HORSEFEATHER

Bright and zingy whiskey highball. Evolution at its finest.

The earliest-known mention of the Horsefeather in any craft cocktail book appears in Gary "Gaz" Regan's The Bartender's Bible, published in 1991, where it was dubbed "Horse Feathers" and called for blended whiskey, ginger ale and bitters. Regan doesn't remember where the drink originated, but through all the arguments over the finer details pertaining to the cocktail, Kansas locals are in agreement that it originated on the famous Massachusetts St. in Lawrence, Kansas.

Reiger's KC Whiskey, Honey-Ginger Syrup, Lemon, Angostura Bitters, Soda Water

REDMAN'S CLUB

Sweet and warming. Smooth like silk.

The Clover Club cocktail was first made at the bar of the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia around the turn of the twentieth century. The classic cocktail takes its name from a Philadelphia men's social club that met at the hotel in the pre-prohibition era. Redman's Hall was a fraternal organization right here in this building, and a fitting name to continue the legacy and further the evolution of the cocktail.

Bourbon, Dry Vermouth, Lemon, Peach Syrup, Raw Egg White 15

SEELBACH

Bourbon's sweetness and notes of vanilla bite through dry sparkling wine.

After its rise in popularity in the 1990s when infamous bartender, Adam Seger, discovered the recipe in a century-old menu he found in Kentuckey's Seelbach Hotel's basement, the cocktail made its way into Gary Regan's New Classic Cocktails and Vintage Spirits and Forgotten Cocktails by Ted Haigh, a.k.a. Dr. Cocktail. Twenty years later, Seger wrote to The New York Times about how the entire story was made up, and was just a ruse to promote his bar and himself. Yet, the cocktail had made it to print in cocktail literature worldwide... and here it is, yet again.

GREEN DOT

Sweetness & spicy pepper emerges from smooth and bitter vermouth, jolting anise.

In the mid-19th century, a man named Antoine Amedee Peychaud, the son of a Haitian immigrant, ran a pharmacy in the French Quarter. Among the tonics and remedies he sold were some medicinal bitters that he produced himself and called Peychaud's Bitters. Legend has it that Peychaud enjoyed making cocktails with his bitters, and one particular favorite combined them with the imported French Sazerac cognac. He served these drinks in an egg-cup, a coquetier in French, which some say is where the word cocktail may have originated.

Rye Whiskey, Green Chartreuse, Demerara Syrup, Sweet Vermouth, Herbsaint, Orange Bitters

OLD FASHIONED

VA Bourbon with a touch of sugar and bitters. Good ice.

While we could write a book on the origin of this cocktail, and many have, the absolute earliest printed iteration of the cocktail comes in none other than Jerry Thomas' 1862 book 'The Bartenders Guide: How To Mix Drinks'. This book contains a recipe for an Old Fashioned Holland Gin Cocktail: "Crush a small lump of sugar in a whiskey glass containing a little water, add a lump of ice, two dashes of Angostura bitters, a small piece of lemon peel, one jigger Holland gin. Mix with a small bar spoon. Serve." While this early version is missing some elements (namely... the whiskey), no other mention of the drink came until 1880, when Samuel Tilden, 25th mayor of New York City, drank away the sorrows of his failed Presidential bid with Whiskey Old-Fashioneds, according to The Chicago Daily Tribune.

Kentucky

Eagle Rare 14

Back in 1975, Eagle Rare debuted as part of the Four Roses family of bourbons. The spirit was made by master distiller Charles L. Beam (of the Jim Beam family) and while "Chuck" Beam did a lot of different things at the company, he is best known for Eagle Rare and was even inducted into the Kentucky Bourbon Hall of Fame in 2010.

Russell's Reserve 10-Year 14

Small batch bourbon by Master Distiller, Jimmy Russell and his son Eddie. Woody, piney aromatic surface with dry scents of grain and resin beneath. Corny sweetness upfront, then a hint of butterscotch. Full bodied, sweet and clean.

