical renewal, addressing the hopes and dreams of those who are seeking to articulate a full, inclusive, welcoming vision of the nature of the church as it finds expression in our common prayer.

Topics to be discussed include translation issues and non-English liturgies, inclusive and expansive language in worship, a more robust expression of the centrality of baptism to our worship life, the need for recognizing creation and God the creator more intentionally in our worship, as well as the deep concerns of many that we not lose our most beloved Episcopal traditions and heritage. This workshop will also help people know how they can participate in the process of liturgical renewal from even these earliest days of the discussion.

Sharing Your Good News Online: Leveraging the Power of Blogs and Social Media

Your story is important, and communicating your story is an essential part of Digital Discipleship. This is a hands-on, actionable workshop, designed to get people inspired and going by providing instruction, new ideas, and best practices for how to effectively leverage blogging, Facebook, and Instagram to help share the Good News.

We'll explore social media platforms, how to build a great profile, scheduling and publishing posts, and more including:

- Techniques and best practices to get started...or get better
- Crafting catchy headlines and smart ledes
- Quick tips for using your smart phone to shoot pictures and video to enhance your posts
- Finding your online community and building an audience for your work

- Essential writing tips
- Beginning to plan an editorial calendar

Engaging Congregations in Gun Violence Prevention

The Diocesan Convention in 2015 adopted a resolution on gun violence prevention calling in part for, "continuing efforts to support and encourage...the collective work to end gun violence in our communities." Nevertheless, congregations are often reluctant to engage in gun violence prevention, believing that this issue is too political or too controversial. This workshop will help equip congregations for this work by:

- Discussing the barriers to congregational involvement, with ways to resolve these barriers
- Discussing the public health approach to gun violence prevention
- Presenting the materials developed by the Gun Violence Prevention Task Force of the Diocese of Los Angeles, providing a wide range of resources to help prevent all forms of gun violence.

LA Voice, a multi-racial, multi-faith community organization

This workshop helps participants develop an understanding and vision for faith-based community organizing in their congregational or community context. We will introduce frameworks, share stories, and hope to build on the great organizing already being done by many of the saints in the diocese.

This workshop will equip saints to serve through the ministry of community organizing which is designed to: (1) develop leadership of lay leaders and clergy in new ways; (2) create cultures of bridging across difference; and (3) confront power as it is currently arrayed so that we might create powerful efforts to win a better life for our people and all people in the region.

Accompanying Refugees, Asylum Seekers, and Migrants

This workshop will provide a basic overview of the work of IRIS: Interfaith Refugee and Immigration Service, the refugee and immigration ministry of the Diocese and of

Episcopal Migration Ministries (EMM). Over the last fifteen years IRIS has helped more than 10,000 refugee and immigrant families start new lives in Southern California. In the midst of the world's highest number of displace persons ever recorded, the United States is resettling the lowest umber of refugees in the history of the U.S. Resettlement Program. As the political ground for refuge shifts and forced global migration continues to rise, how is the Diocese responding and how can congregations get involved? Workshop attendees will leave with a basic understanding of refugees, asylum seekers, and migrants; how the Diocese and Episcopal Migration Ministries is supporting these vulnerable populations; and how to get involved. 'Know your rights' cards will be distributed to share with community members and those in attendance will have the opportunity to write a postcard sharing prayers and messages of encouragement to detained individuals seeking asylum. The workshop will be facilitated by Meghan Taylor, IRIS Executive Director and Immigration Attorney.

The Red Shirt Project: Making Relations with the Oglala/Lakota of the Pine Ridge Reservation

The Red Shirt Project, now in its 21st year, is an opportunity for young people ages 15-25 to experience community and empowerment and build relationships with a different culture. We travel to the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota, home of the Oglala and Lakota people. We work on projects that benefit the people of the village of Red Shirt, led by the Rev. Canon Robert Two Bulls of the Diocese of Minnesota and the Rev. Canon Michael Cunningham of the Diocese of Los Angeles.

In Isaiah we find a job description: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the things of the yoke. We are to share our bread with the hungry, bring the homeless poor into our houses. When we see the naked, we are to cover them and not hide from our own kin. The Red Shirt equips those on this journey to reflect, work hard, experience God in community, and trust the community that they build together.

Invitation and Hospitality: Ways to Help Your Congregation Grow

Central to Christ's call to the Church is the welcoming of new people into its worship, spiritual practice, ministry, and mission. Practical and creative ways to answer this call are critical in our era of declining membership and will be explored in depth.

This workshop will have two parts:

- (1) Invitation. Why Invitation is the best governing concept for efforts to increase congregational membership, as opposed to alternatives such as marketing and advertising. Practices that work and those that don't will be discussed.
- (2) Hospitality. Visitors and the curious are more likely to decide to continue to participate in a congregation's worship and activities if they feel comfortable and welcomed. Ways in which a congregation can offer this kind of hospitality will be explored and discussed.

Deacons: The Best Kept Secret in the Episcopal Church

Deacons can and do play a key role as we move ever more deeply into an understanding of baptismal ecclesiology, that we are all called as baptized Christians to leadership, evangelism, and service. This workshop will be helpful to all leaders and potential leaders in our diocese, especially those who might be discerning a call to the diaconate or those who will serve on lay discernment committees for those wondering about a call to Holy Orders.

