Science explore the final frontier in World Space Week


World Space Week

STATE OF THE PARTY OF THE PARTY

Everyone involved with the current and future of Les Quennevais School were delighted to learn that the planning application for a new school was passed on 19th October. The new 5400 square metre building will be situated on the land to the north of St Brelades Social Club and opposite the airport football pitches. It has been designed to provide the cutting edge, modern facilities needed to deliver a 21st Century curriculum to up to 850 students.

The school has worked closely with the design team to create an outstanding layout to meet the learning needs of its students. Highlights include; a separate sports centre to include a sports hall, dance studio, trampoline space, changing areas, an external all weather multi-use games area, netball, football/rugby pitches and a grass running track. Internally, alongside naturally lit classrooms containing media walls that allow engaging and clear presentation of knowledge to students, the school boasts a central street leading to subject areas designed to meet the modern demands of lessons and extra-curricular activities.

These include an immersive zone with interactive walls and floors, IT suites and mobile technology to make use of the hi speed wifi network, a lecture theatre (hypothesis room) for more traditional presentations and demonstrations to students, creative arts and technology spaces to house the latest industry standard equipment and machinery. The layout has been specifically designed to allow physically impaired students to access all areas with ease and a range of exciting social areas are provided to cater for large whole year groups through to small friendship groups.

Head teacher, Mrs Hague was extremely happy to be present when the decision was unanimously passed by the planning panel and stated that she and her team are very excited that the much needed replacement of the existing building is finally going to get underway. 'This is a momentous day for the education of young people in the west of the island. This investment in their future has been long overdue but the anticipation of what we will be able to achieve in a purpose built environment that will be the envy of all schools is hugely exciting. The support we have received from parents and students, both current and past, and all those involved in the project has been overwhelming and we look forward to the building taking shape and moving in in September 2020.

A very busy term for PSHE...

This term has been a busy one for PSHE at the school. PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education) is a very important part of our curriculum at Les Quennevais School, and we are in the process of changing and updating our curriculum and schemes of learning to better reflect the challenges faced by young people today. These range from coping with the pressures of social media to anti-bullying and wellbeing right through to completing applications for further study at Highlands or Hautlieu.

In September, we began a unit with Year 9 where we introduced the basics of First Aid and the students responded with enthusiasm and maturity, learning what to do if the worst happens and they are faced with helping someone in need. Trainers from St John's Ambulance led many of the sessions and we are hoping to compete in the First Aid competition held in the Spring term where teams are marked on their response to a staged situation.

In October, we welcomed a number of visitors to the school, beginning with the Christian band, Brightline, who rocked the school at lunchtime but also did a lot of workshops to year 7, 8, 9 and KS4 based on self-esteem and faith. The students loved the music and welcomed the opportunity to discuss faith and religion.

One boy remarked, 'The band had a Christian point of view which was different but it was good to have another point of view of things.' Another girl remarked, 'It was an amazing experience.

They are so talented and I have started listening to their music on Spotify. They inspire people to be kind to others.' And another student said, 'It made me realise how we are all important and individual in our own way. It made me realise that your self-esteem and self-image are really important and can link to depression.'

In the same week, we also welcomed Coppafeel to the school to talk to Year 10 about checking for lumps and breast cancer. Many boys were surprised to learn that it can happen to men as well, and hopefully the message was clear that regular checks can really save your life!

You may have seen a lot in the media about the play 'Chelsea's Choice' that came to Jersey in October to present a play based on the true story of a young girl who was groomed by an older man and later became trapped in a cycle of abuse and prostitution. Our Year 9 watched it and were very affected by the issues raised about what makes a healthy relationship and how the grooming cycle can manifest itself in many ways. One boy remarked that the play had taught him 'that these things can happen in Jersey as well.'

We also invited in the team from Prison Me No Way who work with Year 8 every year and give us a taste of life in prison, as well as highlighting issues such as underage drinking and anti-social behaviour. The Year 8 students were exemplary and overwhelmingly positive about the whole day. PC Phillip Blake has come in to work with Year 7 on road safety: an important topic with Winter drawing in, and Dave Barron from PMNW is currently doing sessions with Year 7 and assemblies with Year 8 on Internet safety.

