Under Pat O'Brien Watch As Chief Of Criminal Prosecutions For The Cook County State's Attorney's Office, The Office Wrongly Convicted At Least 27 People

As chief of criminal prosecutions for the Cook County State's Attorney's office, at least 27 people were wrongly convicted under Pat O'Brien's watch. According to contemporaneous media reports, O'Brien served as chief of criminal prosecutions for the state's attorney's office from at least March 1989 to the fall of 1993, when reports show he had left to open a private practice. According to multiple criminal justice databases, at least 27 people were wrongly convicted in Cook County from March 1989 to October 1993. The Innocence Project, the Northwestern University Bluhm Legal Clinic Center on Wrongful Convictions, and University of Michigan National Registry of Exonerations provide information about exonerations in the United States — cases in which a person was wrongly convicted of a crime and later cleared of all the charges based on new evidence of innocence.

O'Brien Appeared To Serve As Chief Of Criminal Prosecutions For The Cook County State's Attorney's Office From March 1989 To October 1993

The FOIA officer said the responsive records were previously destroyed and no longer available.

O'Brien, chief of the criminal prosecutions bureau, who prosecuted Williams with Lynne Kawamoto, said he believes the verdict marks the first conviction for second-degree attempted murder in Cook County, and perhaps Illinois, since a change in the law last year allowed such a finding.


