CONTRIBUTORS TO GRACE

Many years ago, before being called to ministry, Julie and I lived for a time in a rural community in Virginia. We were active in a small United Methodist church. There were 25 people in the congregation, and every one of them was in worship each week. We worshipped and attended Sunday School, served alongside and tithed, and of course, ate pot-luck meals with this community of believers.

We had not, however, become members there.

One evening, after we helped paint several rooms in the education wing, one of the church leaders said to us, “You need to join our church so that we can put you on some committees.”

Maybe it’s just the way we express it, but sometimes serving in the church seems to be about “being on some committees” rather than “being in ministry”.

For the last two months, Grace’s Leadership Committee, formerly known as the Nominating Committee, has been meeting. We have been developing a resource plan for leading Grace in 2018. This is a task every United Methodist Church does every fall – identifying who the people are with the gifts and graces for the work of ministry in the local church. At Grace, we devoted time this year to understanding who we are as a church, what is it Jesus calls us to do, and how are we to best use our best resources – our people – to love God and others.

For example, we are forming ministry teams, not committees, in the areas of nurture, outreach, mission and worship, and giving the leaders of those teams a seat on Church Council. We have identified a significant number of people who have not had the opportunity to serve and invited them to be contributors to the team ministry. Later in the year, we will be issuing an open invitation for anyone who wants to contribute to an area of interest to do so. And, in 2018, we will take the time, as a church, to identify our gifts and encourage each of us to share them.

The joyful work of loving God and others is best done when shared. Moses had Aaron, and later Hur, Joshua and Caleb –



The congregation of Grace has added several new members in the past


few weeks! Please take a moment to welcome these new folks when you see them!



AUGUST WEDDING



TRUE DISCIPLESHIP IS INTENTIONAL By Bill Cheesman

It is generally agreed, that when it comes to personal spiritual formation, growing one's own faith means engaging in spiritual disciplines with intentionality.


Within Grace church we have heard a lot about being a disciple, but what does that mean. "A disciple is one who knows Christ, is growing in Christ, serving Christ and sharing Christ." (from *Developing an Intentional Discipleship System: A Guide for Congregations*).

You should be intentional about wanting to know Christ, to grow in Christ and to serve Christ. You can begin this journey by reading the Bible and praying. You can read the Bible and let the words settle on your mind and think about how God's words pertain to you and your personal life. You can start the morning by reading the "The Upper Room". You can start or end the day by praying. In Sherry Weddell's book, *Forming Intentional Disciples* she outlines five ways stages of spiritual growth.

- Step 1: Initial trust: Where a person is able to have a positive association with Jesus Christ, the Church, a Christian believer or something identifiably Christian. Trust is not the same as active personal faith. Without some kind of bridge of trust in place, people will not move closer to God.
- Step 2: Spiritual curiosity: When a person is intrigued by or desiring to know more about Jesus or some aspect of the Christian faith. This can range from mere awareness of a new possibility to something quite intense and proactive.

Nevertheless, a person at the threshold of curiosity is not yet open to personal change. Curiosity is still essentially passive, but it's more than mere trust.

- Step 3: Spiritual openness: The critical point when a person acknowledges to themselves and to God that they are open to the possibility of personal and spiritual change. This is one of the most difficult transitions for a postmodern nonbeliever as it can feel dangerous, crazy and out of control. Openness is not a commitment to change. People who are open are simply admitting they are open to the possibility of change.
- Step 4: Spiritual seeking: The threshold in which a person moves from being essentially passive to being one who actively seeks to know the God who is calling him or her. Seekers are asking, "Are you the one to whom I will give myself?" At this stage, the seeker is engaged in an urgent spiritual quest, seeking to know whether he or she can commit to Christ and his Church.
- Step 5: Intentional discipleship: This is the decision to "drop one's nets," to make a conscious commitment to follow Jesus in the midst of his Church as an obedient disciple and to re-order one's life accordingly.

True discipleship is connecting with God in a personal way and being intentional about seeking out the ways to connect on regular basis.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE

For decades United Methodist Women at Grace was an organization which provided a means by



which ladies of the church could enjoy fellowship while in mission. Annual events like the Turkey Dinner, Valentine's Day meals, bazaars and other fund raising projects raised thousands of dollars for organizations in need.

In recent years however, membership in the Grace UMW dwindled from the group's heyday. On September, 18, UMW voted to end its tenure at Grace. President Elsie Mackie said she hopes there will be a new women's group formed - one that will meet the needs of current members who want to participate in mission projects with other women.

FINANCE COMMITTEE NEWS



On Wednesday, September 20, the Finance Committee met to develop a 2018 budget for Grace. A lengthy discussion of income and expenses ended with a proposal for the upcoming Charge Conference.

One of the issues discussed is the need for long term financial planning for the replacement of roofs, heating and air conditioning systems and other large ticket capital items. The Trustees recommended having a line item which would be funded through an active effort of savings. Those in attendance agreed that developing a budget for expenses is made difficult by not knowing how much

income would be received. There was also agreement that it was necessary to have funds on hand in the event of a catastrophic failure of a system or if a major expenditure was identified.

There was a discussion about the need for moving towards a program of stewardship which would help identify the amount of yearly income for the church.

Finance Committee members attending the meeting were Pastor Alan Layman, Dana Penney (chair), Bill Cheesman (Church Council Chair), Margie Byrd (Treasurer), Revell Lewis (Trustee Chair), Lisa Lewis (PPR Chair), Aaron Johnson (Trustee), Dottie Smith (Administrative Assistant).