Love Theatre have also been in to present 'Too Much Punch For Judy'- a play about the dangers of drink driving which is presented annually to Year 11 students across the island. It is a hard-hitting and important piece of theatre and the fact that it was a true story really hit home for our students. One Year 11 said, 'I have always been against Drink Driving but this has really made me realise the cost of a stupid mistake. I will never drink and drive.'

Finally, we have also had really useful sessions from the Jersey Financial Services Commission and Trading Standards Jersey with Years 7 and 9. We recently welcomed a panel of visitors to work with our Year 10s on their Business Enterprise ventures in readiness for the Christmas Fayre, which was held for the customers: KS3 students! The Year 10 worked outstandingly well with the panel, who comprised of a range of different people from the Jersey Consumer Council, to Jersey Business and Jersey Enterprise. They finished the morning by pitching their ideas to the panel and we received very positive feedback about the effort and teamwork our students displayed.

Student Parliament is in motion

It's been a busy term at Les Quennevais School and we have found ourselves involved with lots of discussions and ideas from the School Parliament.

During our first half-term, all Year Councils were formed which means we have representation of Student Voice across all Year groups. During this time we discussed and reviewed the various innovations that had been introduced last academic year including traffic flow around the school, lesson routines and lunch times. In total 70 students from Year 7-11 have voiced their opinion and completed surveys to give their feedback.

The new split-lunch seemed to be the most popular innovation amongst the Parliament with a large proportion feeling that previously, lunch times had been a bit congested with too many bodies in the school at one time. With the new split-lunch system, students feel happy in their environment with one student stating "I now feel more focused to go back into my afternoon lessons."


Students also like and have responded positively to the new 50 minute lesson time slots, rather than one hour lesson times. Students feel that activities are short and pacey allowing them to really make the most of their lesson time. Other innovation responses and ideas were discussed and fedback to Mrs Hague.

Year 7 and 8 Student Council groups met during the first two weeks of this term to discuss the idea of anti-bullying and the various forms this can take. All students discussed that the atmosphere at Les Quennevais was very friendly and all knew and felt that they had staff who they could talk to and discuss if there were any issues.

On 3rd November, Catherine Gavey from Jersey Youth who runs Duke of Edinburgh scheme for the Jersey Youth Project visited the school to pitch the Duke of Edinburgh Award to our Council reps, which was then taken back to inform tutor groups. In total 48 Council reps were engaged with this presentation. There are now 28 students (All Year 9 and 10) who have preliminary signed up and will begin the DofE Bronze award in January, eventually achieving this in June. Paul Redshaw the Operations Manager for the South East of UK will be visiting the school on the 12th December to meet these 28 students and register them on the online DofE system to track their progress through the award.

Students across the school have also been donating food to make up hampers for Age Concern Jersey. This has been a successful project which will make a huge impact in our local community.


Mr Jones, Head of Art

Each year, for the two transition days, we plan a very special learning experience for our newest recruits to Les Quennevais. These two days set the scene for the experience we want our students to have day in, day out. These days light fires of curiosity and imagination but also instil the expectations of excellence we want to see from our students.

We have a range of subjects who get involved each year where students get to taste a variety of lessons through the lens of the seashore. These are some of the experiences students have had over the past few years.



- In English, students use the experience of our immersive space to explore some powerful literature inspired by the sea.
- In science, students conduct a series of experiments to explore how wetsuits work, what sand and seaweed really looks like under a microscope and solve a rock pool mystery using chromatography.
- In French, students learn how to describe a beach scene and play interactive games to learn new words.
- In History, students explore a timeline of St Aubins harbour- from the Vikings to the Nazis, working with Jersey Heritage as well as our staff.
- In maths, students create graphs to explore a section of a beach and get to grips with Numeracy Ninjas.
- In art, students learn how to create abstract responses to the sea as well as looking at how the sea has inspired artists throughout history.
- In geography, students look at why Jersey is the shape it is and understand how to create a field sketch from the sand dunes.
- In design, students explore a range of design movements and create a design for a lifeguard station.







