30 Years Strong: Anniversary Year Paid Homage to the Past, Looks Forward to the Future

The Gift of Life Foundation is celebrating its 30th anniversary, and fiscal year 2017-2018 has been punctuated with exciting events, community activities, program growth, increased funding, and new partnerships that acknowledge our past and reflect our forward movement.

We were intentional in recognizing our founders, current and past leadership and employees, and all those who have played an important role in what we've achieved over the past 30 years. But 2018 also gave us the opportunity to set new goals, take on new challenges and look ahead.

Gift of Life in Montgomery is strong and getting stronger with the expansion of Nurse-Family Partnership in Montgomery, Russell and Macon counties as part of Governor Kay Ivey's Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative. There are also plans to expand to Autauga and Elmore counties in the near future.

Our Parents as Teachers program has now achieved full affiliate status with National PAT, an important step that not only helps open doors for potential funding, but builds confidence with our clients and the community that our program is meeting high-quality standards and utilizing best practices.

The Mobile Family Coaching and Fathers in Action programs will now provide education and support to parenting teens in the Montgomery Public School System. By working with this group, we hope to ensure that adolescent

Collectively, we have been awarded over \$925,000 in grants from the Department of Early Childhood Education, Alabama Department of Public Health and Public Charity Hospital Board, plus smaller funding to support safe sleep education, purchasing safety gates and portable cribs.

Gift of Life has changed the lives of the over 500 families that we touch, plus made a lasting impact on our community. We are extremely grateful to our major funders, HRSA Healthy Start, River Region United Way, Daniel Foundation and Children's Trust Fund that support our home visiting, mobile coaching and group coaching programs.

Helping our families overcome obstacles and achieve goals are at the heart of what we do. Their successes are counted among Gift of Life's greatest accomplishments. As we plan for 2019, we'll reflect on the milestones that are highlighted in this report and continue to build on the firm foundation laid 30 years ago by the founding board. Our focus remains on reducing infant mortality by improving the health and well being of at-risk families to build stronger communities.

Fresh New Look: New Website Offers Improved Experience for Users



PARENTS AS TEACHERS

The Real Deal: Parents As Teachers' full affiliate status enhances credibility

Gift of Life's Parents as Teachers Program (PAT) has achieved full affiliate status, an important step that will enhance the level of professional support and resources provided to GOL's family coaching programs.

In addition, GOL's PAT will now be recognized by National PAT as an evidence-based model provider. Program staff will have full access to the tools that can help increase program quality, professional development and research, and new innovations that can improve service to clients.

Other benefits of full affiliate status include:

- Greater access to funding available exclusively to evidence-based programs
- Access to advocacy support and research efforts



PAT offers Group Connections, a support group that gives moms and dads enrolled in our family programs an opportunity to share parenting experiences and receive parenting information. The sessions are required as a full affiliate.



The Parents as Teachers model is an evidence-based early childhood home visiting model that builds thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to learn. Central to the PAT model are 20 model fidelity requirements called Essential Requirements which cover affiliate leadership, staffing, services to families, and evaluation. To become a PAT affiliate, an organization must be designed to meet these Essential Requirements. Annually, affiliates report implementation and service data that is used to confirm that the affiliate is meeting or exceeding the minimum levels for each Essential Requirement.

- Discounted programs, awards and scholarships for staff; and
- Full consultation on model implementation

"We felt this was an important step because even though we have been using the PAT curriculum for a while, we weren't really getting all of the benefits that come with affiliate status," said GOL Executive Director Cheryl Davis. "Most grants require that our programs be evidenced-based, and affiliate status opens the door to additional funding opportunities that can support our work."

To become a full affiliate, GOL's PAT has to adhere to PAT's Essential Requirements, which included 20 elements designed to gauge an affiliate's capacity to serve, ability to solicit community engagement through an advisory group, its commitment to completing Foundation and Model Implementation trainings, conducting family-centered assessments, developing and documenting client goals, and perform child screenings, among others.

"Achieving affiliate status is a great thing, but maintaining it will be equally important," said Davis. "We want potential funders and the community to be confident that our family programs meet standards for program quality and that they are committed to continuous improvement.



