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Accessibility

30 minutes

This course discusses accessibility in the workplace, utilizing case studies from the Museum of Science, Boston for further understanding. Four main topics are covered: disability etiquette, legal requirements, accommodations, and accessibility and inclusion.

Adult and Child CPR

1 hour

This course is designed to teach participants how to properly perform Adult and Child CPR. Participants will learn important definitions, hazards and symptoms to look out for, as well as the proper way to perform the Heimlich maneuver.

After School Improvement Series: Emergency Action Plans

30 minutes

Like all other early childhood and school-age settings, after school programs need to consider how they prepare for and respond to emergency situations, from natural disasters, like storms, earthquakes, tornados, flash floods, or volcanic eruptions; fires; power outages; missing children; or acts of violence, including active shooter situations. Some emergency situations may require evacuation, while others may initiate a lock down, or shelter-in-place. The best way to prepare for emergency situations is to plan for them. We can do this by considering the kinds of emergency situations we might encounter, and then developing a series of procedures and protocols for responding to them. Your program's Emergency Action Plan sets out your role and responsibilities should any of these emergencies occur.

After School Improvement Series: Indoor Environments

30 minutes

This webinar will discuss the role a well-planned indoor environment plays in supporting the developmental needs of school-age children. It will talk about the use of interest areas as tools for creating an indoor

environment that supports children's interests and developmental needs. In addition, we'll learn how to plan indoor environments that are warm and inviting, help children feel welcome and comfortable and will allow them to participate in different activity areas at the same time without disturbing one another. And finally, we'll discuss the role a well-planned indoor environment plays in keeping children safe and engaged.

After School Improvement Series: Outdoor Environments

30 minutes

The After School Improvement Series: Outdoor Environments course will describe different types of outdoor environments, along with the opportunities and challenges each one offers; discuss the role outdoor environments play in encouraging children to be active, while promoting a range of different experiences; identify the steps you can take to ensure that the outdoor environment is safe and accessible for all children; explore how outdoor environments can be used to extend learning opportunities found in indoor environments.

American Heart Association Emergency First Aid

1 hour

It's important to improve the safety of your workers by training them in First Aid, CPR, and AED. In this course, participants will learn some first aid basics, how to provide First Aid for some medical, injury, and environmental injuries, and how to provide CPR and use an AED. Participants will also learn training options that are available to them through the American Heart Association to get their employees trained.

Americans With Disabilities Act and Transition Plans

1 hour

Do Title II and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act apply to you? Do you work for a non-profit or for-profit zoo, aquarium, or museum? Is your zoo, aquarium, or museum operated by your state or local government? Do you have a Transition Plan or

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Barrier Removal Plan for your organization? Do you know that the Justice Department or your State's Attorney's Office could sue your organization if you are not in compliance? Fines can cost an organization \$55,000 plus compensation just for an initial infraction. This comprehensive webinar will discuss the development of a plan, examples of that plan, common accessibility issues, and an overview of what to look for in your policies and procedures that could cause an accessibility issue.

Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)

15 minutes

The purpose of this course is to educate parents, schools, health professionals and the community about evidence-based assessment and treatment for ADHD. Participants will learn about ADHD and its features, etiological factors, evidence-based assessment and treatment, and professional practice parameters.

Autism and Bullying: A Specialist Module for Schools and the Wider Children's Workforce

15 minutes

The course is designed to give participants an understanding of autism and Autism Spectrum Conditions, as well as bullying in the context of autism. Participants will learn a greater understanding of ways to support children with autism in the context of school bullying. By the end they will have an awareness of some anti-bullying interventions that can be implemented in a school setting and feel more able to identify and tackle bullying of children with autism.

Basic First Aid

30 minutes

This course is designed to give participants the skills they need to perform basic first aid for a wide range of injuries and sudden illnesses. Some topics covered include; the chain of survival, initial assessment, and how to properly bandage and dress wounds. By the end of this course participants will have learned proper first aid for bleeding, shock, burns, choking, fractures, heart attacks, and much more.

Become an Energenius®

1 hour

CalSAC has partnered with the Pacific Gas & Electric Company (PG&E) to bring the Energenius® Out-of-School Time Program to our online training platform. This FREE environmental stewardship curriculum is designed to engage children and youth to think about how they use energy, how energy is measured, paid for, and ways to save energy. Children and youth will understand how they can help reduce the impacts of energy use and production on the environment, and also practice influencing others to take energy-saving actions. Additionally, the curriculum is uniquely and intentionally designed to engage families in energy and water conservation habits.

Bed Bug Protection Tips

15 minutes

Bed bugs don't play favorites, anyone can get them. This course helps participants understand the characteristics of bed bugs, what the health risks are, basic inspection tips, and prevention tips for the home, field, and office.

Bloodborne Pathogens and HIV (PS)

45 minutes

In this course, you will learn about the characteristics of bloodborne pathogens, diseases caused by these pathogens, such as HIV, and how they are transmitted. You will also learn the elements of an exposure control plan and how to prevent contact with or infection from contaminated body fluids. In addition, you will learn how to handle exposure incidents involving blood, and the signs, labels, and color-coding used to warn of biohazards and bloodborne pathogens. This training is provided to help employers provide a safe and healthful work environment for their employees and minimize the possibility of employee exposure to bloodborne pathogens.

Bringing the Full Power of Science to Bear on Drug Abuse & Addiction

30 minutes

The National Institute on Drug Abuse's (NIDA) mission is to lead the nation in bringing the power of science to bear on drug abuse and addiction. Recent scientific advances

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have revolutionized our understanding of drug abuse and addiction, which is now recognized as a chronic relapsing brain disease expressed in the form of compulsive behaviors. This understanding has improved our ability to both prevent and treat addiction. This course will teach participants the effects of drug abuse and how we can help prevent it.

Building Relationships with Children and Youth

1 hour

An environment that fosters positive relationships between children, youth and adults is critical to creating a high quality program. This course supports participants in exploring how to build positive, meaningful relationships with children and youth, in order to plan programs that best meet their needs.

Building Relationships with School Personnel

30 minutes

School-age programs and schools share a mutual goal of supporting the growth, development, and learning of school-age children. Over 50% of all school-age programs nation-wide are housed in school facilities. When school-age programs are housed in school facilities, it is essential for staff in school-age programs to establish and maintain a positive relationship with school personnel. This makes it possible for schools and programs to work together to support the needs of the whole child. Staff can develop successful partnerships with school personnel by cultivating an understanding of the needs, interests, and goals of school personnel and using effective strategies, tools, and systems to build a spirit of positive collaboration and communication.

Child Abuse Prevention and Awareness

90 minutes

Unfortunately, child abuse is a prevalent issue in today's world. Child care workers and volunteers, coaches, and others who work with children must be knowledgeable about the topic to ensure children's safety. This course will make you aware of the many issues related to child abuse and help you recognize and prevent child abuse within and outside of program walls. It offers advice about how to respond to a child who divulges abusive

information and what to do with this information. As someone who works with children you will learn how to protect the child, your organization, and yourself from accusations of abuse.

Child Abuse Prevention and Awareness for Supervisors and Managers

90 minutes

If a staff member or volunteer in a child-related program approaches his or her supervisor with a case of suspected child abuse the supervisor must know how to handle the situation to ensure the safety of everyone in the program. This course provides supervisors with a wealth of information about how to recognize and prevent child abuse within program walls, and furthermore, the steps to take when a situation of child abuse arises. In addition, you will learn best practices for yourself, your staff and your organization.

Coaching with Head and Heart

45 minutes

Leaders and managers need strategies to support others in their own growth and development. In this course, participants will be introduced to a coaching process that supports individuals to make more conscious decisions, build off their strengths and internal resources and take new action. Participants will understand when coaching is needed, the mindset required, and the critical skills needed for effective coaching, including deep listening and inquiry.