Evan Williams Single Barrel 12

A 5-time winner of "Whiskey of the Year", Evan William's most decorated bourbon is the only vintage-dated single-barrel bourbon on the market. That alone only tells half the story, so you still want to look at the back label to see the exact dates when it was barreled and bottled.

Elijah Craig Barrel Proof 17 (10z)

In 1789, Elijah Craig became the first distiller to age his whiskey in new charred oak barrels. Some claim that an accidental fire charred his barrels and changed the whiskey inside. Others say he stored his whiskey in former sugar barrels and was impressed with how charing improved the flavor. However it happened, Elijah Craig knew he had discovered something great. He continued to refine the barrel charring process, imparting smooth, rich flavor to the spirit that would become known as Bourbon. 250 years later, he is still known as the Father of Bourbon.

Buffalo Trace 13

Buffalo Trace is the oldest continuously operating distillery in America. During Prohibition the distillery was even permitted to remain operational, to make whiskey for "medicinal purposes".the distillery's rich history includes such legendary distillers as E.H. Taylor, Jr, George T. Stagg, Albert B. Blanton, Orville Schupp and Elmer T. Lee. Buffalo Trace Bourbon was introduced in 1999 and has become a staple of American Whiskey ever since.

Town Branch 15

Aged for a minimum of seven years in first-fill, used bourbon barrels, Town Branch® Malt develops complex and sweet flavors of oak to complement a mash bill of 100 percent malted barley. Bottled at 87 proof, this Kentucky single malt whiskey delivers an exceptionally balanced whiskey with a medium body. A smooth finish with long-lingering flavors of spice and dried fruit are brought to the surface with a drop or two of branch water.

American Whiskeys

Town Branch 15

Aged for a minimum of seven years in first-fill, used bourbon barrels, Town Branch® Malt develops complex and sweet flavors of oak to complement a mash bill of 100 percent malted barley. Bottled at 87 proof, this Kentucky single malt whiskey delivers an exceptionally balanced whiskey with a medium body. A smooth finish with long-lingering flavors of spice and dried fruit are brought to the surface with a drop or two of branch water.

Colonel E.H. Taylor Single Barrel 18

Colonel Edmund Haynes Taylor, Jr. is widely considered one of the founding fathers of the bourbon industry, fighting for the Bottled-in-Bond Act of 1897, nearly three decades after he purchased what is now called Buffalo Trace Distillery.

Colonel E.H. Taylor Small Batch 16

Made by hand, this Small Batch Bourbon Whiskey has been aged inside century old warehouses constructed by E.H. Taylor, Jr. Barrels are evaluated and selected to create a perfect blend of distinctive character that is like no other. This bourbon is a true sipping bourbon that honors the uncompromising legacy of E.H. Taylor, Jr.

Colonel E.H. Taylor Amaranth 'Grain of the Gods' 15 (10z)

Whiskey made exceptional by introducing Amaranth as the flavoring grain. Amaranth was originally cultivated by the Aztecs and is known as the "Grain of the Gods." This ancient grain is similar to wheat, but offers a complex taste with subtle flavors ranging from a nose of butterscotch and spearmint. Amaranth roughly translates to "never fading," a coincidentally perfect nod to its lingering finish of pecans and dark berries.

Colonel E.H. Taylor Barrel Proof 14 (10z)

Crafted from hand-selected barrels, this bourbon is bottled directly from the barrel; uncut and unfiltered at more than 125 proof. It reflects the way whiskey was produced in the days before Prohibition. Smooth, but powerful and uncompromising.

4 Roses Small Batch 13

Beautifully balanced and smooth as silk, this is sweet, rich and potent with very appealing menthol notes, precious woods and delicious spices.

Booker's 20

Booker Noe originally bottled this straight-from-the-barrel bourbon as gifts to close friends and family, but eventually made it available to the general public, starting in 1992. Booker's bourbon is aged between six and eight years and is bottled un-cut at its natural proof between 121 and 130.