Gift of Life Welcomes New Leadership, Staff to Parents as Teachers Program

Gift of Life welcomed new leadership and three new staff members to its Parents as Teachers Program. Ranging in levels of experience, the new hires have added depth and a fresh perspective to the PAT program and a strong desire to advance GOL's mission.

"I'm very pleased with our new team members," said Dr. Regina Traylor, who was also recently hired as GOL's new Assistant Director for Family Programs. Traylor played a lead role in selecting the PAT staff and says she believes the diversity of experiences by the staff will help them connect with clients.

"All of these professionals are bringing something unique to the table. Rickyna Smith was a former program participant, so she brings the prospective of someone who has actually experienced the program and can offer suggestions on how we can better meet the needs of our families," said Traylor.

"Denise Coulter has a degree in psychology, so when assessing a client's needs and looking at behavioral factors that are exerting influence in a mother's situation, she has that lens with which to help a client set goals and find solutions."

"Ratara Johnson is a recent social work graduate. Her view is fresh, optimistic and open. She is curious and has a passion to learn

Having Her Say: Mobile Family Coaching mom contributes to dialogue on issues affecting working moms and their families in national publication

FATHERS IN ACTION

Fatherhood Beyond Bars: GOL's FIA Program is helping incarcerated fathers create lasting bonds with their children.

Pathers in Action introduced a new program that gives incarcerated fathers serving time at the Montgomery City Jail the tools and education they need to reconnect with their children. Fatherhood Family Coach Jessie Yates has created a group coaching program using the 24/7 Dad curriculum that shows fathers how to build a positive relationship with their child, challenges negative mindsets that might have contributed to their incarceration and works to break the cycle of recidivism by developing pro-fathering attitudes, knowledge, and skills, along with strategies to prepare fathers for release. The sessions are generally about two hours in length and provide a safe environment for inmates to explore what it means to be a father, share their life experiences, confront unresolved issues, and learn from other participants. Yates, who has a background in counseling and corrections, said the program has been well-received by jail administrators and the inmates have been eager to receive the support it provides. The program currently serves 20 men and plans are being explored



to add additional sessions. "Many of the men in my group didn't have an involved father, in fact, most of the participants had fathers who were incarcerated," said Yates. "They need to know that a father's involvement is critical to the physical and emotional health of their child. It's all about shifting their mindset and giving them tools to interrupt that generational cycle of incarceration, so it doesn't continue with their child," he said.

Gift of Life's Fathers in Action and Community Action Network (CAN) partnered with Alabama State University to present the Fathers Matter Men's Health and Fatherhood Summit on June 9, 2018 at the new ASU Hornet Stadium. About 50 men attended the event which offered free health and wellness screenings provided by area health providers; employment resources; family and community programs offered by the public school system, two and four-year colleges, Family Guidance Center of Alabama, and area churches. The summit included conversations on chronic illness prevention and the importance of father involvement led by Eilene Knott, Wellness Coalition; Dr. David Cawley, Dental Concepts, LLC; and motivational speaker and pastor K.K. Middleton. Attorney Virgil Ford also answered questions about a father's parental rights, child support, and visitation.

NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP

Crushing Goals: GOL's Nurse-Family Partnership receives national recognition through piloting an innovative new app for moms

Gift of Life's Nurse-Family Partnership was recognized at NFP's National Symposium in Denver, CO in September as one of top five NFP sites in the nation to be selected to pilot NFP and Hopelab's new Goal Mama app. GOL's NFP was selected due to its nationally recognized high client retention rate based on the importance of goal setting with clients. Goal Mama, which has been in development since 2016, is the result of extensive co-design sessions with nurses, program participants and NFP leadership. Nurse Home Visitor Kathy Pounds helped play an important role as a member of NFP's Innovation Advisory Committee in developing the app.

Goal Mama's aim is to increase program retention by creating a mobile app and companion nurse dashboard that moms and nurses use together to set, track, and reach moms' goal. It also has practical applications, too, like visit reminders, a daily nudge feature that helps moms build better habits, and topic lists that help moms explore articles about pregnancy and early motherhood. The app is exclusively for moms enrolled in NFP.



Currently, there are 25 Gift of Life moms using the Goal Mama app.




Effective Management: GOL's Compliance & Quality Improvement Department measure outcomes to ensure programs and services are meeting clients needs and grant requirements.




Strengthen Family Resilience
