#### OUR SEAL

On the cover of this 1951 Yearbook appears the official seal of Jamaica Plain High School as it is incorporated into our Senior rings. This seal has a significance which has been forgotten; so we of the Class of '51 have taken this opportunity to enlighten you.

The elephant's head is taken from the crest of the coat of arms of the Eliot family, which was so influential in early Jamaica Plain and for whom this school was first named. The head symbolizes strength, dignity, and prowess. The wide band on the shield symbolizes a plain; while the thinner, wavy lines represent water.

These, too, are significant; the original name 'Xaymaca," given to Jamaica by the Arawak Indians who were found on the island by Columbus, implies "an overflowing abundance of rivers." Jamaica Plain is so situated in the center of gently sloping hills; thus, the "plain". Instead of the motto of the Eliot family, H. Jamaica Plain S. has been placed on the heraldic ribbon.







Soon we will part for ever; some of us will work and others will go on to institutions of higher learning; but no matter what position in life we eventually attain, and what measure of success we find, we will all have one thing in common; that one band which will hold us together is the years spent at Jamaica Plain High School and the knowledge we were all members of the best class in the history of this fine old school — namely, the class of 1951.