This workshop will offer a lively discussion of the Sacred Order of Deacons, from their roots in the first century church through the present-day critical role of deacons in the emerging 21st century church. The workshop will carefully clarify the distinction between the vocation of priests and the vocation of deacons, emphasizing both the similarities and the differences. The importance of all orders (lay, diaconal, presbyterial, and episcopal) will be emphasized, with a discussion of the special relationship between deacons and bishops. The deacon's role in the liturgy will also be covered. The two presenters will reflect on their own calls to the diaconate, with time for comments and questions.

Discerning Call in Community: Exploring Vocations in Lay and Ordained Ministry

Words & Worship:

The Ongoing Work of Liturgical & Prayer Book Revision

General Convention has invited dioceses to talk about and collect liturgical materials to bring to the national conversation about new forms of worship, i.e., "Prayer Book revision." In this workshop, we will talk about the "why" and the "how" of these imagined changes as they are lived out in a parish context. We'll talk about how some churches have introduced changes and offer tools for undertaking this work in your congregation.

Liturgy is by definition, "the work of the people," and inviting as broad a cross-section as possible of the people into the conversations about how we craft the words of our worship – how we live as people of common prayer in a multi-cultural world – is part of how we go about that work.

Won't You Be My Neighbor: Conversation on Racism & Microaggressions

What is wrong with the "compliment," 'Your English is so good'? How about the questions, 'Where are you from?' and 'Where are you really from?'

Let's talk about racism (systems of inequality and dominance, not necessarily individual acts with ill intent) and microaggression (a statement, action, or incident regarded as an instance of indirect, subtle, or unintentional discrimination against members of a marginalized group such as a racial or ethnic minority) as a way forward to respect the dignity of every human being and to love our neighbors as ourselves.

This workshop will help the saints in our Diocese to serve others with an increased cultural mindfulness, to serve people in their parishes and neighborhoods across cultural and racial boundaries. This workshop seeks to increase culture awareness and understanding of cultural dynamics in relationships.

This is not a technical workshop -- we won't be talking (much) about F-stops or ISOs. The focus will be on making the most of the pictures you can get, whether on a fancy camera or a cell phone, and best practices for their use to tell your congregation's unique story.

Gospel Work and Sharing Gifts: The Unhidden Spiritual Essence of People with Disabilities

This workshop will give an overview of how the church has worked, viewed, and supported people with disabilities in the past. We will focus on how we as saints can serve persons with disabilities, prepare them for life, and support them in their walk with God.

This workshop will provide practical ideas on how to work with kids and adults with disabilities, as well as how to handle awkward encounters with people with disabilities.

Dr. Rodney Hume-Dawson has lived with a physical disability almost all his life, being paralyzed from the waist down after contracting polio as a child. He completed his Ph.D. in Education with emphasis on Disability Studies at Chapman University, and his intention, research, and teaching are mainly to educate people about disability and to help the world realize that disability is a human experience.

Church in Transition: Gift and Challenge

This workshop will offer an overview of the work of the Diocesan Office of Formation and Transition Ministry with emphasis on vocational discernment, clergy formation, and congregational transitions. The session will include a Q&A and directly address the concerns of those attending and offer resources for navigating the process of transition,

offering insight into the overall search process including profile development, portfolio construction, demographic research, and mutual ministry review, among others.

15 (or more!) Ways to Support the Christian Presence in the Holy Land

My Work To Do: Building Stamina for Discussing Internalized Dominance and Systems of Whiteness (Becoming Beloved Community Grant Recipient)

"I want to do something, but I don't know what to do."

This sentiment, expressed by a number of white acquaintances, mentees, colleagues, and friends to Suzanne Edwards-Acton about anti-racism, was the inspiration for My Work to Do, an online affinity group that invites those who may be feeling lost or overwhelmed into this important and complex conversation, especially those who might not have a local anti-racism program or accessible discussion happening in their life.

The affinity group meetings follow a Restorative Justice Model that emphasizes healing and learning through constructivist listening (deep listening without responding) and group process. The peace circle aims to repair the harm done by acknowledging the root of the problem, coming to an understanding of complicity, accepting responsibility, and beginning the process of racial restoration and reconciliation.

This workshop is a demo of the full five-part series of online/ZOOM sessions which emphasize the themes of housing discrimination, implicit bias, whiteness as a function, and systems of white supremacy — as well as "where do we go from here." The second series, a "Train the Facilitator" course, empowers participants to bring the affinity group to their own local communities, create a lasting impact and encourage churchwide learning, understanding and practical application for men and women throughout the United States.

Building Bridges Now: Practicing Respectful Dialogue

For over 20 years, Eric Law and the Kaleidoscope Institute have sought to build relationships across cultural and racial barriers by offering simple but significant tools for practices in different ministry settings. Building Bridges Now is the latest curriculum

designed to offer small groups and whole congregations the opportunity to listen and share around challenging topics in our culture and in our church. Come join us for a practical hour of listening and sharing using KI tools with one another.

Reimagining a Congregational LGBTQ+ Ministry



Participants will also learn to better understand the use of pronouns and why the subject of pronouns is essential to the LGBTQ+ community.
