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

# QUALITIES WE LOOK FOR IN A VOLUNTEER:

- Desire to tune into God's heart for the vulnerable
- Willingness to be personally changed & impacted by His grace in the process of joining His renewing work in the community
- Eagerness to build relationships across the lines of culture, race, religion, background and socioeconomic status
- Ambition to join a broader community of volunteers—supporting and inspiring one another while serving together

# WHAT WE PROVIDE TO OUR VOLUNTEERS:

- a. A basic orientation is conducted for new volunteers, in preparation for joining any of our serving initiatives.
- b. Training is held at least once per year for all volunteers to learn skills relevant to real-life serving experiences.
- c. Community-building opportunities are facilitated amongst volunteers involved in similar activities.
- d. Personal check-ins are made to help ensure each volunteer is supported and able to link their serving experiences back to their personal faith development.



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




IJM is a global organisation that protects people in poverty from violence. They partner with local authorities to combat slavery, violence against women and children and police abuse of power against people who are poor. IJM works to rescue and restore victims, hold perpetrators accountable, and help strengthen public justice systems.

Through IJM's Partner with a Field Office programme, RHC has provided financial support and prayed specifically over field work in Asia for many years. Our partnership has helped combat sex trafficking in South Asia as well as the online sexual exploitation of children in the Philippines.

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2020 is the seventh year since ReadAble— Literacy for Life first began serving in the Jalan Kukoh neighbourhood. It has been a true joy to watch the kids we once taught to sound out the alphabet, grow into critical thinkers who confidently share their opinions. In many ways, we have grown up together. They have challenged my assumptions as a woman with privilege, by boldly sharing their own realities.

We have watched our oldest class, the ReadAble Champions, come alive to the social divides in this country. This week, I ran a writing exercise on how our living environments shape our identities. This happens in two ways—our own lived experience of the space we dwell in, and the stereotypes that outsiders project on our neighbourhoods.

All of the words in the mind map are from our children aged 11-14. The words in blue represent what they have heard outsiders say about Jalan Kukoh. There was a sense of invisibility—"no one in my school knows it exists", isolation—"no one comes up this narrow road on a hill" and downright disparaging stereotypes that punch right at the gut—"bad, terrible, horrible people who take drugs and are always drunk" said a 14-year-old girl in a single breath.

I know nothing of the pain the children carry from internalising these words. I can only bear witness and hope to give them the writing skills they need to speak against these injustices. I told them, Jalan Kukoh also means "Walk Strong" in Malay and we began to populate the mind map with words in purple that represented the children's own experiences of living in this estate. These ranged from the uplifting —"diligent students"; "beautiful river"; "good people with many good stories to tell" to much more sobering perceptions of inequality—"They have money but we don't"; "The Police don't care about us as much as the richer estates like Punggol". We also underlined in purple the impressions from outsiders that the children agreed with.

After the mind mapping exercise, the kids sat down to write their first drafts of essays titled "How living in Jalan Kukoh has shaped me". I encouraged them to reclaim the negative stereotypes that outsiders have projected on their estate, how was their experience living here different? A boy raised his hand and asked me, "Is it ok if I only have negative things to say?"

Later this teen boy showed me his piece, it began starkly: "If my mom didn't choose to live here, I think I will be a better person than I am now. Jalan Kukoh has many bad influences, for example, when my friends start smoking, it makes me feel like joining them. Many of my friends have started smoking for years and it makes me feel left out." He continued, "I have learnt a lot of bad things from my neighbourhood: swearing, getting into a relationship, feeling like smoking, harming myself. This place gets the new generation involved with bad influences."



I was so glad to have my friend, the experienced arts educator with me. She pulled the boy aside after class, and spoke to him tenderly in Malay, his heart language. "Have you started smoking?" she asked. He shook his head—he hadn't, even in the face of enormous peer pressure. "Kukoh doesn't just mean strong. It's an inner strength; it means to persevere. Your story is Kukoh and you are still writing that story."

I am thinking of the stories each of these precious children are writing. I am thinking of how we can help them write hope into each story. Seven years of serving here and the answers still slip away from me. I sift through these stories, and find them heavy with complexity, a balance of pride and rejection—"This neighbourhood is dirty but it's so easy to make friends here." "I would not let other people come to this place, but I stay here." wrote another child.

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At the end of class, I asked a 13-year-old girl to stand up to read her piece. She read tentatively at first, then stridently—"My neighbourhood is like a hide out—no one knows about this place, except those who live here. Outsiders might think of this place as dirty and quite full of nonsense. But it does not mean we are not the same, we are still humans...I would be a different person if I did not live here, because my friends are the people who have made me who I am today and I thank them with all my heart."

This girl helped me to grasp a thread of hope— Community, the people who form our hearts. Beneath the disparaging stereotypes is a community with deep bonds that defiantly writes its own story. The story isn't done yet. The story is Kukoh. All we can do is make our ReadAble classroom a safe place for these children to write their own stories. All we can do is to persevere in community, in giving our love. Hope then, I believe, will find its own quiet way in.



#### OUR MINISTRY STRATEGY

#### **OUR VALUES**

How do we go about 'being present with Christ's love'?

### 1. We are remade by the gospel

We will never be content with the state of society alone (we are called to get involved).

Our mercy & justice efforts stem from a deep understanding of the gospel of grace and our own spiritual poverty. This leads us to perpetually seek renewal and shalom in our city. We serve because we see our own wellbeing as inextricably linked to that of greater society—including those on the bottom rungs—and we are called to give deeply of ourselves for others, as Jesus did on the cross for us.

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2. We do mercy and justice as a team effort We should never work alone as we seek to renew our community.

We believe every person plays a role in seeking renewal and shalom, although it is a fluid arrangement with varying skills and capacities being offered in different seasons. As a collective, we reflect the multi-coloured wisdom of God and aim to leave no one person or segment with less. Doing mercy and justice is an intimate aspect of what it means to live as God's children on earth and as a body of believers.

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# 3. We focus on being present and building enduring relationships

Our neighbours should never feel alone in their need.

We have learned that time is a commodity of the highest value. This is why our ministry has developed a special emphasis on building relationships and journeying with our neighbours through the ups and downs of life. We know we will not be able to fix every problem of those in need (although we are surely active in helping where we can). But we do promise to be present - modeling God's own heart to be with us and move towards brokenness rather than away from it.

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## 4. We engage the multifaceted needs of our neighbours

Renewing our community means addressing more than just one need alone.

Although we have delineated initiatives and volunteer roles, we often identify needs on the ground which require organic responses. We do not wish to position ourselves as those who will only consider helping when a need fits squarely into a certain mandate. While we recognise our limitations and may refer and defer to those with expertise, we do not hand off. Instead, we consider the poor (Psalm 41) by "giving careful thought to this person's situation, rather than perfunctory help"<sup>2</sup>

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## 5. We aim to infuse the hope of the gospel into all that we do

We are not concerned with renewing the physical world alone (but also the spiritual!)

In addition to being motivated by the gospel to serve, we also pray and long for appropriate opportunities to share the reason for the hope that we have. Even so, our efforts reflect God's mercy which is given freely. On another level, we recognise that God wants to renew our own hearts through these efforts, pressing in gospel truths. We remember that he is more than capable of renewing our community on his own, and yet chooses to partner with us in this pursuit for the sake of our transformation & fellowship.