Booker's 'Little Book' 15 (10z)

Little Book is an annual whiskey series featuring new, unique blends - a first for the family. Little Book Chapter 5 is a blend of four different liquid streams with a vast range of ages, flavors and distillation styles.

Elmer T. Lee 18 (10z)

In 1984, Elmer introduced the world's first single-barrel bourbon, Blanton's Single Barrel. Not long thereafter, Elmer himself was honored with his own single-barrel namesake.

Blood Oath Pact 5 36 (10z)

Like all of the Blood Oath whiskeys, this Blood Oath Pact 5 is a blend of different bourbons. What sets this edition apart, most notably, is the use of Caribbean rum barrels to finish one of the bourbons in the blend. Like all of the Blood Oath whiskeys, it's bottled at the temperature of the human body (98.6 proof).

1792 15

Barton 1792 Distillery was established in 1879 and continues today as the oldest fully-operating Distillery in Bardstown, Kentucky. 1792 Small Batch Bourbon is sophisticated and complex. Unmistakable spice mingles with sweet caramel and vanilla to create a bourbon that is incomparably brash and bold, yet smooth and balanced.

Old Forester 1870 15

Old Forester 1870's name refers to the year that Brown-Forman founder George Garvin Brown began batching whiskey from three different distilleries to ensure a consistent product. The 1870 Original Batch is also blended by Marianne Barnes, the protégé of Brown-Forman's master distiller, Chris Morris. It is said this would make 1870 the first bourbon from a major producer blended by a woman in the modern era.

Basil Hayden Dark Rye 18

Dark Rye is a blend of Kentucky straight rye, Canadian rye from Alberta Distillery, and California port. Dark Rye was the first permanent line extension in the Basil Hayden lineup, initially released in 2017. During the peak of used barrel finishes around the world of whiskey, Basil Hayden blended to perfection. This Rye has been considered one of the best Rye Whiskies in the world since its release, and even whiskey purists are happy to turn a blind eye and even happier to throw back an ounce or two.

Weller Full Proof 22 (10z)

William Larue Weller developed his original bourbon recipe with wheat, rather than rye. Bottled at the same 114 proof the spirit was when it entered into the barrel, this non-chill filtered wheated bourbon forgoes chill filtration to preserve all the naturally occurring residual oils and flavors that occur during the distillation and aging process.

American Whiskeys

Weller Antique 107 22 (10z)

A wheated bourbon with a full-bodied flavor and a balanced palate. Old Weller Antique is bottled at 107 proof, offering a complex combination of vanilla and florality with a bold finish. It's certainly a recognizable member of the Weller label, with its own unique characteristics to compliment the high proof.

Old Rip Van Winkle 10-year 22 (10z)

Good luck finding even an amateur whiskey-drinker who hasn't heard of the legendary Pappy Van Winkle and his series of yearly whiskey releases. It's essentially synonymous with fine American whiskey and for good reason. This entire endeavor started with one man and his philosophy of product over profit. Julian "Pappy" Van Winkle hadn't always planned to enter the bourbon business, but his impact on the industry continues to be felt four generations later. As he put it, he "simply tried to be honest and make a good product." It was that simple to him, and it has stayed that simple for more than 100 years.

Van Winkle Special Reserve 12-year 28 (10z)

Van Winkle Special Reserve is the perfect combination of age and proof. This sweet, full bodied whiskey has been described by some as 'nectar.' We agree! The 12 years of aging and medium proof of 90.4 seem to be just right in creating a very pleasant drink of whiskey. This fine bourbon can compete with any excellent cognac as an after-dinner drink. The overall impression is rich and deep.

Willett Pot Still 15

In keeping with family tradition, Willett Pot Still Reserve is a mean single-barrel Kentucky straight bourbon. Aged for between eight and ten years, Willett Pot Still Reserve earned the Gold Medal for taste at the San Francisco World Spirits Competition in 2008... and probably a few more for bottle design.

