





# Outreach, Engagement & Education

### **Bee Day**

In June, KDB cohosted the third annual Durham Bee Day Festival in celebration of National Pollinator Week. Over 250 people attended to help protect pollinators, sample honey, observe demonstration hives, and join a parade. KDB distributed native seeds and 520 native plants.

Bee Day partners included Durham Bee City USA, Durham Farmers Market, We Plant it Forward, Durham County Beekeepers Association, NC Native Plant Society, New Hope Audubon Society, Durham County Master Gardeners, NCSU Entomology, and the NC Wildlife Federation.

### **Waste Wise Event Guide**

The Waste Wise Event Guide was created by undergraduate students at Duke University as part of the Penny Pilgram George Women's Leadership Initiative, in collaboration with Keep Durham Beautiful and the City of Durham. This comprehensive 28-page guide promotes a sustainability-focused approach to event planning. Topics covered include planning, permitting, food management, and energy and emission goals. Additionally, the guide features accessible resources and printables that provide information on recycling, disposal, and relevant government policies.











### **Durham Environmental Coalition**

Keep Durham Beautiful helps host and co-lead the Durham Environmental Coalition (DEC). A collaboration of 33 diverse organizations, the DEC envisions an equitable environmental movement that values biodiversity, sustainability, and inclusive decision-making. At its core, the DEC addresses critical issues in the environmental sector, including the underrepresentation of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) in environmental initiatives. The coalition actively works to amplify BIPOC voices and organizations, fostering a more inclusive and representative environmental movement.

In 2024, the DEC hosted a series of impactful monthly meetings including presentations by the Durham Reuse Hub, Circular Triangle, Triangle Native American Society, Preserve Rural Durham, NC Clean Energy Fund, Triangle Land Conservancy, the BOOST Program, Justin Robinson, and the Black Farmers Market.



### Creek Week

Creek Week is recognized as the second largest cleanup event of the year, emphasizing the importance of clean water. During the spring, KDB and its partner organizations came together for a week-long initiative, successfully gathering 12,574 pounds of litter and 25 discarded tires. Furthermore, 17 educational events focused on our waterways engaged over 980 participants. A total of 446 volunteers dedicated their time across 44 events, contributing to 941 hours of effort for Creek Week. This initiative flourishes due to the steadfast support of our partners.



### **Tree Identification Walks**

During the transition from winter to spring, KDB organized four tree identification walks led by Alex Johnson from the City of Durham Forestry and Matt Archibald from Leaf and Limb. These walks, co-sponsored by Durham County Open Space Program, taught participants to identify common tree species, regardless of whether they had leaves, by examining characteristics such as bark texture, branch structure, and apical buds.



In Fall 2024, Keep Durham Beautiful actively engaged with 60 students in various activities across four parks in partnership with City of Durham Parks and Recreation. These interactive lessons emphasized the harmful effects of litter on waterways. The sessions included an overview of watersheds, demonstrating how litter moves through wind, water, and human behavior, along with its consequences for flooding, wildlife, and the environment.

### **Pumpkin Drop**

Keep Durham Beautiful partnered with the City of Durham Solid Waste and Durham Parks & Recreation to collect holiday pumpkins and squash from November 2 to December 7 at the Waste Disposal & Recycling Center as well as several city parks. This year's pumpkin drop resulted in the collection of 296 pumpkins over five weekends, totaling a weight of 3,848 pounds diverted from the landfill!







### **BioBlitz**

A bioblitz is a citizen science initiative aimed at recording and cataloging biodiversity within a designated area over a specific timeframe. In May, our collaborative 2024 Durham BioBlitz concluded with 411 observers and 497 identifiers documenting 3,317 observations of 1,029 unique species over the course of two weeks.

# Litter Prevention

### **Big Sweep**

Big Sweep is Durham's largest litter cleanup initiative, held each year throughout the month of October. This year, a variety of groups united at 48 different locations to contribute to a cleaner, greener, and more beautiful Durham.

### Adopt-a-Street

Adopt-a-Street groups choose a 1-mile stretch of City-Maintained roadway and commit to removing litter along their adopted stretch once a month for a year. We are proud off the 850 volunteers that have participated in Adopt-a-Street in 2024 to collect over 8,500 pounds of litter in over 1,300 hours of volunteer service.

### **Cigarette Litter Prevention**

KDB has taken action to address the harmful and often ignored issue of cigarette litter by organizing cleanup events across the community. In collaboration with Go Durham, KDB focused on cleaning bus stops during the MLK Day of Service. A total of eleven volunteers came together to collect an impressive 14,215 cigarette butts in just two hours. This effort not only beautified public transit areas but also played a crucial role in safeguarding water quality and wildlife from the dangers and toxins associated with cigarette butts, which are non-biodegradable and the most commonly littered item in the United States.







# **Community Greening**

### **Tree Plantings**

### **OmniAb Tree Planting**

OmniAb sponsored a street tree planting on E. Lawson Street of 30 native trees. They brought 13 volunteers who joined KDB staff and 2 tree keepers. The team also cleared a sidewalk and picked up two bags of litter.