Coming to America: Understanding the Immigration Process

30 minutes

Immigrants come to this country under varying circumstances, and their journey and immigration status effect how they live and adjust to life in the U.S. This informational course is designed for participants learn more about the immigration experience and process children, youth, and their families in their OST programs have gone through in order to come to the United States. Since many of our English Learners are immigrants or children of immigrants, it is important for us to understand the circumstances and contexts under which these children, youth, and families are living.

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Commitment to Quality in School-Age Programs

30 minutes

School-age child care programs were prevalent during World War II. Many mothers worked outside the home to support the war effort and needed care for their children. When the war ended, school-age childcare programs disappeared almost overnight as mother chose to stay at home. School-age programs emerged again in the late 1960s in response to the vast numbers of mothers across the nation who were re-entering the workforce. National surveys in the 1970s indicated that at least two-thirds of mothers with school-age children were again employed outside the home. The divorce rate was increasing, as well as the number of households headed by a single parent. As a result, many elementary school children spent hours alone from 3:00 PM to 6:00 PM when school was out. Clearly, there was a growing need for out-of-school support services for school-age children. In the 1970s, programs were commonly known as school-age childcare or extended day programs. By the mid 1970s, childcare advocates also emphasized the importance of providing quality programs. Childcare advocates, parents, educators, public policy experts, and representatives from a wide variety of childcare and community organizations began a national dialogue to explore and identify the components of quality school-age childcare services. Today, national, state, and local organizations are working to educate the public about quality school-age childcare services and to assist school-age childcare professionals achieve quality programming in their communities. It is essential for today's school-age professionals to be aware of the national and state organizations, research, and practices that focus on the development of quality school-age childcare programs.

Communicating with Families

1 hour

Communication and positive relationships with families improve when program staff recognize family members as partners. Staff can benefit from acknowledging their feelings about families and identifying how these feelings help or hinder working with families. This course provides participants the opportunity to identify their attitudes towards families, consider how their attitudes can enhance or detract from their ability to develop positive relationships with families, and examine how

a programs overall environment supports strong staff-family communication.

Community Resource Mapping

15 minutes

English Learner families can often benefit from accessing low-cost/free services such as legal services, English classes, food banks etc. Afterschool Programs often do not have the resources to provide all of the services that they would like to provide to English Learners and their families. This course serves as a compliment to Healthy Cultural Identities and Engaging Families and Communities, an in-person training offered through CaISAC's English Learner Training and Professional Development Project. This online course can also be used by a wide audience to help participants engage with an example of what Community Resource Mapping looks like.

Creating a Quality Summer Program

1 hour

CaISAC partnered with the Summer Matters campaign to create our Quality Summer Program training series. Summer months bring unique opportunities for learning outside the traditional school year and walls. High quality summer learning programs change students' lives for the better with an opportunity to improve their academic achievement and readiness to learn. Developing quality programs requires intentional, ongoing development. Engage in activities that will help identify and strengthen the quality of your summer learning program. Creating a Quality Summer Program is the first module in the Quality Summer Programming Training series. In this module, participants will learn about the importance of high quality summer learning programs for youth, elements of high-quality summer programs and effective tools to guide programs in their ongoing development of quality programming.

Creating a Safe and Respectful Environment for Our Nation's Children and Youth

2 hours

This course is divided into two sections: Understanding and Intervening in Bullying Behavior and Creating a Supportive Classroom or Program Climate. The first section,

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Understanding and Intervening in Bullying Behavior, is designed to teach learners how to reduce the instances of bullying behavior within their classrooms or programs. The second part, Creating a Supportive Classroom or Program Climate, instructs about how to successfully address and reduce bullying in classrooms or programs, while creating an environment that enhances youth learning and their experiences.

Creating a Safety Program

45 minutes

This course covers how to create a safety program for your business including topics on management, leadership, employee involvement, worksite analysis, hazard prevention and control, safety, health training, and education.

Creating an Inclusive Program

1 hour

With planning, training, and support, program staff can successfully include many children with special needs. Program staff must develop the skills necessary to assess the environment, materials, equipment, and activities to make the necessary modifications and accommodations so that all children and youth in their programs are successful. During this course, participants will discuss the law regarding inclusion as well as the attitude and reasonable accommodations needed to create an inclusive environment for children and youth with special needs.

Creating and Maintaining Healthy School-Age Environments

15 minutes

Keeping school-age children healthy is a major priority for school-age programs. This requires giving careful attention to setting up the environment in a way that promotes healthy habits, and using effective strategies for monitoring and maintaining a hygienic environment. Because school-age children are growing towards independence, it is also important to help them develop habits and behaviors for living a healthy lifestyle.

Creating and Maintaining Safe School-Age

Environments

30 minutes

Keeping school-age children safe during out-of-school hours is a top priority for school-age programs. This requires giving careful attention to setting up the program environment in a way that promotes safety, and using effective strategies for monitoring and maintaining a safe environment. Because school-age children are growing towards independence, it is also important for staff to help them develop habits and behaviors that will keep them safe from harm as they participate in program experiences. Promoting and protecting children's safety is one of the major responsibilities of staff in school-age programs.

Creating and Managing Budgets in School-Age Programs

30 minutes

When program budgets are developed through a careful, step-by-step process, they become valuable planning tools. By using effective budget planning tools and strategies, school-age care professionals can make realistic projections about the program's financial stability, and design strategies for generating and allocating resources to support the program's vision and mission. It is important for school-age care professionals to understand that the budget process is ongoing. It involves linking financial goals to program goals, identifying program priorities, allocating resources effectively, using reliable methods for calculating potential expenses and revenues, monitoring performance against projections made, and making needed changes and adjustments for the future.

Creating Community Collaborations

45 minutes

Across the country, more and more communities are forming community collaborations to address the out-of-school needs of children and youth of all ages. When different segments of the community join together, share ideas, and pool their resources and efforts to create out-of-school time initiatives, children and youth benefit. What one organization or program may not be able to accomplish alone is often achievable when partnerships and collaborations among diverse groups and individu-

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als are formed. When school-age care professionals are knowledgeable about what it takes to create and sustain successful collaborations, they can play an important leadership role in creating out-of-school time initiatives and programs that will meet the needs of children and youth in their communities now and in the future.

Creating Respect and Safety

1 hour

Out-of-school time programs provide a safe space for children and youth, both physically and emotionally. Staff need to understand how to create safe environments to ensure that children and youth feel safe in order to fully participate in the program. This course will provide participants the opportunity to explore their own relationship to safety and support, set group agreements for the series, and discover their FRAME.

Creating Successful Clubs, Special Events, and Field Trips in School-Age Programs

45 minutes

Children who regularly attend school-age programs need many opportunities to participate in activities that help them connect with their communities and work together to build on their interests, talents, and abilities. Clubs, special events, and field trips are ideal vehicles for providing these opportunities. When staff know how to work with children to plan and implement these activities, children develop a sense of program ownership that helps them become productively engaged in a variety of meaningful activities that support their development.

Cultural Competence: Identity, Diversity and Engagement

1 hour

Many programs engage children, youth, families, and staff from diverse cultural backgrounds. In order to best serve their community, out-of-school time program staff need to develop the vocabulary and skills to engage with people from different cultures. During this course, participants will explore how culture can impact and shape individuals, examine their own cultural identities and how these identities may impact their interactions with others, and levels of engagement with diverse groups.

Current Trends and Issues in Out-of-School Time Programs: Funding & Support

15 minutes

It is important for school-age care professionals to understand how the field has developed since its inception, and to be knowledgeable about the current status of the field of school-age care. With this knowledge and understanding, it is possible for school-age care professionals to participate in shaping the field as it grows in the future. In this course, we will explore funding and support issues in out-of-school time programs.

