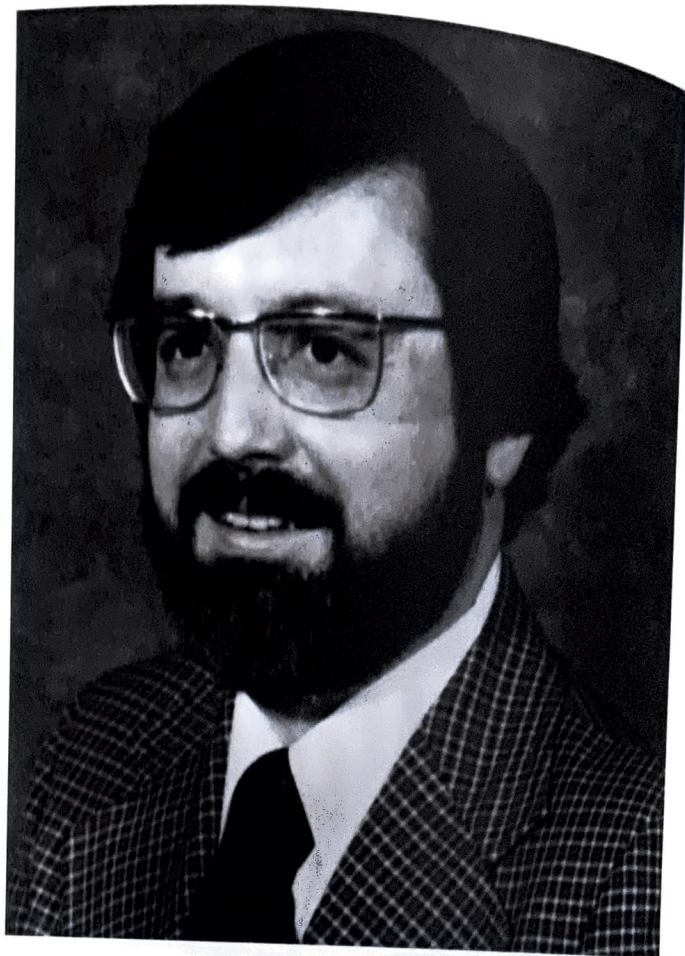


THE GRAND REGENT

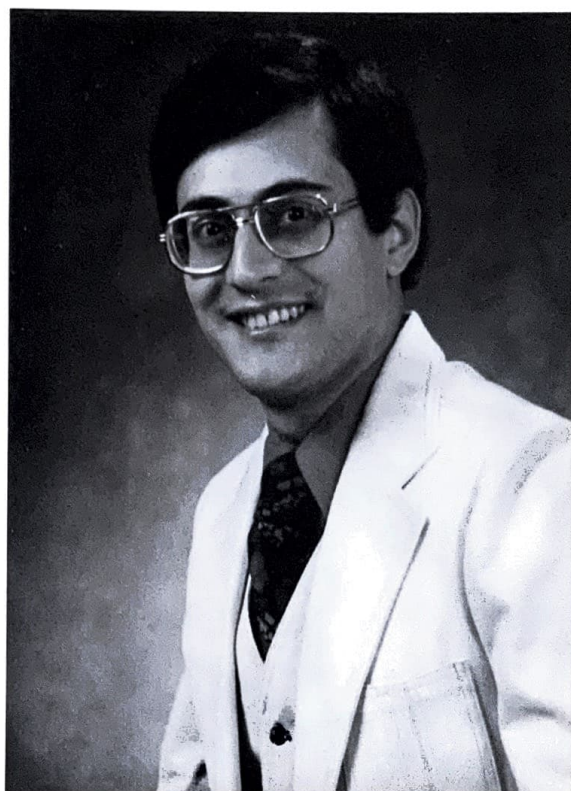


