A Note from Rabbi Javier Cattapan

Chesed and the Limits of Forgiveness

Our ancient rabbis teach, "For transgressions that are between man and God the Day of Atone-

ment effects atonement, but for transgressions that are between man and his fellow the Day of Atonement effects atonement only if he has appeased his fellow." (*Mishnah, Yoma* 8:9). Their teaching is echoed in the liturgy of Yom Kippur. We are reminded that transgressions between individuals are not absolved by the rituals we perform at the synagogue, unless one is willing to make restitution of what we owe and beg the forgiveness of our neighbor. It is always up to the offender to take the first step towards teshuvah, repentance and return.

Following the Talmud, the great Medieval scholar, Moses Maimonides teaches that one is obliged to appease those whom we have offended and implore their forgiveness. Tradition prescribes that "If his neighbor refuses he should bring a committee of three friends to forgive him to implore and beg of him; if he still refuses he should bring a second, even a third committee, and if he remains obstinate, he may leave him to himself and pass on, for the transgression then rests upon him who refuses forgiveness." (Maimonides, Hilchot Teshuvah, 2:10).

It is clear that the onus of asking for forgiveness is placed on the transgressor, but I wonder what responsibility the offended party bears on someone else's process of teshuvah, repentance. If we all chose to remain obstinate and refuse to "play the game," the world that we may create is one where forgiveness between individuals is no longer possible; a world in which we may not want to live.

But are there any limits to forgiveness? When we put our trust on someone whom we love, and our trust is betrayed, is forgiveness the answer? Our tradition does not teach that we should simply forgive and forget. Rather, the process of *teshuvah*, which must include asking for forgiveness, is done in front of witnesses (three friends, three times). So, *teshuvah* is a public act that must lead to reconciliation, both in a family, in a community, and in a nation.

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The year 5778 has been a tumultuous year in our country as well as in Israel. Within the Jewish community alone, we have had profound disagreements: from the decision to move the American Embassy to Jerusalem to the moral implications of the violence at the Gaza border. On top of that, we have been awakened by #MeToo, and discouraged by the inhumane treatment of migrant families at our Southern border. We desperately need to find reconciliation in 5779, but how?

First, we must remember that it is a mitzvah to forgive and be part of the teshuvah process of those who have offended us, which in turn, requires that we maintain some relationship with them. It is not easy but we need to keep an open

dialogue with those on the other side of any debate. Only from a relationship can forgiveness flow.

And secondly, teshuvah requires a significant dose of *chesed*, compassion and care on our part. Chesed, not just patience, can help us understand others and find a way to forgive. When fear, hatred and bitterness remain strong, we must turn inward first, to find empathy and chesed. Given the historical or personal circumstances in which we may find ourselves, to ponder granting forgiveness or seeking it might not be our first inclination. With chesed, forgiveness and reconciliation are possible, and they are the only way toward healing a broken and divided family, community, and society.



Rabbi Cattapan wrote in his article a while back how Beth Torah would be all together for the upcoming High Holy Days. No more early/late/contemporary/traditional... but one congregation, in our beautiful sanctuary, before God. I am so looking forward to that. But did you know that some other new items are coming your way for the upcoming High Holy Days? Here is a little preview of what to expect as we welcome 5779:

The mailing and tickets: The mailing piece you get in your physical mailbox will look different this year. Our dedicated, talented member, Laura Bolter, is designing a booklet that will have vital information, but most of the sign-up sheets that you are used to filling out and mailing back will be online, as well as the ability to pay for your extra tickets, babysitting and your Book of Remembrance submissions. Of course, you can always call us at the office and we can take care of any of the administrative pieces of the Holy Days right over the phone too. You can also check the website, and the booklet for information on parking, ticket requirements, and volunteer participation.

The schedule: Please be sure to check out the High Holy Day schedule at https://beth-torah.org/hhdworshipschedule. You can peruse it online or print a PDF to hang on your fridge. Some new items you will see on the schedule are: a Rosh Hashanah light lunch, the Yom Kippur Tikkun Service, the Study Sessions placement during Yom Kippur, the morning Family Experiences and our Sukkot morning Study in the Sukkah session.

The High Holy Day Appeal: Our President, Barry Katz, has been reminding the congregation to say "Yes" to Beth Torah for over a year now. This year, all of us together will have that opportunity during our first ever High Holy Day appeal. Our hope is that every member of the congregation will reach out in the spirit of hope, optimism and generosity and contribute to the greater good as we go forward as a community. The goal for participation numbers? 100% of course. Look for more information coming in your High Holy Day mailer and in our upcoming CBT E-News, our website and on our Facebook page. Keep your heart and your mind open as we enter the Days of Awe.

