Founder and Executive Director, Allies for Change

Founded and directed a national network of social justice educators for thirteen years. Allies for Change provided education, training, and resources for individuals and organizations seeking to deepen their commitment to social justice and organizational change. Oversaw constituency development, marketing, fundraising, curriculum design, and training of new facilitators. Action and reflection formed the heart of every Allies for Change program with the goal of equipping participants to become effective, knowledgeable, and compassionate agents of structural change in their local communities.

Executive Director, Leaven Center

Co-founded Leaven in 1987, a non-profit organization dedicated to nurturing the relationship between spirituality and social justice. In 2000, co-founded the Leaven Center, a retreat and study center in mid-

Michigan serving people engaged in movements for social change. Oversaw constituency development, fundraising, grant writing, program development, supervision of staff, and administration of the day-to-day operations of the center.

Adjunct faculty

Graduate level courses in the fields of practical theology and social justice for seminary students at Chicago Theological Seminary and Methodist Theological School in Ohio. Courses included *United We Stand: Working to End Racism and Homophobia in Our Communities*, *Ministry on the Margins: The Joys & Perils of Unconventional Ministries* and *Doing Our Own Work: An Anti-Racism Intensive for White People*.

Pastor

Ordained in 1978 to ministry in the United Church of Christ. Began ministry as the first woman to serve a church in Bronson, Michigan. Pastored a Dutch congregation in Groningen, the Netherlands (1982-1985). In 1987, co-founded Phoenix Community Church in Kalamazoo, Michigan. Phoenix Community Church welcomed lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people from its inception and affiliated with the United Church of Christ in 1990.