Current Trends and Issues in Out-of-School Time Programs: Growth & Change

15 minutes

It is important for school-age care professionals to understand how the field has developed since its inception, and to be knowledgeable about the current status of the field of school-age care. With this knowledge and understanding, it is possible for school-age care professionals to participate in shaping the field as it grows in the future. In this course, we will explore growth and change in out-of-school time programs.

Current Trends and Issues in Out-of-School Time Programs: Needs & Benefits

30 minutes

It is important for school-age care professionals to understand how the field has developed since its inception, and to be knowledgeable about the current status of the field of school-age care. With this knowledge and understanding, it is possible for school-age care professionals to participate in shaping the field as it grows in the future. In this course, we will explore needs and benefits in out-of-school time programs.

Cyberbullying

1 hour

In this course, you will: Learn the definition of cyberbullying, discover tactics on preventing cyberbullying, find tips for parents and teachers as well as how to report instances of cyberbullying.

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Designing Effective Indoor Play and Learning Environments for School-Age Programs

30 minutes

Planning effective environments is the first step to planning an effective program. When environments are attractive, interesting, and comfortable, they provide a backdrop for a varied program that can address the developmental needs of school-age children. The look and feel of well-planned environments send messages that let children know they are welcome and valued. They are inviting and encourage children to get involved and stay engaged with program activities and experiences.

Developing Activities That Encourage Creativity and Cognitive Development

1 hour

Children who regularly attend school-age programs need many opportunities to engage in activities that will help them develop their creative potential and apply their emerging thinking abilities and skills. To support children's needs, it is essential for school-age staff to understand the creative process, and the relationship of cognitive development to creativity. With this knowledge and understanding, staff can design and implement a program that encourages a sense of wonder as children explore their environment, fosters creative imagination, and enhances children's ability to apply reasoning skills appropriately as they develop ideas and encounter challenges, problems, and opportunities.

Developing Activities That Support Character Development and Promote Social Interaction

30 minutes

School-age programs can provide children with many opportunities to work on character development. Staff who are knowledgeable about character development can create program experiences that help individual children bring out their best inner qualities as they interact with peers and adults outside the family. Staff can also use this knowledge to help children make positive contributions to the program, their school, their community, and to the world beyond their community.

Developing Effective Outdoor Environments and Interest Areas: Assessing Space and Planning Activities

15 minutes

School-age children need daily opportunities to exercise, relax, and participate in a wide range of outdoor activities. The hours children spend in after school programs are often the best hours of the day for getting fresh air and enjoying the outdoors while it's still daylight. School-age programs can provide safe, secure settings where children can enjoy the outdoors. In this course, we will explore how to assess space and plan activities in outdoor environment and interest areas.

Developing Effective Outdoor Environments and Interest Areas: Moving Indoor Interest Areas Outside

15 minutes

School-age children need daily opportunities to exercise, relax, and participate in a wide range of outdoor activities. The hours children spend in after school programs are often the best hours of the day for getting fresh air and enjoying the outdoors while it's still daylight. School-age programs can provide safe, secure settings where children can enjoy the outdoors. In this course, we will explore strategies for moving indoor interest areas into outdoor environments.

Developing and Implementing Effective Indoor Interest Areas

30 minutes

In order to operate an effective school-age program environment, it is essential for staff to know how to design, set up, and operate a variety of different interest areas that meet the developmental needs of school-age children. Effective interest areas are multi-dimensional; they provide a wide variety of activity options within the area. Effective interest areas provide children with opportunities to work and play independently on their own or with others. They also provide a setting for focused, staff-led activities designed to introduce children to new concepts and skills. Staff in quality school-age programs know how to work with colleagues and children to define, develop, and manage a wide variety of interest areas.

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Developmental Trends 101

1 hour

In order to provide developmentally appropriate programming, it's important to understand how children and youth develop physically, emotionally, and cognitively. This course will provide information about the developmental trends that are associated with different age-groups (K-8) and how these trends relate to day-to-day programming.

Down Syndrome

15 minutes

Down Syndrome, also called Trisomy 21 is the most common cause of mental retardation and malformation in a newborn. This course gives participants a brief overview on the characteristics, cause, and long-term effects of Down Syndrome. It also teaches participants some effective teaching strategies and activities to use when dealing with individuals who have Down Syndrome.

Drug-Free Workplace

15 minutes

In this course, participants will learn about the Drug-Free Workplace Policy. They will discover the impact of substance abuse in the workplace, ways that people use alcohol and other drugs, and learn how to understand addiction. Other topics include signs and symptoms of substance abuse, family and coworker impact, assistance, confidentiality, and specific drugs of abuse.

Dyslexia

15 minutes

This course gives participants an overview of Dyslexia in children. Participants will learn a brief overview of what Dyslexia is and how it affects children in different age groups. They will also learn some helpful teaching methods that help children with Dyslexia learn best.

Effective Communication with Children and Youth

1 hour

We are constantly communicating with the children and youth in our program through our words and actions.

It's important for program staff to think critically about their communication skills and habits in order to communicate effectively. During this course, participants will learn about effective and dynamic communication tools, strategies to check for understanding, and activities that engage children and youth in communication.

Effective Health and Safety Committees: Part One

15 minutes

This course is Part One of a three course series. By the end of this course, participants will know the hazards associated with their workplace and the best methods to control them. This course will also discuss key elements for well-functioning health and safety committees, as well as, basic legal requirements for health and safety in the workplace.

Effective Health and Safety Committees: Part Three

15 minutes

This course is Part Three of a three course series. By the end of this course, participants will know the basics of conducting a workplace inspection, how to "map out" health and safety concerns, allies in this process, and barriers that may come up and strategies on how to overcome them.

Effective Health and Safety Committees: Part Two

15 minutes

This course is Part Two of a three course series. This course is aimed at health and safety committee members who wish to establish a committee structure and process. By the end of this course, participants will be able to develop an action plan for the year that identifies at least 1 or 2 priority health and safety issues that should be worked on.

Egress, Fire Prevention, & Fire Protection

15 minutes

In this course, participants will learn about escape routes and exits, emergency action plans, fire prevention plans, fires, fire extinguishers, and workplace fire prevention tips.

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Elements of an Effective Safety and Health Program

15 minutes

In this course, participants will learn how an effective management of worker safety and health programs can reduce the extent and severity of work related injuries and illnesses, improve employee morale and productivity, and reduce worker's compensation costs.

Elements of the Environment

45 minutes

A positive environment for out-of-school time programs is as vital to the success of a program. It is important for the staff to understand the powerful effect the environment has in supporting the overall goals of school-age care and afterschool programs. Once staff members understand the role of the environment, they will be able to create an atmosphere in which children's and youth's growth and development are supported by the ways in which the space is arranged and managed, materials are chosen and maintained, and interpersonal relationships are developed. This course will help examine the indoor, outdoor and interpersonal environments of their program, gain knowledge on how to use all environments effectively, and identify a variety of ways to enhance the out-of-school time environment for children and youth.

Energy and the Environment

1 hour

1 hour

This course will help participants go deeper and gain more examples and strategies related to some of the 5 Tips for Engaging English Learners' Families and Communities introduced in the training.

Engaging the Community in Quality Summer Programs

1 hour

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CalSAC partnered with the Summer Matters campaign to create our Quality Summer Program training series. Summer months bring unique opportunities for learning outside the traditional school year and walls. High quality summer learning programs change students' lives for the better with an opportunity to improve their academic achievement and readiness to learn. Developing quality programs requires intentional, ongoing development. Engage in activities that will help identify and strengthen the quality of your summer learning program. Engaging the Community in Quality Summer Programs is the third module in the Quality Summer Programming Training series. People need to know how important summer is to the children and youth in your program and across the state. Summer learning program staff are all torchbearers for quality summer opportunities. In this module, participants will gain a deeper understanding of elements of high-quality summer programs by identifying resources to help strengthen their summer program offerings, engaging in collaborative reflection and planning, and developing clear goals for the summer program.

