




ork. Play. Live. That was Julie Couch's mantra as she conceptualized the interior design of her client's 7,000-square-foot home in West Nashville. The homeowner, a busy career woman and mother of three active middle schoolers, worked in tandem with Couch throughout the design process to assemble a series of family-friendly spaces that are cohesive and causal yet irrefutably chic. This wasn't the duo's first foray together they previously collaborated 10 years ago on the client's former home just less than one mile away.

"The last house was beautiful, but very different," says Couch. "It was older and more formal with a traditional feel and lots of earth tones. So, when my client decided to build, she wanted a total departure. That said, we didn't completely start over from scratch. We used several of her existing pieces and revived them with new fabrics and paint finishes.

You could call it a refresh."

Taking cues from the bones of the home designed in 2016 by architects Jamie Pfeffer and Jonathan Torode, Couch cultivated an aesthetic that reflected the style of the structure and, more importantly, the lifestyle of those who live inside. Flooring comprised of white oak and gray Ashlar concrete pavers lay a forgiving foundation for muddy footprints tracked in from a backyard barbeque, as well as scuffmarks from stilettos left behind after an elegant grown-up affair. Towering 10-foot ceilings and expansive banks of windows and French doors are fortified with aluminum-clad framing with subtle ceiling and wall applications, like exposed beams and vertical paneling, adding to the strength of character.

Cool whites, grays, and taupes offer a soothing backdrop for these architectural elements and convey a sense of continuity among the generously proportioned spaces that comprise the open concept floor plan. Metallic finishes—from burnished bronze to shiny brass—are thread throughout for a hint of glam along with luxe layers of textiles. Sprawling carpets in striking patterns impart warmth and define intimate conversation zones, while voluminous drapes in sumptuous velvets and linens call the eye down to a more human level. Rich in texture but soft in color, sofas and chairs are slipcovered and upholstered in high-performance fabrics making them approachable and inviting for all ages and occasions. Gently curved backs, arms, and seats relax the more rigid lines of the tables and case pieces that stand among them. Although many of these simple silhouettes are rooted in tradition, their amplified scale offers modern appeal and does double duty to maximize comfort and visual impact.

"It's all about maintaining functionality and balance," says Couch. "It was important for us to choose furniture that is hardworking but easy on the eye and to the touch. Because my client and I both love a good mix, we sprinkled a few antique and vintage finds among the contemporary accents and artwork. The result is a look that is calm, collected, and anything but contrived."

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
