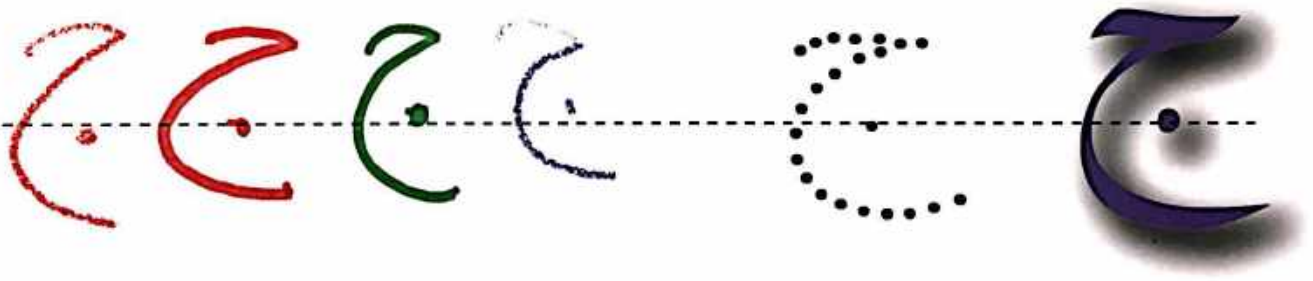

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Parent, Teacher Guide

Early start is a good start. When your child is about ready to hold a pencil and draw a square, a curve, a circle and a straight line, he or she is ready to start writing alphabets. While a regular school will work on developing English writing skills, as a parent and an Islamic school teacher, you should help your child develop Arabic writing skills.

Most students will learn writing Arabic letters and small words by the time they are five to six years of age.

For each page, your child should practice writing the letters and small words. Do not push him/her to write too many of the same letter or word. Do not push him/her to the point of frustration. Take it easy with them but at the same time encourage them to learn and remember. In the first half of the book, after every few pages, there is a review page to check the progress and reinforce learning.

This workbook is not intended to teach tajweed rules. The placement and significance of different vowel marks have intricate rules. These rules should be learned with the help of a teacher who is qualified to teach tajweed.

When you are working with your child, make sure he or she is enjoying the exercise. Make his or her learning time fun, secure and rewarding. Remember, in the beginning your child may not be able to write perfect shapes of the letters. A word of genuine and specific praise will encourage the child.

Remember, proper posture and paper placement will help your child write more correctly and clearly. Below are the paper positions recommended in most writing programs.

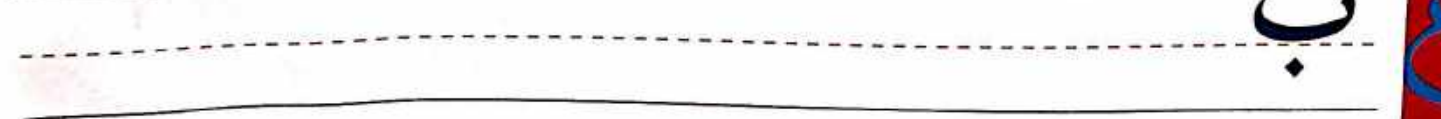
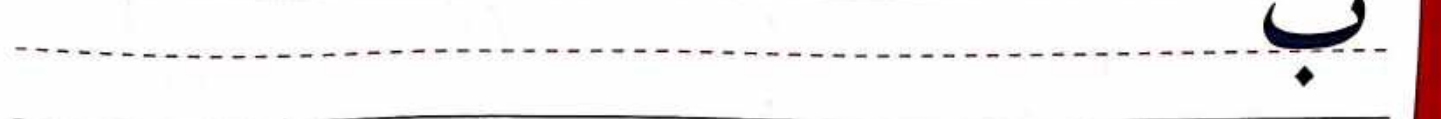
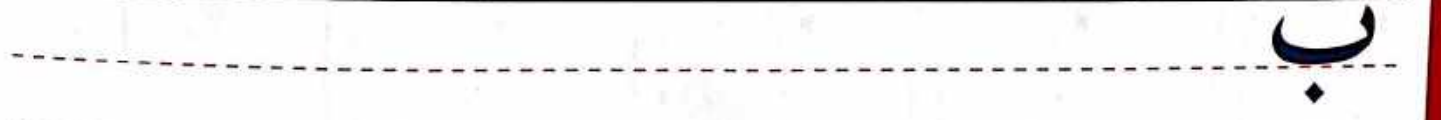
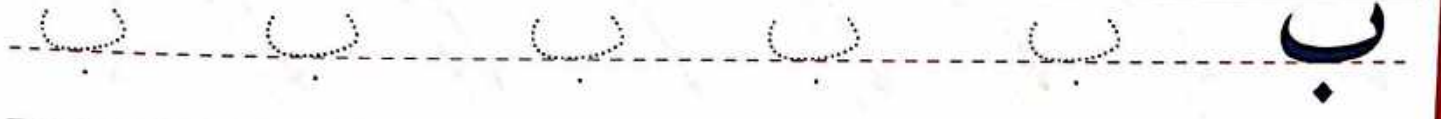
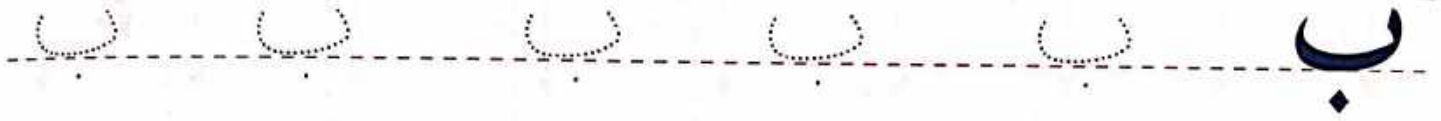
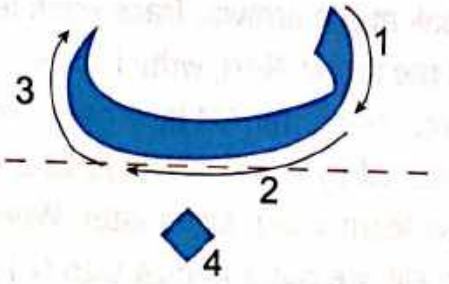
Learning letter Alif