English Learner Socio-Emotional Factors and Typologies Review

30 minutes

This course serves as a compliment to Knowing English Learners, an in-person training offered through CalSAC's English Learner Training and Professional Development Project. This review course is for CalSAC EL Trainers and participants. CalSAC Trainers can use this module as a way to brush up on the Socio-Emotional Factors and English Learner Typologies before conducting a training, and participants can use the module to further their understanding of the Factors and Typologies.

Equal Opportunity 101

15 minutes

The U.S. Department of Labor Civil Rights Center is committed to providing clear and easy-to-access information on how to comply with federal equal opportunity and nondiscrimination laws and regulations that (1) prohibit discrimination in DOL-funded programs and activities, and (2) prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability by certain public entities and in DOL-conducted activities. This course is a brief overview on equal opportunity rights.

Ergonomics - English

30 minutes

This course will allow participants to obtain the skills and knowledge needed to anticipate, recognize, evaluate, and control ergonomic risk factors in a broad range of workplace settings. Participants will learn what ergonomics is, OSHA guidelines, ergonomics stressors, common ergonomic injuries, and recommended solutions.

Ergonomics MSDs

30 minutes

Ergonomics is the science of fitting jobs to people. Ergonomics encompasses the body of knowledge about physical abilities and limitations, as well as other hu-

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man characteristics, that are relevant to job design. This course covers topics directed towards ergonomics and Musculoskeletal Disorders (MSDs) such as, signs and symptoms, how to protect your back, joint disorders, risk factors, ergonomic controls, and exercises to practice to prevent accident and injuries from occurring.

Exploring Curriculum Activities

1 hour

Today, more than ever, programs are being asked to integrate academic activities into programming. Improving academic performance and achievement requires us to intentionally create opportunities for children and youth to learn and discover their own interests, strengths, and talents within the academic areas. This course offers an overview of the six curriculum areas as defined by the California Department of Education, provides sample activities that address these curriculum areas, and explores the importance of including academics in a well-balanced program.

Staff can use a variety of planning tools to plan different types of activities. To implement a diverse program of activities, it is essential for school-age staff to recognize and use a wide variety of roles as they interact with children throughout the program day.

Exploring Ethics in School-Age Care: Focus on a Professional Code of Ethics

15 minutes

According to Frank Loewenberg and Ralph Dolgoff, developing a code of ethics is a significant stage for any profession. "For most American occupational groups the development of a code of ethics coincided, more or less, with the decision to formalize the transformation of the occupation into a profession." The transformation to a profession allows those working in the profession continuity and heightened sense of purpose. It allows those

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outside of the profession to realize the integrity and importance of the profession. When SAC/OST professionals develop, adopt, and adhere to a Code of Ethics, they are guided by underlying principles that represent the values of the field. These underlying principles help them determine appropriate courses of action when they face ethical issues as they work with children, parents, colleagues, and community members.

One of the most significant challenges for staff in school-age programs is learning how to identify, manage, and respond appropriately to individual differences in a group setting. Some differences among children are the result of inborn characteristics and traits (e.g., physical characteristics, temperament, talents, race). Other differences are the result of external factors (e.g., the environment) or are cultivated as the child grows and develops (e.g., interests, skills, knowledge). The diverse needs, characteristics, interests, abilities, and skills of school-age children require a flexible atmosphere that supports diversity and choice for children with varying capacities for independent action. Staff who understand and appreciate individual differences in children are better equipped to plan and implement program experiences that help individual children grow and flourish in a group setting.

Exploring the Continuum of Developmental Tasks of School-Age Children from 5 to 12

30 minutes

Understanding the continuum of ongoing development between the ages of 5 and 12 provides the foundation for planning and implementing successful school-age programs. When staff know and understand the developmental tasks of school-age children, they can work with children and colleagues to design effective environments, plan engaging activities, set appropriate expectations and limits, and guide children's behavior effectively.

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Food Service Worker: Annual Food Safety Training

30 minutes

Going Deeper: Supporting Social-Emotional Learning and Character Development

1 hour

It is important for staff to reflect on the practices they are implementing throughout the program to create environments in which young people can experience social-emotional learning and practice character skills. Just as important, staff must reflect on their own personal social-emotional and character competencies and how they demonstrate those in the program, acting as a role model for program participants. During this course participants will complete a self-reflection tool to identify actions they can take to strengthen their abilities to support social-emotional and character skill development.

Growing as a Professional: Health and Stress Management: Nurturing and Maintaining Good Health

30 minutes

Every day, school-age care professionals dedicate themselves to caring for and nurturing children, youth, and families. Often, school-age care professionals are so dedicated to serving others, they neglect their own needs. An important part of professionalism in the school-age field is continued personal growth and development in relation to the field. This requires using appropriate resources and strategies to further individual professional development. In this course, we will explore professional development opportunities for school-age staff.

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Growing as a Professional in School-Age Programs: Professionalism in School-Age Programs

15 minutes

In the search for a definition of professionalism in school-age programs, it is helpful to examine the common characteristics of professionalism in other fields. The next step is identifying qualities and characteristics associated with professional behavior in the school-age field itself. As a school-age professional, it is also important to understand the importance of acting as a public policy advocate on behalf of school-age children and their families.

Guiding School-Age Children in Groups: MAPs and DDADA

15 minutes

When large numbers of children are involved in the program, it is challenging to create and deliver school-age program activities that can meet the needs of all children. The key to success is taking a systematic approach to program planning. It is important for staff to understand how to select appropriate activity options, and use effective management strategies that make it possible to offer a balanced variety of simultaneous activity options. In this course, we will explore two strategies for guiding children in groups: MAPs and DDADA.

Guiding School-Age Children in Groups: Supervision and Boundaries

30 minutes

When large numbers of children are involved in the program, it is challenging to create and deliver school-age program activities that can meet the needs of all children. The key to success is taking a systematic approach to program planning. It is important for staff to understand how to select appropriate activity options and use effective management strategies that make it possible to offer a balanced variety of simultaneous activity options. In this course, we will explore supervision and boundaries.

Guiding the Behavior of Individual Children

30 minutes

This knowledge and understanding will help students develop strategies for creating programs that encourage individual children to develop self-discipline and self-

direction, establish positive relationships with others, and exhibit respect for program materials and equipment and the rights of others.

Harassment Prevention Training (PS)

2 hours

This course provides comprehensive, online training to prevent harassment in the workplace. It offers strategies to achieve more appropriate employee conduct and reduce your company's liability. In addition to promoting a harassment-free work environment, this course will also bring your organization into compliance with state laws, such as California's sexual harassment training requirement, AB 1825.

Healthy Bodies: Promoting Good Nutrition and Physical Activity in Child Care

2 hours

The purpose of this course is to help you understand the nutritional needs of infants, toddlers, and preschools. It will teach you the proper ways to store, prepare, and serve food safely. Finally, you will learn ways to encourage healthy eating habits for yourself and others and promote physical activity within the child care setting.

Heat Illness

30 minutes

This course will give participants an understanding of what heat illness is, OSHA Guidelines, who's affected, identifying symptoms, what to do when encountering heat illness, and preventative methods.

Heat Illness - Spanish (Enfermedades por calor)

30 minutes

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Helping Children with ADD Succeed In School-Age Programs: Characteristics and Needs of Children

30 minutes

Children with ADD regularly experience struggles and challenges at home, in school, and in the community. Without the help of knowledgeable, understanding, and supportive people, they often experience multiple failures and frustrations on a daily basis. In this course, we will explore characteristics and needs of children with ADD.