From these inspiring lesson experiences, students are given guidance on how to take this learning further over the summer break. We have an exhibition day in September where we take over the main corridor and gallery space of the school for a couple of days for an enthralling display of the work. Each year, the exhibition gets better and better. We've had blogs about the geology of Jersey, a study of coastal bird migration, beautiful poems carved into driftwood, songs of the sea written, produced and recorded, light sculptures inspired by sea creatures, working wave machines, beautiful paintings and extraordinary historical explorations of Jersey's coastal existence. The variety and quality never ceases to amaze us and provides a powerful reminder of the enthusiasm, dedication and exceptional ability of our youngest students.

During the exhibition day, students get an opportunity to comment on each other's work. We invite parents and their primary school teachers to come and have a look at the stunning work on display. We recognise students achievement with a range of subject specific awards as well as effort and creativity. There are a small number of headteachers award certificates for students who are singled out for an exceptional creative response to the beach combing project by Mrs Hague. The certificates and feedback provide a great source of initial evidence for students Year 7 baccalaureate award.



Geographers field trippin'

This term the year 11 Geographers have been undertaking their fieldwork in preparation for their examinations. We have visited St

Brelade's Bay to investigate the impacts of coastal management on coastal processes and St Helier town centre to investigate accessibility for shoppers. The



students were a testament to the school and showed themselves to be young geographers in the making. Students carried out a range of fieldwork techniques including, beach profiling, rock sampling, traffic and pedestrians counts and interviewing a Senior Planner for the Environmental Department who commented on their professionalism.

Students have developed a wide range of skills whilst undertaking their fieldwork, both in and out of the classroom. These include team

work, communication, analysis, decision making and evaluation, all accolades of the ambitious student. As aforementioned, the fieldwork will be assessed within their examinations and as a

department we are expecting a high standard of outcome, with all the hard work that the department and the students have put in. On a final note, Geography students in Year 10 have been offered the opportunity to visit Cumbria for six days to undertake their fieldwork which will prove to be a memorable and enjoyable learning experience. Students debate peace in states chamber

We were given the opportunity to attend and present at the 4th Rotary Student Debate on Peace on Friday 10th November at the States' Chamber.

Our Year 11 Debate Team, Joel Turner, Gabrielle Le Clezio, Ayisha Audrain, Toby Ritzema, Grace Burnouf, Emily Blake and Kiah Kuppe worked hard for weeks, researching and constructing a speech about the stigmas surrounding disability on our island. Our team decided to ask whether mental health in teenagers was taken seriously, what the problems were and possible solutions to these.

The event was opened by the Lieutenant-Governor, Air Chief Marshal Sir Stephen Dalton. When at the States Chambers, each school who attended gave a speech on the given topic and the platform was then opened up to other schools to question the group on their speech.

The Les Quennevais speakers, Grace Burnouf and Emily Blake presented with eloquence and passion. Grace Burnouf argued that social media was fuelling a mental health crisis and that more tolerance was needed for mental health conditions in society.

'The British stiff upper lip is no longer acceptable or advisable in the modern world,' she said. 'People in Jersey see counselling as a taboo, something to be ashamed of. As an island community we need to accept and normalise counselling, just as they do in the US.'

Gabrielle and Ayisha questioned other schools on motions such as Beaulieu School's about whether more focus on mental health would exacerbate the problem.

After summing up the debate, Senator Paul Routier invited the Assembly of Students to vote on the proposition 'Do you consider that more needs to be done by government and by the Island community to ensure that those with mental health challenges or suffering from conditions such as autism, are not disadvantaged, and that the stigma around mental health and physical disability issues in Jersey society is reduced?'

The proposition was accepted, with 27 students voting for the motion, one voting against and six abstaining.