Until this point, we learned writing individual Arabic letters. When these letters are written to form a word or a sentence, they are written in a joined-up form. The shapes of many of the letters change as they join with the alphabet before it or after it. Many a times, the same letter changes its shape depending upon whether it is used in the beginning, middle or end of a word. In English writing we do not see such changes in the shapes of letters.

We must, therefore, learn and practice the different forms of the Arabic alphabets so that we can read the words and sentences. Also, in Arabic, the vowel marks are used to facilitate reading. We will learn the vowel marks later in this workbook.

Each letter has four forms. These forms are: the letter by itself, beginning-, middle- and end-shapes. Below is a table showing the examples of the four forms. Note that some letters do not have a middle form.

Let us now learn some other forms of vowel marks. The Arabic vowel marks fatha, kasra, and damma are sometimes doubled. When doubled, they are known as tanween. When tanween is used, the sound of the vowel mark changes.

Practice with long vowels

Three Arabic letters are also used to make the sound of the short vowel long. For example, when a fatha sign is followed by an Alif, the sound of fatha is made longer. The "a" sound of fatha now sounds like "aa".

In this example, fatha sign is followed by an alif. The sound of fatha "a" will now become long, like "aa".

Ba fatha followed by an alif makes sound of "ba" long - "baa".

In this example, kasra sign is followed by a ya. The sound of kasra "i" will now become long, like "ee".

Ba kasra followed by a ya makes sound of "bi" long - "bee".

In this example, damma sign is followed by a waaw. The sound of fatha "u" will now become long, like "oo".

Ba damma followed by a waaw makes sound of "bu" long - "boo".

When one alif is followed by another alif, their sound becomes long. The long sound is indicated by a special curved sign placed on top of alif. It is called alif al-madd.

Practice with sukoon

Sukoon is a sign placed on top of a letter. The sukoon signs used in the Qur'ān and in standard Arabic writing are different. In standard Arabic writing, the sukoon sign is a small circle (◌◌) placed on top of a letter. It would mean the sound of the letter is shortened. For example, lam becomes "l", kaaf becomes "k" and so on.

However, in the Qur'ān, the sign (◌◌) would indicate the letter is not pronounced at all. In the Qur'ān, the sukoon sign is a small flat half-circle (◌◌), which means the sound of the letter is shortened.

Practice with shadda

Shadda is a sign placed on top of a letter to indicate that the letter is doubled. Unlike in English, the letter itself is not written twice, but the sign indicates double usage. As such the sound of the letter is made stronger. A shadda is used alone or in combination with a short vowel or with a tanween.

R+a+b+b = Rabb

Here "b" is doubled. But in Arabic writing, two of the same letters are not written side by side. Instead, a shadda sign is used.