Helping Children with ADD Succeed In School-Age Programs: Strategies and Techniques for Staff

30 minutes

Children with ADD regularly experience struggles and challenges at home, in school, and in the community. Without the help of knowledgeable, understanding, and supportive people, they often experience multiple failures and frustrations on a daily basis. In this course, we will examine strategies and techniques that staff can use when working with children with ADD.

Homework Assistance

45 minutes

Supporting children and youth with their homework is a basic element of nearly all out-of-school time programs, yet it is something that can be challenging for many OST professionals. During this course, participants examine the importance of homework assistance, as well as strategies and skills to provide effective homework assistance.

Human Relations Skill Development: Cultivating Communication Skills

15 minutes

Being able to communicate effectively is an essential human relations skill for school-age care professionals. To be a good communicator, school-age professionals need to understand the components of communication, and how the communication process works. They need to identify barriers to clear communication, and develop strategies for minimizing or eliminating barriers to communication. School-age care professionals also need to work cooperatively with other team members to solve problems and conflicts. In this course, we will explore strategies for cultivating good communication skills.

Human Relations Skill Development: Focus on Leadership Styles and Conflict Management: Leadership Styles

15 minutes

Research indicates that those in positions of leadership use a variety of different leadership and management styles. A person's effectiveness as a leader is often directly linked to his or her leadership style. It is important for school-age care professionals to be aware of the assumptions and characteristics of different leadership styles. Knowledge of different leadership styles can help school-age care professionals reflect on their own leadership style, and assess its effectiveness.

Human Relations Skill Development: Focus on Leadership Styles and Conflict Management: Managing Conflict

15 minutes

Research indicates that those in positions of leadership use a variety of different leadership and management styles. A person's effectiveness as a leader is often directly linked to his or her leadership style. It is important for school-age care professionals to be aware of the assumptions and characteristics of different leadership styles. Knowledge of different leadership styles can help school-age care professionals reflect on their own leadership style, and assess its effectiveness. Leaders also use a variety of different styles when it comes to managing and resolving conflicts. By understanding how to diagnose the causes and dynamics of conflict, and understanding the characteristics of different conflict management styles, school-age care professionals can choose the best conflict management strategy for each situation.

Human Relations Skill Development: Good Communication Skills

15 minutes

Being able to communicate effectively is an essential human relations skill for school-age care professionals. To be a good communicator, school-age professionals need to understand the components of communication and how the communication process works. They need to identify barriers to clear communication and develop strategies for minimizing or eliminating barriers to com-

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munication. School-age care professionals also need to work cooperatively with other team members to solve problems and conflicts. In this course, we will explore good communication skills.

Human Relations Skill Development: Team Building Skills and Strategies

15 minutes

Being able to communicate effectively is an essential human relations skill for school-age care professionals. To be a good communicator, school-age professionals need to understand the components of communication, and how the communication process works. They need to identify barriers to clear communication, and develop strategies for minimizing or eliminating barriers to communication. School-age care professionals also need to work cooperatively with other team members to solve problems and conflicts. In this course, we will explore skills and strategies for team building.

I Am: Supporting Self-Awareness and Self-Management

45 minutes

As staff, our understanding of how youth's negative responses affect emotions and behaviors is a key lever in how we create opportunities for young people to develop social-emotional and character skills such as self-awareness and self-management. During this course, participants will learn about how young people's responses affect personal emotion and behavior, and how group agreements can support safe environments. Participants will reflect on current strategies and will learn about resources to support the development of young people's self-awareness and self-management skills.

I Belong: Supporting Social Awareness and Interpersonal Skills

45 minutes

We all have lived full lives with varied experiences, both positive and negative. Whether we are aware or not, our experiences, including our social, political and cultural beliefs and background, affect our practice with youth. During this course, participants will learn about how culturally grounded beliefs and background affect our

practice with youth, how to help raise our awareness of those factors, and reflect on current and new strategies that support the development young people's social-awareness and interpersonal skills.

I Can: Supporting Growth Mindset and Self-Efficacy

45 minutes

We all have areas in our life that we approach with a growth mindset and others we approach with a fixed mindset. In order for us to be positive role models to youth, we as adults need to reflect on our own mindsets and how they may impact how we behave at work and with youth. During this course, participants will learn about what self-efficacy and growth mindset are, explore our own mindset and the potential impact it has on youth, and reflect on current and new strategies to support the development young people's growth mindset and self-efficacy.

Incentives and Motivation

45 minutes

Motivation, incentives and rewards can help pull a team together and keep a successful staff on track. In our profession, incentives rarely come in the form of extra earnings, so we have to be creative in designing incentives. During this course, participants will look at several strategies for providing meaningful incentives for staff, as well as techniques to determine what motivates them and their staff.

Incipient Stage Fire Extinguisher Education

30 minutes

This course is designed to give participants an overview of incipient stage fires and fire extinguishers. The course will identify multiple types of fire extinguishers, as well as their purposes and how to operate and maintain them. Participants will learn the hazards associated with incipient stage fires and tips for when not to fight a fire.

Including Children and Youth with Disruptive Behavior

45 minutes

When working with children and youth, we encounter

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a wide range of behaviors. Effective behavior guidance strategies can help reduce the amount of time and energy spent addressing disruptive behaviors in the program. During this course, participants will explore the challenges of children and youth with disruptive behavior and learn strategies for effectively addressing these behaviors.

Indoor Air Quality

15 minutes

After completing this course, participants will know the difference between sick building syndrome and building-related illness, be able to identify building conditions as well as contaminants associated with symptoms or illnesses, learn some of the preliminary steps to an effective IAQ investigation, and be familiar with a few model IAQ policies and practices.

Information Security Awareness (Dept. of Health and Human Services)

15 minutes

Learning how to protect electronic information at work and home is very important. This course will teach participants the purpose for security training, potential threats, how to protect data at work and home, mobile device security, and how to report security breaches.

Integrating Academics and Enrichment

1 hour

It is essential that skills presented during the instructional day are reinforced by the learning opportunities presented in out-of-school time programs. Presenting materials in alternative learning formats encourages children and youth to participate, and it is through this participation that programs help promote mastery. During this course, participants will develop an understanding of the California Content Standards for Public Schools, including the Common Core Standards, and explore how to integrate them into a balanced afterschool program.

Introduction to Evaluation

1 hour

Quality programs operate with the idea that they will change, improve, and grow. Knowing how to identify

areas needing improvement is the key to program quality, which must be continually evaluated to identify strengths and weaknesses. In this course, participants will learn what evaluation is, why it is important for programs, and ways they can evaluate their own programs.

Involving School-Age Children in Activity Planning and Implementation

30 minutes

As they grow and change and move toward independence, school-age children and youth become very interested in planning and directing their own activities. This means it's very important for staff to think of ways to involve them in program planning and implementation. By planning activities WITH children instead of FOR them, and engaging them in creating the program environment, staff can help children develop a feeling of ownership of the program—a positive feeling that the program belongs to them.

Knowing Yourself as a Leader

45 minutes

Leadership in out-of-school time programs ranges from simple observation to active participation in program design and implementation. Leadership is an on-going process involving continuous learning, and taking time to discover their values, goals, skills, talents, and strengths will help staff to understand the type of leaders they are and the type of leaders they desire to be. In this course, participants will learn to develop a personal mission statement and identify strengths and weaknesses in skill development.

Leading Teams and Organizations with Head and Heart

45 minutes

As leaders, we must ensure that we are not only modeling social-emotional and character skills ourselves, but creating program environments for staff to thrive in these areas. Organizations can intentionally embrace and uphold practices that create safe environments for staff to develop and hone such skills individually and collectively, especially amongst change. In this course, participants

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will understand three stages of change, and how staff experience each. Participants will also become familiar with adaptive leadership strategies for managing change within organizations.

