EIGHTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST Sunday, 18 July 2021

THE MUSIC AND READINGS FOR TODAY'S LITURGY

An able musician, Martin Luther (1483–1546) instinctively understood music's role in proclamation, prayer, and teaching. He was an advocate for musical instruction in schools and churches; he also encouraged his colleagues and students to pursue their musical gifts.

For this reason, Lutherans have embraced varied forms of musical expressions in worship from plainsong and solo pieces to large choral and orchestral works, and everything in between. It was this context that allowed Johann Sebastian Bach (1685–1750) to be trained and then later serve as a Lutheran cantor, or church musician.

Today's liturgy includes the cantata *lch habe genug*, BWV 82, one of the more well-known solo cantatas that features a baritone soloist, strings, and hauntingly beautiful oboe part. This work was partially chosen for its flexibility and adaptability to various spaces and contexts—allowing this important LSM tradition to flourish even during times of change and uncertainty. It was first performed on 2 February 1727 and later adapted by Bach for different voice types and instruments. The cantata is sung in place of the first reading and psalm.

The service also includes two mass movements by Joseph Haydn (composed when he was 17 years old) as well as a short organ work by Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy (composed when he was 14 years old).

In today's readings, Mark's gospel makes clear how great is the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves—listen for similar themes in the cantata, and look for connections between the cantata text and the hymn paraphrase of Psalm 23 that we sing at communion.


Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. We are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves.

ABOUT COMMUNION

Trusting in his forgiveness that follows our repentance, our Lord Jesus Christ welcomes you to this meal of the baptized. The crucified and risen Christ is truly present in the Lord's Supper, giving us his body and blood as food and drink.

We will commune beginning with those on the south (Helge Center) side and followed by those on the north (Union) side. Communion is served up the steps in the chancel. Ascend the steps on the right side to receive an individual cup, then walk to an open space in the appropriate section at the altar rail where you may kneel or stand (see diagram below). Receive the bread first with an open hand and immediately eat. The bread is gluten-free and dairy-free.

No one is required to commune. Alternatively, you are welcome to receive a blessing with those communing by crossing your arms and hands over your shoulders. If your own church tradition or personal conviction would not have you commune, you may remain in your chair to help us sing and, in the spirit of our sung Kyrie, pray "for the peace of the whole world, for the well-being of the church of God, and for the unity of all."




