*April is the cruellest month, breeding

Memory and desire, stirring
Dull roots with spring rain.*

Eliot knew the ritual of art making is how regeneration occurs after destruction. If art is the alchemical process of creating meaning out of chaos, then it can serve as the antidote for a splintered culture. *The Cruellest Month* rallies a congress of artworks to reflect and refract, restoring the balance to life as we know it. It is not a singular voice that guides us, but the din of many voices.