Leading with Head and Heart

45 minutes

Those in leadership positions have a responsibility to both lead and manage. During this course, participants will understand the differences between the leadership and management, and the steps we can take to cultivate both. Participants will explore how leaders create safe, supportive environments by modeling self-awareness, interpersonal skills and growth mindset in how we lead and manage.

Making Educators Partners in Suicide Prevention

30 minutes

The following course is adapted from the faculty training module of the LIFELINES school-based curriculum for youth suicide prevention, and provided by the Society for the Prevention of Teen Suicide. This course will review the ways in which suicide awareness training is beneficial to the entire school community. It will correct myths, present accurate data on suicide risk, warning signs & protective factors, outline roles, discuss ways for dealing with at-risk students, and provide additional suicide prevention resources to participants.

Making Plans and Developing Policies

1 hour

Planning and policy-making are closely linked to the development of quality school-age care programs. When school-age staff are skilled as planners and policy-makers, they can use these skills to design and implement high quality programs that benefit children, youth, and families. It is essential for school-age care professionals to recognize that it is important for policies to grow out of a vision of quality, and a mission that supports that vision. Therefore, creating a vision for quality, developing a program philosophy, and writing a clear mission statement are the first steps in program planning. It is also important for school-age care professionals to use a systematic process to develop goals and objectives,

set priorities for accomplishing goals and objectives, and develop goal-based action plans that will help the school-age program achieve its mission. High quality school-age programs are led by professionals who understand how to use effective strategies for creating a continuous cycle of planning and evaluation that supports ongoing program improvement.

Making Your Home A Safer Place

30 minutes

For children, the world is a constant source of new things to explore, discover and experience. Children's natural curiosity and fearlessness are also what lead children into dangerous and potentially deadly situations. What's a parent to do? The best advice is to be prepared. Try to eliminate or minimize potential hazards around the home that could injure your child. This course will teach parents and participants proper household, infant, fire, water, recreational, and emergency safety that can help make the home a safer place to grow and learn in.

Marchman Act: The Florida Substance Abuse Impairment Act

30 minutes

The Marchman Act provides for voluntary admissions and involuntary assessment, stabilization, and treatment of adults and youth who are severely impaired due to substance abuse. In this course participants will learn an overview of the Marchman Act Handbook and it's related laws.

Medication Administration for Resource Parents

15 minutes

This course is required for all Department of Child Services resource parents every two years after approval. The course provides resource parents with the knowledge to safely and effectively administer medications to children in care. Topics included in this course range from self storage and disposal of medication to common errors in medication administration.

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Medication Administration for Unlicensed Personnel

15 minutes

This course gives participants a quick overview of what to expect in a Medication Administration course for unlicensed personnel. Participants will learn about certain legislation passed, responsibilities of the DIDD, trainers, and agencies, as well as answer common FAQ's people have before taking a Medication Administration training.

Mold Safety Awareness

15 minutes

In this course, participants will examine the basics of mold, analyze health hazards associated with mold, identify and recognize safety hazards, describe fundamental protective measures, and interpret rules and regulations regarding mold.

Observation Skills: What's Going on Here?

30 minutes

Observation forms the basis of much of what people plan and do every day. As staff work with children in school-age programs, observation takes a more formal role. High quality school-age care is based on the principle of developmentally appropriate practices. Developmentally appropriate practices combine general knowledge of child development with specific knowledge of each individual child. Conducting objective observations help staff learn about each child's development, and provides staff with valuable information to use in planning and implementing appropriate program experiences and in developing effective guidance strategies.

Observing Children in School-Age Programs

45 minutes

Conducting and documenting objective, accurate observations of children in school-age programs is an important professional responsibility of school-age care professionals. Two useful tools for structuring observations are developmental checklists and anecdotal records. Both tools provide rich information that help staff learn about children's development. When school-age care staff conduct regular observations of children's development, and prepare objective documentation of these observations,

they are able to discover the uniqueness of each child, and provide developmentally appropriate guidance and support for all children in the program.

Office Safety and Health

15 minutes

Despite common belief that the office provides a safe environment to work in, many hazards do exist which cause thousands of injuries and health problems among office workers. In addition to the obvious hazards of slippery floors or open file drawers, the modern office may contain hazards such as poor lighting, noise, and poorly designed furniture and equipment. This course will give participants a brief overview of the most common office hazards that exist today.

OSTPD - Promoting Positive Youth Development

1 hour

This training will define Positive Youth Development, benefits of Positive Youth Development and how to implement Positive Youth Development.

OSTPD - Supporting Alternative Pathways through Service Learning

1 hour

This training will cover a number of areas regarding how after school programs can support alternative pathways by using service learning. The course will review what service learning is and provide a solid foundation of this concept. It will then look at the benefits of service learning followed by how service learning supports youth's alternative pathways. It will conclude with information on how to get started and creating a path to implement service learning in your own program.

OSTPD - Supporting Attendance through After School Programming

1 hour

This training will cover a number of areas regarding how after school programs can support youth attendance in school. By looking at and exploring the connection between after school programming and attendance in school, we see how after school programming supports attendance at school as well as how to coordinate with

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the school in order to maximize the positive impact of after school on school attendance through collaboration.

Overview of Enforcement for Occupational Exposure to Tuberculosis (TB)

15 minutes

This course provides a brief overview of OSHA's enforcement policy for occupational exposure to tuberculosis. Participants will learn the factors of TB, where it most commonly occurs, feasible and useful TB abatement methods, TB and respiratory protection methods, and about accident prevention signs and tags.

Planning for Emergencies

30 minutes

The Preparing for Emergencies course is designed to help participants identify a learning goal and expectation for their own business. Throughout this course, participants will assess their own business readiness plans for emergencies, learn about the four steps in the emergency planning process, and learn about emergency management considerations.

Preparing Workplaces for Pandemic Flu

15 minutes

This course will teach participants about what a flu pandemic is, how the flu virus spreads, and public health prevention strategies. Participants will also learn how to develop preparedness plans for themselves, their family, and their workplace as well as how to prevent the spread of infection in the workplace.

Presentation Methods and Debriefing Activities

1 hour

There is no "one size fits all" approach to working with children and youth, and this is especially true when it comes to how we present and debrief activities. During this course, participants will understand the importance of the delivery and debriefing of an activity to help children and youth make meaning, as well as some specific methods that can be incorporated into the program right away.

Preventing Cuts, Scrapes and Punctures

15 minutes

Our hands are some of our most valuable tools. Without our hands, it would be nearly impossible to do the work we do. This course teaches participants a few of the dangers that they may encounter with their hands and what they can do to mitigate cuts, scrapes, and punctures at home and at work.

Preventing Sexual Harassment and Understanding California Law

30 minutes

This course will teach California employees how to recognize sexual harassment, defines the rights and responsibilities of employers and employees, and provides an overview of the legal remedies available in sexual harassment lawsuits.

Preventing Violence at the Workplace

15 minutes

In this course, participants will learn the facts about workplace violence. This course will discuss Cal/OSHA's three types of workplace violence, list risk factors for potential violence at the workplace, describe ways to prevent violence, and discuss how to handle an angry customer.

Protecting Yourself While Responding to Earthquakes

30 minutes

This course is an awareness-level health and safety resource for "skilled support personnel" (SSP) who will participate in an earthquake response and cleanup. This course will help workers understand at an awareness level: what an earthquake is, characteristics of an earthquake response, and how to identify and control hazards pertaining to the response and cleanup activities associated with an earthquake.