Willett Rye 15

Family Estate Bottled Small Batch Rye. The Willett Family has a long Whiskey-making history stretching back into the 1700s. The family has worked for others and operated their own distillery off-and-on for well over two-hundred years.

Jefferson's Pritchard Hill 18

Aged in new American Oak barrels and finished in Chappellet Pritchard Hill Cabernet Sauvignon casks. Nose is reminiscent of this exquisite Napa Valley wine, with hints of caramel and spicy oak on the finish.

Virginia

John J. Bowman Single Barrel Bourbon 15

Hand selecting some of the oldest barrels in the warehouse to produce a single barrel bourbon with hints of toffee, leather, figs, and almonds. John. J. Bowman was awarded World's Best Bourbon in 2017.

Bowman Brothers Bourbon 12

John J., Abraham, Joseph, and Isaac Bowman were Virginia militia officers in the American Revolutionary War. This hand-crafted bourbon whiskey is a tribute to their heroism. Our Bowman Brothers Small Batch Bourbon is distilled three times using the finest corn, rye, and malted barley, producing distinct hints of vanilla, spice, and oak.

KO Bourbon 13

Four centuries ago, the first American whiskey was distilled in Virginia. A new industry was launched and endured against unfathomable odds. That spirit of perseverance, distilled through 400 years of craft, is proudly presented today as KO Straight Bourbon Whiskey. Beginning with warm vanilla notes, KO quickly evolves to caramel with hints of baking spice, dried apricot, rich English toffee, toasted almonds, and a dusting of dark cocoa. Virginia Grown. Virginia Made. From Grain to Glass.

KO 6 yr Barrel Strength 17

Bare Knuckle Straight Bourbon Whiskey Single Barrel Cask Strength is made with 70% corn, 20% wheat, and 10% malted barley, all sourced from local Virginia farms. It is double-distilled, aged for at least 6 years in a single charred new American White Oak barrel, and bottled directly from the barrel, without dilution. This spirit can range from ~118 to ~125 proof and produces a wonderful depth of flavor including notes of caramel corn, toffee, hints of vanilla, with cherry reminiscence of an Old-Fashioned cocktail. Its higher proof provides a warming, nutty, and peanut forward finish.

Catoctin Creek Roundstone 14

Louden Co, VA's first legal distillery since pre-prohibition. Locally-sourcing grain and fruit from Purcellville, VA, Catoctin Creek created Virginia's most awarded whiskey - Roundstone Rye.

Catoctin Creek Barrel Proof 18

Delicious, dark, complex and ridiculously smooth for the proof, Roundstone Rye Cask Proof is released only about twice per year and sits around 58% ABV. A very distinct, yet complex and tasteful burn of fig, plum skin, molasses, and toffee.

Catoctin Creek Ragnarok Rye 18 (10z)

The mad scientists at Catoctin Creek conducted experiments on aging the blood of GWAR in barrels made from different types of wood scorched by a comet's blast... or so the story goes. Heavy-metal band GWAR and Catoctin Creek collaborate on a very unique rye whiskey using aged white oak, sugar maple, and cherrywood casks. The Berserker Blothar of GWAR describes the whiskey as "[A very] powerful spirit. A delicious sacrament to drink in preparation for battle, and it'll get you really, really crazy."

New York

Hillrock Solera 20

Hillrock Estate Distillery is a farm distillery with roots dating back to 1806, located in New York's Hudson Valley. 'Solera' - a stack of barrels where a small portion of whiskey is removed periodically and new whiskey is added. No barrel is ever fully emptied, and age and complexity gradually increase over time.

Hillrock Single Malt 21

Hillrock Estate is one of the pioneering field-to-bottle distilleries to produce whiskey in Hudson Valley, NY since Prohibition. It is made from barley grown in the fields at the estate, and floor-malted in house, ensuring every aspect of this whisky is monitored on premise. They even custom-built a 250-gallon copper pot still for the job!

