This may include local and out-of-state trips, student leadership opportunities, partnerships with local organizations, and the playing a variety of genres of music.

While the traditional instruments of orchestra are violin, viola, cello, and bass, if your student already plays a secondary or different instrument that isn't always included in a school ensemble (piano, harp, guitar) and would still like to be a part of orchestra, please let me know! It is possible we can work that into our ensemble, as my main priority is creating a space where all students belong.

COURSE OUTLINE

REQUIRED MATERIALS:

- Instrument & Accessories for instrument care
 - Violins and violas should have an instrument that includes a shoulder rest- if you need help acquiring one, please tell Ms. Gorham!
 - Cellos and basses should have a rock stop for their endpin. We have them available at the school for class and concert use, but it would be helpful to have one at home!
 - All instruments should have a soft cloth for cleaning and bow rosin again, if you need help getting any materials, please let Ms. Gorham know
- Music folder that includes all sheet music and handouts given throughout the school year
- Writing utensil (pencil, pen, etc.)
- School-provided laptop device

HOME LEARNING:

Students are encouraged to practice regularly on their own addition to their daily classes. Students are encouraged to aim for 150 minutes of practice time per week at home, although the quality of the practice is of utmost importance than the quantity. My priority is working with individual students to explore the best method of practice for them, as I understand not all living situations allow for practice due to quiet hours, adults working at home, and sibling childcare. In the first weeks of school, we will talk about practice strategies and students will identify a place and time they are able to practice on their own (at home, before or after school in a practice room, etc)

PERFORMANCES:

Participation in performances is a requirement for orchestra, as they serve as the culmination and summation of a student's learning during a particular timeframe. Not only is it a part of the students' grades, but attendance at these performances particularly influence the sound and camaraderie of the group. If students will need to miss performances, please follow the stated protocol below:

- 1. Students must provide a two weeks' notice of said absence prior to the performance. Absences that will be considered "excused" are, but not limited to, medical and family emergencies, school-sanctioned sports or clubs, and/or religious engagements. If it is impossible to give two weeks' notice, families should communicate with the director as soon as able and we will work out an alternative solution.
- 2. Students who successfully provide an early notice will be given an "excused" grade for the performance. The Director will provide students with an alternative assignment with the intent to simulate a performance that serves as a summative celebration of a student's learning. All alternative assignments will be under the discretion of the Director.

CONCERT SCHEDULE

The following outlines the <u>required</u> performances for the year. If other performance opportunities arise, such as a local organization partnership, fundraising opportunity, or in-school concert, students will be asked to perform as they are able but they will not be required.

Unless listed, all performances involve all orchestras (premier, intermediate, and concert).

*The overnight travel policies for Seattle Public Schools (SPS) middle school groups for the 2022-2023 school year are still being finalized at the time of writing this Handbook. The overnight trips indicated on the calendar are considered "To Be Determined" at this time, but the planning process (including the announcement of specific dates), will commence once the policies have been determined.

ENSEMBLES

PREMIER ORCHESTRA (**Period 1**) is an introductory level ensemble that **is open to** all students in grades 6-8 who have had 0-1 years' worth (or the equivalent) of stringed instrument experience. Students will learn the concepts of music theory and will explore how to play a violin, viola, cello, or bass in an individual and group setting. The class will emphasize structured skill development through method books and music designed for beginning musicians. This is a full year class and will perform at all 3 school concerts (Winter, Spring, and End of Year)

INTERMEDIATE ORCHESTRA (**Period 2**) is an intermediate level ensemble and **is open to all students in grades 6-8** who have had 1-2 years' worth (or the equivalent) of experience on their instrument. Students will continue to develop their musical knowledge and skills, as well as learn more techniques/concepts through method books and playing intermediate level musical works. Students will also work in small ensembles (duets, trios, and quartets). This is a full year class and will perform at all 3 school concerts (Winter, Spring, and End of Year). Students formerly in Premier Orchestra will be automatically moved up to Intermediate Orchestra.

CONCERT ORCHESTRA (**Period 3**) is the highest level ensemble and is open to all students in grades 6-8 who have had 2+ years' worth (or the equivalent) of stringed instrument experience. Students will continue to develop their musical knowledge and skills, as well as learn more advanced techniques/concepts through innovative new music and traditional orchestra music. Students will also work in small ensembles (duets, trios, and quartets). This is a full year class and will perform at all 3 school concerts (Winter, Spring, and End of Year) Students formerly in Intermediate Orchestra will be automatically moved up to Concert Orchestra. Students in Premier Orchestra wishing to join Concert Orchestra will need to get director permission at the end of the school year.