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Providing Homework Support: Developing a Homework Support Program

45 minutes

Research indicates there are many different ways to provide effective homework support in school-age programs. When planning a homework support program, it is important for school-age programs to develop a homework philosophy that is consistent with the program's overall philosophy, and reflects current research on best practices for providing homework help. The homework philosophy should also reflect the needs of parents and children in the program, and strike a balance between homework needs and other experiences that help children grow and learn out-of-school. In this course, we will examine how to develop a homework support program.

Providing Homework Support: Types of Homework Support

15 minutes

Research indicates there are many different ways to provide effective homework support in school-age programs. When planning a homework support program, it is important for school-age programs to develop a homework philosophy that is consistent with the program's overall philosophy, and reflects current research on best practices for providing homework help. The homework philosophy should also reflect the needs of parents and children in the program, and strike a balance between homework needs and other experiences that help children grow and learn out-of-school. In this course, we will explore the various types of homework support.

Reducing Foodborne Illness Risk Factors in Food Service and Retail Establishments

30 minutes

The purpose of this course is to remind operators and regulators about safe practices used to control risk factors in institutions (Hospitals & Schools), restaurants (Full Service & Fast Food), and retail food (Deli, Meat & Poultry, Seafood, and Produce Departments) establishments. The "food safety messages" found in this course also include recommendations that were created based on guidance in the FDA Food Code 2005.

Safety and Survival in an Active Shooter Event

15 minutes

An all too unfortunate reality is that active shooter events are occurring with alarming frequency throughout the world. This course is intended to make you aware of the steps you should take if you are ever involved in an active shooter event.

Sanitation and Hygiene

15 minutes

This course is designed to teach participants the measures that need to be taken to ensure good sanitation during manufacturing. These relate primarily to the premises, the equipment and the process to prevent any type of contamination. This course will also teach participants the measures that need to be taken to ensure that good levels of hygiene are achieved during manufacturing, relating primarily to the personnel.

SARS: Protecting Workers

15 minutes

Participants of this course will learn about SARS in regards to symptoms, who may be at higher risk, transmission, treatment, and precautions for various groups including workplaces, healthcare facilities, laboratories, and airplane cleaning crews. This course also covers air medical transport of SARS patients, and handling human remains of SARS patients. Participants will also learn about employee training and suggestions for at home care.

School-Age Care as a Family Service: Emphasis on Planning Opportunities for Family Involvement

30 minutes

The foundation for getting parents involved in school-age programs is to keep parents well informed about what is happening in the program. Quality programs also provide parents with opportunities to make suggestions and give feedback on program services through suggestion boxes, feedback forms, and surveys. When parents are encouraged to have input in the program, they develop trust and confidence in the program, and feel a sense of pride and ownership. They are more likely to participate as

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resourceful partners with program staff when they know their ideas are welcome and valued. Finally, because parents are all different from each other, it's important to provide many different opportunities for them to connect with the program. Staff in quality school-age programs recognize that all parents don't have to be involved in the same way.

School-Age Care as a Family Service: Emphasis on Relationship Building

30 minutes

Strong, positive, cooperative relationships with parents and families are at the heart of quality school-age programs. Unfortunately, positive relationships with parents and families are not always easy to achieve because parents, like children, have widely varying personalities; some are easier to reach than others. Parents in school-age programs have different ideas, values, concerns, knowledge, pressures, lifestyles, plans, dreams, resources, and constraints. Staff who are successful in building positive relationships begin by recognizing the importance of accepting parents as the most important people in children's lives, regardless of differences among them. They understand that staff attitudes toward parents can have a strong effect on whether or not staff can establish positive relationships with parents. Staff in quality programs make a commitment to learning as much as possible about parents' needs, interests, wants, and concerns and develop effective strategies for making positive connections with parents.

School-Age Health Guidelines to Promote Healthy Eating and Physical Activity

30 minutes

At the end of this course, participants will be able to define the terms overweight and obesity, know health consequences of childhood obesity, and explain the purpose of CDC's School Health Guidelines to Promote Healthy Eating and Physical Activity. They will also identify at least two healthy eating and two physical activity policies or practices that can be implemented in schools to address obesity. Participants will also be able to create guidelines to address problems in their area as well as find stakeholders that need to be informed of the guidelines.

Sexual Harassment Prevention for Employees

1 hour

This course will provide you with an overview - defining sexual harassment and general harassment, giving examples of prohibited behaviors, explain the responsibilities of you and your organization and teach you about liability.

Shared Space 101

1 hour

Afterschool programs share space and facilities that are used by other people and for other purposes during the school day. Learning how to accomplish this in a positive way is essential for effective programming. This course offers participants the opportunity to examine some common issues that can occur when sharing space, as well as strategies to effectively share space with a variety of people.

Sharing Information with Parents and Other Professionals: Communication Tools

45 minutes

School-age children work on many important developmental tasks during their out-of-school hours. One of the important responsibilities of school-age care staff is to help parents stay in touch with how their children are growing and developing during program hours. In this course, we will explore tools used to communicate with families about their children.

Sharing Information with Parents and Other Professionals: Policies & Conferences

30 minutes

School-age children work on many important developmental tasks during their out-of-school hours. One of the important responsibilities of school-age care staff is to help parents stay in touch with how their children are growing and developing during program hours. In this course, we will explore policies and conferences.

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SIDS and Other Sleep-Related Infant Deaths: Keeping Babies Safe

90 minutes

This course will give participants a brief overview of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) and other sleep-related deaths. Participants will learn about recent research and statistics, the importance of child care providers, AAP SIDS Task Force recommendations, and how to implement policies in child care.

Slips, Trips, and Falls

45 minutes

Slips, Trips and Falls (STF) are among the most frequent type of reported injuries for public employees. This course is designed to help participants identify at least two requirements of OSHA's walking and working surfaces standard that apply to their workplace. By the end of this course participants will also be able to identify common causes of slips, trips and falls within the workplace, evaluate their workplace for hazards associated with walking and working surfaces, and generate ideas on how to control for these identified hazards.

Social-Emotional Learning, Character Building and Enhancing Quality

45 minutes

All children and youth need social-emotional and character skills in order to thrive in school, work, and life. By their design and structure, high-quality expanded learning and out-of-school time programs provide valuable opportunities for children and youth to develop such social-emotional and character skills. This course will introduce participants to social-emotional and character skills and their relationship to the California Quality Standards for Expanded Learning Programs.

Stop Bullying

1 hour

In this course you will: Learn the role kids play in bullying, who is at risk, warning signs and effects of bullying, targeted groups - race, religion, LGBTQ, youth with disabilities.

Suicide Prevention: Saving Lives One Community at a Time

30 minutes

This course, provided by the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP), gives participants an overview of the prevalence and risk factors for depression and suicide, dispels popular myths, and highlights AFSP's suicide prevention research and education programs. It includes practical advice for those who know someone who may be contemplating suicide.

Supervising with Head and Heart

45 minutes

Like young people, our own social-emotional and character competencies are important to reflect on if our desire is to create environments in which adults can successfully support young people in developing such skills. In this course, participants will explore social-emotional and character skills that support supervisors, as well as the personal roadblocks, power and potential pitfalls that supervisors may experience. Participants will also become familiar with a management framework to strengthen their supervision.

Teaching Students with Autism

15 minutes

This course focuses on teaching students with autism through the use of the 11 established treatments for Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). Participants will also learn about Discrete Trial Training (DTT) and Natural Environment Teaching (NET), both of which everyone in a classroom setting should be familiar with and be applying in a classroom.

The Indian Child Welfare Act

30 minutes

Knowledge of the Indian Child Welfare Act is essential for child welfare, legal and judiciary, mental health, foster care and adoptions, and caregivers. By the end of this course participants will be able to discuss the unique relationship between the federal government and the Indian Nations, as well as explain the concept of tribal sovereignty. This course will also teach participants about

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key terms, the essential mandates and protections of the Indian Child Welfare Act, the historic basis for the ICWA, and participants will learn how to apply the spirit and intent of the Act to child welfare practice in the field.