Widow Jane 10-year 18

Widow Jane is the name of a limestone mine in Rosendale. It was once owned by a Mr. A. J. Snyder, whose wife, Jane was well loved by the local community. They named the mine after her when Snyder passed away. The distillery sources their water from this mine, and attributes the excellent quality of their Whisky to the mineral rich water found there. This 10 year bourbon is aged to perfection. It drinks like a 20 year bourbon with its deep cherry notes and light tannic finish. Aromas of butter, cream, and toffee followed by flavors of cherry wood, olive oil, and orange. Finishes with burnt orange and spice.

Widow Jane 'Oak & Applewood' Rye 14

Aged in barrels with oak and applewood staves and brought to proof with the legendary limestone water imported to Brooklyn from the legendary Rosendale Mines of NY.

California

Savage & Cooke 'The Burning Chair' 16

Intense and expressive, this is the first release of Dave Phinney's highly anticipated four vear-old Bourbon. Smooth and lush with loads of vanilla bean, baking spices, maple and baked apples. Finished in Napa Valley Cabernet Barrels from one of Dave's vineyards.

Redwood Empire 'Pipe Dream' 13

Named for the 14th tallest tree on the planet, Pipe Dream is Redwood Empire's first Bourbon whiskey. Pipe Dream is made from barrels aged between four and twelve years with a high corn mash bill. Smooth and complex, it is a true sipping whiskey.

Redwood Empire 'Emerald Giant' Rye 13

Named after the fastest growing Redwood in the world, Emerald Giant is a fan favorite in the Rye world. We started with a mash-bill of 95% premium rye and aged it for over 3 years in new charred oak barrels. Unequivocally spicy rye-blend with a hint of orange and honey.

Redwood Empire Lost Monarch Blended Straight Whiskey 13

Named after the world's largest coastal Redwood, Lost Monarch whiskey has a name to live up to. An award winning bourbon-rye blend with an exceptional balance of sweetness and spice. The perfect choice for those who just can't decide between rye or bourbon; The best of both worlds.

Green Bar Single Malt 15

Single malt whiskey from the City of Angels. Notorious for experimenting with as many types of wood as possible during the again process. Green Bar's single malt showcases 5 types of barrel-aging: White oak, hickory, maple, mulberry, red oak, and grape

Pennsylvania

Rittenhouse Rve 12

Rittenhouse Straight Rye Whisky has a storied past with a heritage that commemorates Philadelphia's famous Rittenhouse Square. Bottled-in-Bond, today's Rittenhouse carries the distinct, spicy flavor that is long associated with the brand. Rittenhouse is the Rye Whisky of choice for both bartenders and whisky aficionados alike.

Wigle Rve 14

This Organic Rye Whiskey takes its cues from the original American Whiskey. Monongahela Rye. Western Pennsylvania produced this style of Rye for more than 100 years. As will all of their spirits, Wigle makes this spirit from scratch from regional ingredients. Hell-bent on producing the most bursting-with-terroir and inventive spirits, they mill, ferment, and pot-distill all of their products at their distillery in Pittsburgh's Strip

Whistlepig Piggyback 15

Rye specifically designed to be mixed. With a mash bill of 100% Rye to capture a 100% bold, spice flavor profile. PiggyBack's unique strength of precisely 96.56 proof is the optimal match in the strength-sweet-bitter cocktail triangle, making it a bartender's dream, and adding unique and tasty perspectives to even the most classic cocktails.

Whistlepig 10-year 20

The single most awarded Rye whiskey in the world. The farm distillery is located on a 500plus-acre farm, where it grows and harvests rve grain and raises a lot of animals. The first and one of the very few products in the world that can boast of a 100% rye mash bill. Bold and Spicy finish.

Whistlepig 12 'Old World' 25

A Rye styled by Old World sensibilities at 86-proof. This whiskey is the marriage of three finishes, each with their own distinctive flavor profiles. After maturing for 12 years in New American Oak, the spirit is divided into one of three barrels -Madeira (63%), Sauternes (30%) and Port (7%). Finished to perfection and blended into a symphony of flavor.