#### **Duke Medical Students Tree Planting**

Eight volunteers came together to plant 26 trees along North Mangum, East Seeman, and East Trinity, enhancing the area around the Durham Nativity School.

### **Durham Academy Tree Planting**

Ninety eighth-grade students, along with volunteers, planted 85 native trees at an affordable housing site in collaboration with Reinvestment Partners.

#### Alpha Kappa Alpha Tree Planting

In November, 35 members of the Alpha Zeta Omega chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority and volunteers planted 20 trees across Lowes Grove Elementary School.

#### **ECWA and Ambata Property Tree Planting**

In collaboration with the Ellerbe Creek Watershed Association (ECWA) and Ambata Property, 25 dedicated volunteers came together to plant 25 trees along the Pearl Mill Nature Preserve and Bioretention Pond.

#### DCo Sustainability Mitzvah Day Planting

On December 25th, 25 volunteers joined Durham County Sustainability to plant 21 trees at the Durham Center for Senior Life as part of the Jewish for Good Mitzvah Day projects.

These trees will help to lower nearby temperatures, reduce heat island effect, buffer noise from roadways, filter stormwater, provide habitat for local wildlife, reduce erosion, and make Durham a greener place for everyone.









### Tree, Bulb, and Seed Giveaways

Throughout the year, KDB hosts tree, plant and seed giveaway events. These events encourage planting native species and expand the urban tree canopy with the help of community members in both public and private spaces.

### **Bulb Blitz**

KDB distributed 22,000 donated flower bulbs to 117 Durham community groups to beautify spaces across Durham that are visible to the public for all to enjoy.





### **Tree Giveaway**

KDB distributed 505 native trees to Durham residents to plant on private can community property. These trees will bring health and ecosystem benefits to those who planted them as well as surrounding communities.



### **Invasive Species Removal**

Thanks to our dedicated volunteer leaders, KDB has successfully organized nine invasive species removal events across five locations around Durham. Removing invasive species is vital for the health of our native plants. During these events, volunteers acquired valuable techniques for removal, including digging, cutting, and applying pesticide. Local parks that have benefitted from removals are Forest Hills, Piney Wood, White Oak Park, and Rocky Creek.

### **Durham Community Garden Network**

In 2024, the Durham Community Garden Network was established. Its purpose is to connect community garden leaders year-round, fostering the exchange of ideas, inquiries, and mutual support. Two meetings were hosted: the spring gathering in March took place at the Durham Public Schools Hub Farm. This 30-acre outdoor learning center provided an ideal backdrop for the meeting, emphasizing the educational potential of community gardens. This meeting developed the base network goals.

The network's fall meeting took place at SEEDS, a two-acre urban garden and kitchen classroom in the heart of Durham. This gathering featured a tour led by Erin Holden, the executive director of SEEDS, showcasing the organization's initiatives and garden spaces.







# Sustainable Landscaping

### **Durham Garden Tour**

In 2024, KDB hosted its first Durham Garden Tour, featuring eight private gardens and two public gardens with distinct styles and emphasis on native planting. Enthusiastic participants joined a garden preview reception at SEEDS before the tour before wandering through lush landscapes.

Each garden provided unique insights into sustainable practices and innovative landscaping. From vibrant flower beds to crevice gardening, the tour celebrated the beauty and practicality of eco-friendly gardening. Attendees enjoyed meeting garden owners and learning about native plants and the advantages of pollinator-friendly habitats. The event honored not only the artistry of gardening but also nurtured a sense of community and environmental responsibility among residents. Ultimately, the fundraiser sold over 250 tickets to support the work of KDB.







## **Sustainable Landscaping Staff Training**

In October, KDB arranged a training for 33 Durham City, County and Public School operations staff to learn about sustainable landscaping practices. Discussion topics included ordinances & policies, landscape management principles, and cost & energy savings opportunities.

### **Beyond the Backyard Forum**

**Forum:** In September, KDB's two-day Beyond the Backyard forum and tours welcomed 145 participants for six presentations centered on sustainable landscaping. Discussions highlighted topics such as incorporating native foods, herbaceous plantings, stormwater management, homeowners' association best practices, and the environmental impact of landscaping practices.

**Tours:** Participants toured six landscape sites to observe the incorporation of native plants in public and large-format landscapes. We explored how public areas can be redesigned to support native species, enhance biodiversity, minimize greenhouse gas emissions, and reduce long-term operational costs.









## Volunteer Highlights

### **Earth Month**

In April, KDB celebrated Earth Month with 432 volunteers removing 6,437 pounds of litter across 11 locations. Activities included a native plant swap, a tree identification walk, a Sustainable Spirits event, and participation in the Mayor's Corporate Earth Day Challenge. They also hosted an educational exhibit at the Durham Earth Day Festival and distributed free native trees.



### MLK Day of Service

In tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., KDB organized a series of 20 community service initiatives throughout Durham, involving community partners and board members. Through these events, a total of 357 volunteers collected 8,930.475 pounds of litter from various Durham neighborhoods. Additionally, volunteers planted 450 bulbs, gathered more than 5,000 cigarette butts from Durham Station, retrieved 84 tires, and spread mulch in a garden collaboration with the Scrap Exchange event.
