These community archives often evolve without clear collecting guidelines or an acquisition policy, and many groups don't even have the ability to provide public access to their collections. Speakers Scott McKinnon and Christine Yeats will discuss the challenges and responsibilities of historians in collecting and maintaining community archives.

Histories of the Spanish Flu in Australia - History Council NSW

1-5 June 2020, 7pm

The 'Spanish flu' arrived in Australia in 1918. About a third of all Australians were infected and nearly 15,000 people died from it. In a series of talks across the first week of June historians will explore five different aspects of Australia's Spanish flu pandemic.

What were the effects on the Australian community during the Spanish Flu? How did it spread and how did people cope with what was the most deadly virus of their time? What is the evidence left behind that informs histories of the Spanish Flu in Australia?