The NoFEAR Act

15 minutes

This course will inform participants of the Notification and Federal Employee Antidiscrimination and Retaliation Act, also known as the NoFEAR Act. At the conclusion of this course, participants should understand the basic provisions of the NoFEAR Act, know what Antidiscrimination and Whistleblower Protection Laws protect them, and understand how to file a complaint alleging discrimination, retaliation, or a violation of the Whistleblower Protection Laws.

The Role of Staff in Behavior Guidance

1 hour

Guiding and managing the behavior of children and youth are some of the biggest challenges that out-of-school time program staff face. To gain greater confidence in guiding behavior, staff must look at their personal actions and reactions to the behaviors of the children and youth with whom they work. This course will help participants understand their reactions to the behaviors of children and youth and learn to use this information to respond more effectively.

The Role of the Site Leader

45 minutes

Supervising adults is challenging under any circumstances, but in out-of-school time, supervision can be even more challenging because those supervised needs to be independent workers who are creative, energetic, enthusiastic and calculated risk takers. The afterschool site leader must have an arsenal of skills and strategies to be both a leader and a supervisor. This course offers a basic overview of the roles and responsibilities of the site leader or supervisor and how those roles support a culture of team excellence and mutual support.

The Safe Food Handler

15 minutes

This course is based on Chapter 2: Management and Personnel in the U.S. Food Code (2008). It is designed to teach those working in the food service industry methods for reducing foodborne illnesses. This course covers topics on basic handwashing, covering cuts, wounds and sores, proper clothing, how to report foodborne illnesses, excluding and restricting workers, as well as other important food safety policies.

The Six Ps of Marketing School-Age Programs

30 minutes

Effective marketing of school-age programs is a systematic process that involves research, analysis, assessment of market trends and needs, short-term and long-term planning, and development of effective strategies to promote school-age program services and develop a positive image of the program in the community. It is important for school-age care leaders to recognize that marketing is a far reaching process that includes, but is not limited to, advertising and publicity. When leaders take a comprehensive approach to marketing, their programs and projects have an excellent chance of success. Knowledge and understanding of the marketing process is an invaluable tool for leaders as they plan and implement new programs and projects, assess the stability and need for improvement of current programs, develop plans for new or expanded programs, and develop a positive public image of the program and its services.

Train-the-Trainer: Training Methods

15 minutes

The purpose of this course is to provide the education and tools needed so that participants will be able to effectively deliver safety and health training to their workers. By the end of this course participants will be able to explain the different titles of a teacher, determine positive classroom control measures, examine diversity and stereotypes, describe training delivery methods, analyze questioning types and techniques, demonstrate the use of training aids, define how to empower the adult learner, and illustrate the proper use of assessments and critiques.

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Understanding Autism in Your Community

30 minutes

Make Friends with Autism is a community focused education initiative that encourages understanding, inclusion, support, and appreciation of people and families with autism. Through a generous grant from Kohl's, Children's Specialized Hospital provides materials to businesses, recreation providers, neighbors, and families to support the integration of people with autism into community life. In this course participants will learn a basic understanding of the common characteristics, behaviors, and causes associated with autism. Participants will be introduced to what autism is, how people with autism interact and communicate, and the safety concerns associated with autism.

Understanding the Basic Concepts of HIPAA

45 minutes

This course will give participants a basic understanding of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). Participants will learn what HIPAA is, how it changes the way we do our work, federal vs. state standards, patient rights, the purposes of HIPAA compliance and more.

Understanding the Behavior of Children and Youth

45 minutes

The development of children and youth can cause them to behave in ways that can be trying for even the most knowledgeable and experienced staff. When staff understands what is driving the behavior, they can help to guide and encourage acceptable behaviors. This course will provide participants with the knowledge and skills necessary to prevent unwanted behavior by meeting the needs of children and youth before they act out.

Utilizing the Quick CASP Assessment Tool

1 hour

CalSAC partnered with the Summer Matters campaign to create our Quality Summer Program training series. Summer months bring unique opportunities for learning outside the traditional school year and walls. High quality summer learning programs change students' lives for

the better with an opportunity to improve their academic achievement and readiness to learn. Developing quality programs requires intentional, ongoing development. Engage in activities that will help identify and strengthen the quality of your summer learning program. Utilizing the Quick CASP Assessment Tool is the second module in the Quality Summer Programming Training series. Creating a high quality summer learning program first starts with assessing the program at every level from the planning stages to the implementation of the program. In this module, participants will understand the language used in the Quick CASP Assessment Tool to describe quality summer programming and learn about the Quick CASP Assessment Tool to guide program quality improvement.

Water and Energy

1 hour

CalSAC has partnered with the Pacific Gas & Electric Company (PG&E) to bring the Energenius® Out-of-School Time Program to our online training platform. This FREE environmental stewardship curriculum is designed to engage children and youth to think about how they use energy, how energy is measured, paid for, and ways to save energy. Children and youth will understand how they can help reduce the impacts of energy use and production on the environment, and also practice influencing others to take energy-saving actions. Additionally, the curriculum is uniquely and intentionally designed to engage families in energy and water conservation habits. Water and Energy is Activity Guide #3 in 4-part Energenius® Out-of-School Time Program. The curriculum and activities are designed to engage children and youth to think about water - where it comes from, how it's used, and how to conserve this natural resource. This course will prepare participants to deliver the activities from the Water and Energy Activity Guide as well as help children and youth bring water saving resources home.

Wellness Programs

15 minutes

Creating a wellness program for employees can help maintain a high level of well being through proper diet, exercise, stress management and illness prevention. This course will help participants understand the significance of a wellness program, educate management

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on the benefits of productivity and the costs of its loss due to illnesses, establish steps necessary to implement and maintain a successful wellness program, establish a method of testing the success of a wellness program, and assess which wellness programs are best for various work environments.

Young Worker Safety Training: Module 1 - English

15 minutes

The Center for Young Worker Safety and Health at Georgia Tech Research Institute strives to coordinate and promote the efforts of health and safety training programs throughout the Southeast. In this course participants will learn about young worker injuries and illnesses, as well as ways to reduce these injuries and illnesses. This course will also identify workplace hazards and go over young worker rights and responsibilities; an overview of the Young Worker Labor Laws.

Young Worker Safety Training: Modules 2 & 3

30 minutes

This course is intended to be a Primer for Young Worker Safety and Health Training. Modules 2 & 3 expand on the concepts looked at in Module 1 of the Young Worker Safety Training. Topics covered include young worker injuries and illnesses, identification of job hazards, finding solutions to hazards on the job, an overview of personal protective equipment (PPE), and understanding your rights and responsibilities as a young worker.

Youth Development Trends: Focus on Older Youth: Developmental Needs

15 minutes

The Center for Early Adolescence at the University of North Carolina and the Search Institute have found that early adolescence is a time of rapid change in youth development and developmental needs. For many children, the characteristic needs of early adolescence begin to emerge as early as age nine, when children are still in elementary school and attending traditional school-age care programs. School-age care professionals who understand these emerging needs are better equipped to create successful program experiences with older chil-

dren in their programs. In this course, we will explore the developmental needs of older youth.

Youth Development Trends: Focus on Older Youth: Programming Approaches

30 minutes

The Center for Early Adolescence at the University of North Carolina and the Search Institute have found that early adolescence is a time of rapid change in youth development and developmental needs. For many children, the characteristic needs of early adolescence begin to emerge as early as age nine, when children are still in elementary school and attending traditional school-age care programs. School-age care professionals who understand these emerging needs are better equipped to create successful program experiences with older children in their programs. In this course, we will examine programming approaches that address the needs of older youth.
