# GREETINGS FROM IOWA HILLEL

A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

IN JANUARY 1926, THERE WAS AN ANNOUNCEMENT ABOUT ELECTIONS FOR THE HILLEL STUDENT BOARD IN THE DAILY IOWAN - THIS ANNOUNCEMENT WAS THE FIRST RECORD OF HILLEL ON THE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA'S CAMPUS.

I learned that fun fact during services at Agudas Achim my first Shabbat as a Hawkeye, having just moved to Iowa City in June 2019. The knowledge that nearly 100 years ago we had Jewish students at Iowa forming friendships through Iowa Hillel has stuck with me.

Since then, I have learned so much more about Iowa Hillel from our students, alumni, parents, and the community. I have learned about the friendships (and future marriages) made during Shabbat dinner, the students who came to Iowa never seeing themselves as "Jewish enough" leading prayers at services, and the quiet freshmen who became leaders on the student board. Iowa Hillel has given generations upon generations of students a place to be unapologetically Jewish and a place to make Jewish friends; a place where you belonged and a community with which to surround yourself.

Our students today are yearning for that same sense of community and belonging. I moved to Iowa City to become the executive director because I want Jewish life for young adults to do more than survive. I want it to thrive. And that is why I have upped the ante. Iowa Hillel now has three full-time employees, and we plan to hire a program director this spring. With the increased staff we had at the beginning of this past semester, we were able to engage almost as many Jewish students this past semester than in the entire last school year, and that was during a global pandemic. And we are just getting started.

For lowa Hillel to provide a welcoming space for each and every one of our students to explore their connection to Judaism in a meaningful way, we need your help. We need your support to accomplish more than we have in the past. When I sent out one of my first emails, I explained that I saw the huge potential that Iowa Hillel had, how I wanted Iowa Hillel to be the tipping point for Jewish students when they are deciding where they want to spend their next four years and how to best engage those who are currently here that were not as concerned about Jewish life when choosing Iowa. We are just starting to scratch the surface on that potential. I hope you are inspired when you review our Annual Report for what the Jewish future at Iowa could hold, and I ask you to join us in this journey.

Many people across eastern Iowa participated in service projects to pay tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Monday - including students at the University of Iowa Hillel.

Students made lunch for people staying at the Shelter House, and planned ahead making valentines for others at the Iowa City Senior Center.

"We thought because today is MLK Day, we want as a Jewish community, to contribute something back," said Caleb Marx, a student at the University of Iowa and the President of the student board of the Iowa Hillel.

Students did not set a goal for how many meals or letters they wanted to make - they just kept going until they ran out of food, or ran out of time.

"We're trying to do as much as we possibly can because at the end of the day, every person that we contribute to in a positive way just makes us happier," Marx said.

For leaders like Ashley Carol-Fingerhut, the executive director of the lowa Hillel, she said seeing students with this kind of initiative is special. "It's a really good feeling to know that this is something that they care about and that they're starting to live those values that we want to instill," Carol-Fingerhut said.

As Marx drove to the Shelter House with a trunk full of meals, Carol-Fingerhut and other students stayed to make a few more valentines- but they said it was not for the recognition or a specific goal they were looking to reach. Marx said they just want people to know they are loved.

"I don't know if they're going to know that this came from lowa Hillel, and that's not important," Carol-Fingerhut said. "But that they know that there are people out there who understand that they're a part of our community and we care about them."

Making sandwiches and cards, while making memories for themselves and others.

"I can just only imagine that someone at the Shelter House eating the great sandwiches and the great foods that we're making for them." Marx said.

# IOWA HILLEL HOSTS SERVICE IN HONOR OF INTERNATIONAL HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY

Students in the Iowa Hillel campus organization at the University of Iowa will host their own service in remembrance of the Holocaust on Monday night.

Monday night's service comes on the 75th anniversary of the liberation of the Nazis' Auschwitz concentration camp.

Leaders with the Hillel said this day is so important because it is an opportunity to teach students a lesson in remembering the millions who were killed.

"You say, 'May their memory be a blessing."
Ashley Carol-Fingerhut, the Executive Director for the Iowa Hillel, said. "And we obviously can't change the fact that all these people died. There were six million Jews and many other millions of people who perished for being different. But what we can do is make sure that their death wasn't in vain."

Carol-Fingerhut explained how a day like Monday's service also serves to inspire students to stand up for what they believe in.

"The big thing that you learn growing up is the word 'זכור' which means remember," Carol-Fingerhut said. "And it's important to remember what's happened in our past.

Because if we don't remember, we're doomed to repeat the same mistakes."

Carol-Fingerhut explained the remembrance is different from the Jewish holiday Yom HaShoah, a Holocaust remembrance day in the Jewish religion that typically falls in April but can vary based on the Hebrew calendar.

Students also explored Israel through cuisine this summer when we adapted our operations to virtual and offered an Israeli Cooking Club. A cohort of students joined a weekly cooking lesson led by Iowa Hillel Operations and Kitchen Manager, Jaime Holt. They made dishes from the Jerusalem cookbook, enabling them to make more delicious dishes for years to come. Lilly Sherman '22 said of the experience, "I really enjoyed the Israeli cooking club, not only because it gave me a platform to meet new people in the Hillel community and become more comfortable in the kitchen! The people that I met have become good friends of mine and we still cook together for fun!"

We're looking forward to offering Jewish Learning Fellowship 2.0: Big Israel Questions in Spring 2021 to help our students explore their connection to Israel through a weekly class with their peers.

The couple met on a streetcar on the way to Hebrew school, attended the University of Iowa together, and were married for 69 years. 

AND CELEBRATING THE JEWISH HOLIDAYS