The Sound: Anyone who has spent any time in our sanctuary knows that what you hear depends on where you sit. The spiritual and beautiful music that our musicians produce and the words that our rabbis share are only as good as our sound delivery system. Thanks to a gift by the Shik family from the Paul and Doris Flam Donor Advised Fund, we have upgraded our sound system, achieving the goal of consistent and clear sound in the entirety of the room. Sit where you like and you will hear the nuances of the cello at Kol Nidre and the blast of shofar at Rosh Hashanah with the same clarity.

Name Tags: According to Dr. Ron Wolfson, the author of Relational Judaism,, "one of the most pervasive-incorrect-assumptions in Jewish organizations, especially synagogues, is that everyone knows everyone else's name. This couldn't not be further from the truth..." So, this year we will have prepared name tags for everyone available on a display when you walk in the door. Take yours if you would like when you come in and then leave it behind when you leave the building. Maybe there is someone you have seen every year at the Holy Days and you didn't know their name. Maybe someone has seen you and didn't know YOUR name. Name tags are an important way to connect. May 5779 be the beginning of new connections for us all.

So, that is what's Nu. But what is a constant is meaningful worship, spiritual and beautiful music and community. YOUR Beth Torah community. The one People, in our sanctuary, that will be with you as, together, we return again and restore the light that is within us.

The Mighty Chorus

Carmen and Nanette and I have had a blast rehearsing so far this summer with our High Holy Day Chorus.

Our Chorus is conducted by Carmen Dieker, and accompanied by Nanette Kraus. The group will rehearse on these remaining Wednesday evenings, 7:00 – 8:30 p.m.:

August 1st (working on Kol Nidre)

August 15th (working on Erev Rosh HaShanah and N'ilah)

August 22nd (working on Kol Nidre)

August 29th (working on Selichot)

September 5th (working on Erev Rosh HaShanah and N'ilah) September 12th (working on Kol Nidre)





One Big Service for Kol Nidre, and More

Remember that this year there will be one single Kol Nidre service, held at 7:30 p.m. on September 18th, with everyone praying together. New this year, the musical approach to the historically Early Kol Nidre service (the instrumental textures of the High Holy Day Band) and the musical approach to the historically Late Kol Nidre service (choral music) will be woven together into one integrated whole.

Just like the Erev Rosh HaShanah service.

Many years ago, Beth Torah held two Erev Rosh Hashanah services, not just one. (We similarly held two Kol Nidre services, two Rosh HaShanah Morning services, etc.) The Early Erev Rosh Hashanah service was labeled "traditional," and used the Gates of Repentance prayer book, featuring choral music. The Late Erev Rosh Hashanah service was labeled "contemporary," and used the Paths of Repentance prayer book, with our normal guitar/bass instrumentation.

When Beth Torah made the decision to move to just one Erev Rosh Hashanah service, this became a combined, or blended, service.

> Last year, the integration of our new machzor, one prayer book for all services, afforded us the opportunity to take a similar approach to the full integration of our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Morning services as well. We invited our clergy and musicians to weave together both our traditionally beloved High Holy Day choral settings and that band vibe that is core to our Friday night Shabbat services.

The result was a weaving together of diverse musical styles within one seamless service. And we offered an "Early" version of that service and a "Late" version; duplicate services.

Now, this year, our Kol Nidre service will follow the same model of our historical Erev Rosh HaShanah,

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N'ilah, Rosh HaShanah Morning, and Yom Kippur Morning services. At 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday evening, September 18th, we will all come together as one big congregation to pray together, our High Holy Day Chorus and our High Holy Day Band joining their voices and their instruments in harmony.


Jewish Community Prepares for High Holy Days with Community-Wide Selichot Program and Service at Beth Torah

The community is invited to participate in a city-wide Selichot program and service on **Saturday, September 1st**, at Congregation Beth Torah. Selichot is an opportunity to examine one's deeds of the past year, directing one's heart and mind to the process of teshuvah (repentance), and seeking forgiveness. Some of the prayers and music found in the Selichot service are taken from the High Holy Day liturgy, thus providing a musical transition between the "old year" and the New Year. The evening will begin with a dessert reception at 8:00 p.m. and will be followed by Havdalah at 8:45 p.m. At 9:00 p.m., Rabbis will lead sessions examining *The Limits of Forgiveness*.

The Selichot service begins at 10:10 p.m. and is designed to help worshipers begin to spiritually prepare for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The service will be led by area clergy and musicians. 