MAKEUP/LATE WORK POLICY

Students will have the opportunity to make up an absence from missed graded performances if they informed the Director within two weeks prior to the absence. For written assignments and projects, students can submit their missing work up until the last day of the given quarter **without any penalty**. However, in the gradebook, the assignment will be marked as "L1" with a "Missing" mark as a placeholder until the assignment is submitted. If the assignment is not submitted, it will remain as an L1 in the gradebook.

INSTRUMENT LOANING & SUPPLIES

Students who are in need of borrowing school instruments will be able to do so for free from the school inventory, with approval from the Director and completion of the Instrument Rental Form.

Students wishing to <u>purchase or rent</u> their own instruments can do so with local instrumental music vendors. Method Books:

If you are able to purchase a method book, I ask that you do! If your student would like to use a school copy, we will have them available.

NOTE: When purchasing method books, please make sure that you choose the book for the instrument that your student plays. The instrument version is indicated at the top of the book.

PROGRAM FEE

The following are the anticipated costs associated with the orchestra's operations and events/performances for this year. Please note that the Director and FORESMA are committed to working with families to ensure that EACH and EVERY students who is interested in participating in all activities are able to do so, regardless of each family's financial situation. If your family anticipates a difficulty in covering the expenses for your student, please contact me directly.

In order to help meet some of our financial needs, we are requesting a \$40 program fee to those who can help provide financial assistance for the music program's operations costs. Please note that paying the activity fee is NOT mandatory and will NOT have a negative effect on your student's participation in music. The activity fee donation provides aid for the following:

- Sheet music for the Bands and Orchestras
- Instrument purchases and repairs
- Transportation to local and overnight activities
- Financial assistance/scholarships for students
- Festival fee performance supplements
- Specialized private instructors and guest clinicians

UNIFORM INFORMATION

In addition to the sounds of the ensembles, an integral component of a performance is the visual aesthetics of the ensemble. Students are required to dress in conjunction with the uniform policies for every performance, to achieve uniformity within the group. Dressing appropriately and respectfully will promote a sense of professionalism and respect for their audience and fellow student musicians.

Students are responsible for acquiring their own uniform requirements (unless otherwise noted), but please note that we will have an inventory of uniform parts for those in need. *If you need*

assistance on where to find a specific article of clothing, or if you need assistance in acquiring uniform parts, please contact Ms. Gorham directly

CONCERT ATTIRE FOR ALL ORCHESTRAS:

- "Concert Black"
- Listed below are examples that students can wear. Please note that students are not limited to these examples and are non-discriminatory to how students identify themselves (gender, culture, religion, etc.). Students can choose to wear an all-black concert attire not on the list, pending approval from the Director.
 - All black button down shirt or tuxedo/suit
 - All black dress
 - o All black pants/slacks/leggings/stockings
 - o All black cultural/religious clothing
 - All black socks
 - All black shoes

PERFORMANCE ETTIQUETTE

An integral part of the performance experience is the tone and atmosphere that is established for the environment. In order to ensure a professional and traditional setting, students are to follow the guidelines listed below as a performer and as an audience member. We will practice these expectations in class.

AS A PERFORMER:

- Dress in accordance to the uniform attire
- Bring all music stored in a folder to the stage
- Make sure all instrument parts are present and secured
- Silence or turn off electronic devices
- No eating or drinking on stage
- Enter and exit the stage in a timely and organized manner
- Be respectful, classy, and positive at all times.

AS AN AUDIENCE MEMBER:

 Attend the entire concert as much as possible out of respect to the efforts, dedication, and learning of all those involved. Audience members are expected to stay seated and only permitted to leave or enter the concert in-between selections or ensemble transitions

- Silence or turn off electronic devices
- Refrain from holding conversations during the performance of a piece
- Please refrain from eating or drinking in the middle of a performance
 - Audience members are encouraged to participate in the bake sales before and after the concert, as well as during transitions
- Applaud for the performance of your few student musicians at the end of a piece when the conductor <u>lowers their hands</u>, and at the bow of the group
 - o Appropriate to applaud after a solo during a Jazz Band performance
- Be respectful, classy, and positive at all times. Be a representative of the school!

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

PRACTICE ROOMS:

There are 5 practice rooms located in the Band Room. Students are welcome to use the practice rooms for individual rehearsals, small group sectionals/practices, and composition/arranging projects. The practice rooms will be open an hour before school starts, during lunch, and an hour after school ends. Students are not permitted to use the practice room outside of those hours and the Director must be present.

ROOM MAINTENANCE:

In order to preserve the cleanliness of our room and materials, students are not allowed to eat or drink in the orchestra room or practice rooms, except for water. Students will also be expected to clean and pick up any belongings in their personal area during rehearsals and practice rooms, including personal items, sheet music, and instrument parts.
