### Assessment process for a return to play for Lacrosse

This plan provides measures that should be taken by players, clubs, officials, coaches and others associated with playing lacrosse, before, during and after all outdoor Lacrosse activity. It should be read in conjunction with the latest UK Government guidance and EL guidance

This document refers to current UK Government guidance for England only and is subject to change in response to the current Covid-19 Alert Level, community prevalence of Covid-19 and to reflect additional or updated Government guidance.

### Identify-

- Lacrosse is a game played by people carrying a 1 metre length stick. This in itself helps to maintain some element of social distancing. Whilst it is recognised there will be contact along the way it will rarely be for longer than the 3 sec time frame and rarely be face to face.
- No one will handle the ball as all can use their sticks removing a handling potential transfer of the virus
- The key elements of the game where this is more likely to happen are the starts and restarts. (Face Off and Draw)
- There is also an element of risk in the pre match officials tasks



#### Use

 The game will have an adapted start to make sure there is no close contact between players and officials.

#### Clean and Protect

- Non-Contact thermometer to be able to take temperature on arrival at the site
- Anyone recording a high temperature (over 37c) to return home immediately
- Keep a record of the temperatures on the check in register
- Hygiene standards will be heightened and enforced
- Sanitiser should be carried by each player and antibacterial wipes for equipment
- The club or venue should also provide sanitiser
- Equipment to be cleaned before and after use

Toilets	Toilet etiquette and cleaning	Use signs and posters to build awareness of good handwashing technique, the need to increase handwashing frequency and to avoid touching your face, and to cough or sneeze into a tissue which is binned safely.  Use of social distancing marking in areas where queues normally form, and the adoption of a limited entry approach, with one in, one out (whilst avoiding the creation of additional bottlenecks).
		Hand sanitiser available on entry to toilets where



safe and practical, handwashing facilities including running water and liquid soap and suitable options for drying (either paper towels or hand driers) are available.

		If facilities remain closed, exceptions must be made for essential activity such as provision of first-aid or access to essential equipment for the match. Exceptions may be made where safety and safeguarding measures require their use, e.g. supporting disability athletes, a child needs a change of clothing etc.

Spectators	Groups of spectators	To be in groups of no more than 6 people and maintaining social distancing of 1+m, clubs to set a maximum number of spectators