Whistlepig Farmstock 18

Pleasantly surprising fruitiness and florality. With a majority of grain-to-glass WhistlePig Whiskey, the FarmStock Rye is comprised of 52% of our 3-year-old Rye Whiskey, blended with 31% 6-year aged whiskey and 17% 10 year aged whiskey from Alberta, Canada. Bottledin-Barn.

Whistlepig Farmstock #3 18

FarmStock Rye Crop No. 003 is the third release of Whistlepig's limited edition annual Triple Terroir Whiskey - created from their rye grain, distilled and proofed with their water, and aged in their custom Vermont White Oak.

Whistlepig 15-year 25 (1oz)

Deep and rich, dominated by caramel, vanilla, and oak with hints of allspice and burnt orange on the nose. Warm, rich, and slightly creamy. Loads of butterscotch and baking spice with leather and a hint of tobacco. Ultra long and rich, warm, and inviting finish.

Whistlepig Double Malt 18-year 30 (10z)

WhistlePig Double Malt 18 Year Old Straight Rye Whiskey is a mouthful in both senses, and it's the oldest WP's release to date. This Rye Whiskey (79% rye, 15% malted rye, and 6% malted barley) spent 18 years in the barrel and the result is a symphony of soft, floral rich and spicy flavors.

Utah

High West American Prairie 13

A blend of straight bourbon whiskeys, aged a minimum of two years in charred white American oak barrels. Utilizing a variety of high rye content mash bills to convey an earthy complexity with a bit of spice. The perfect marriage of richness and brightness expressed by notes of honey nougat, sweet cornbread biscuits, and lemon zest with caramel apples and pecan pie lingering on the finish.

High West Bourye 18

Bourbon & Rye. Bou Rye. All whiskeys in this carefully crafted blend are a minimum of 10 years old, and sourced from several distilleries to help create what High West considers to be the best marriage of the two styles. Bourye is best enjoyed around a campfire while looking at the Milky Way. Sip straight or with a little water. Not recommended with ice.

High West Double Rye 13

A rye for those who love rye. Double Rye embodies a harmonious balance of bold rye spice with bright botanical notes that simultaneously showcase layers of freshness and complexity. A blend of column and pot-still whiskies, aged a minimum of two years. A unique and balanced flavor profile of cinnamon, gingersnaps, juniper, mint sprigs, and fresh wildflower honey.

Maryland

Baltimore Spirits Co. Epoch Rye 14

Before the age of column stills, and before Rye Whiskey took America by storm (the first time), Rye was made by Scottish and Irish settlers in Maryland using ancestral methods brought over from Europe. Epoch Rye brings back this low rectification, pot-distilled spirit in modern form, calling back to Maryland's earliest Rye Whiskey heritage.

McClintock White Whiskey 13

Maryland Heritage White Whiskey comes from a historically derived rye heavy mash bill from pre-prohibition Western Maryland distilleries. Aged in house for 24 hours in an oak barrel, this whiskey is a lighter version of a traditional rye that goes down smooth in a cocktail or as a sipper.

Old Line Single Malt Cask Strength 16

Bottled as it comes out of the barrel, this cask strength whiskey delivers all of the spirit's character in a bold and well-rounded flavor. Not for the faint of heart, this is the most serious expression of Old Line's award-winning Single Malt Whiskey.

Kansas

J. Rieger's KC Whiskey 14

J. Rieger & Co. Kansas City Whiskey pays tribute to history through resurrecting the use of adding Sherry to American Whiskey, a common practice known as "rectification" in the late 1800s, that was lost after Prohibition. Just like Bourbon is Bourbon and Scotch is Scotch, Kansas City Whiskey is completely its own style, and resurrected by the likes of J. Rieger KC Whiskey.

Colorado

Stranahan's Sherry Cask Single Malt 17

Stranahan's Sherry Single Malt is double-distilled 100% malted barley, aged 4 years in virgin American white oak barrels; then transferred to Oloroso Sherry barrels from southern Spain to cask finish. It is aromatic with over-ripe cherry, sweet apples, raisins, almonds, leather.

Laws Wheated Bourbon 18

Made from a single season's harvest of Centennial Wheat, the heirloom spring soft white varietal grown in the San Luis Valley, this is the first wheat whiskey to be Bottled in Bond in Colorado, which, fittingly is known as the Centennial State.

Michigan

Traverse City Cherry Whiskey 14

When you live in the Cherry Capital of the World, and you make whiskey, some things just come naturally. Steeped with Montmorency cherries grown on their family's farm, its flavor profile resembles whiskey with a hint of cherry, not the other way around.

Illinois

Koval Single Barrel 15

Tucked away in a charred new American oak barrel to age, millet and corn learn to complement each other, neither taking the lead. Out of the bottle, this duet opens with notes of mango chutney, while the millet renders a soft whisper of vanilla throughout. Then harmonizing, the grains sing with the sweetness of apricot custard.

Arkansas

Rock Town Single Barrel Reserve 17

Rock Town is a distillery based in Little Rock, Arkansas that is trying to put their city on the map when it comes to delicious spirits. A true grain-to-glass offering, Rock Town prides itself on being a "grain to glass" local spirit, with all of the corn and rye used in their spirits grown within 125 miles of the distillery and within the state of Arkansas. For this specific bourbon, the distillery starts with 82% corn but also throws in 9% golden promise malted barley and 9% regular barley.

Minnesota

Far North Roknar Maryland-Style Rye 17

Maryland-style Rye Whiskey is one of the newcomers to the craft-distilling boom taking place in America over the last two decades. The Scandinavian name Roknar means "Warrior from the gods" in ancient Norse. While the legendary Viking, Ragnar Lodbrok, may or may not have actually existed, his reputation throughout Europe as a hero and truly bonafide bad-ass seems to endure nonetheless. Similar, for all its fame and praise, no one quite knows what "Maryland style" means. Many distillers and historians today agree that Maryland rye did have a different flavor profile — sweeter than the rye made farther west, with less spice and a supple, perhaps buttery palate.

Tennessee

The Clover Single Barrel 15

Using The Lincoln County Process steeping whiskey in maple sugar-infused charcoal chips before it enters the cask, this 10 year whiskey results in a complex aroma and slight char, and the process beautifully mellows the whiskey. With an aroma of toasted oak and a taste of caramel and forward toasted-vanilla, the finish is long, smooth and soft.

American Whiskeys

Wyoming

Wyoming Outryder 17

This Straight American Whiskey is a blend of two distinct mashbills, an almost Rye Whiskey and a High Rye Bourbon, that represents Wyoming Whiskey's first use of Rye. Outryder offers a taste profile not seen anywhere else in the American whiskey category. The front of the mouth experiences a light to moderate rye spice with a full, creamy mouthfeel. The rye slowly fades as the smooth characteristics of bourbon finish.

Oregon

Rogue Farms Single Malt 17

This five-year-aged American single malt was made exclusively from grain grown at Rogue Farms, then brewed, distilled and aged at our distillery in Newport, Oregon . Malty with hints of cocoa, and unparalleled fruit character including candied lemon and dark cherry.

Rogue Farms Rye Malt 16

Like their Single Malt, the Rye Malt from Rogue Ales (famous for Rogue Dead Guy Ale) is not actually "beer made from whiskey." Instead, it's whiskey based on certain specialized grains particular to Rogue's beer-making operation: their Dream Rye and their Dare & Risk Malted Barley. The rye is also malted, and the mash is fermented with Pacman yeast, a rather neutral brewing yeast that is quite popular with homebrewers.

Washington D.C.

One Eight Distilling District Made Rye 14

Rye holds a prominent place in the agricultural history of the Mid-Atlantic region and was even a significant crop for George Washington at Mount Vernon. Washington was smart enough to distill most of his estate grown rye and went on to have the largest distillery in the country at the time of his death in 1799. One Eight released this Rye Whiskey as the very first in the DC area since prohibition.
