WCMEW Presentation to UW-ICEP

WCMEW is a member of the Advisory Council to the University of Wisconsin Interprofessional Continuing Education Partnership (UW-ICEP). At the UW-ICEP Spring 2021 meeting, WCMEW Executive Director George Quinn presented a status report on WCMEW's 2021 Workforce Project, which forecasts several significant increases in demand for healthcare workers. Next steps in the project include forecasting the supply of workers, examining potential changes in healthcare delivery, and arriving at findings and recommendations.

Presentation to North Central Wisconsin AHEC

WCMEW provided an overview of healthcare workforce issues to participants in this year's Virtual Wisconsin Express Program.

As described by Wisconsin AHEC, Wisconsin Express is a "multi-day cultural immersion experience designed to give health professions students an opportunity to study firsthand the diverse local and regional healthcare innovations and challenges in Wisconsin communities. Multidisciplinary groups of 6 to 12 students explore the region's cultural diversity and healthcare, developing strategies for intercultural and interprofessional effectiveness in healthcare practice. Participants have opportunities to reflect on and evaluate their experiences."

George Quinn gave a summary of WCMEW's history and mission, and an outline of workforce development issues and challenges in Wisconsin.

Heroes for Healthcare

Heroes for Healthcare, a nonprofit located in West Allis, provides services and support to help transitioning service members with military healthcare backgrounds to meet the requirements for civilian jobs in healthcare. Heroes for Healthcare firmly believes the training, skills and experience medics, corpsmen and medical technicians acquire in the military should be used to address the workforce shortage in Wisconsin.

Heroes, in collaboration with the Department of Veterans Affairs, is developing a program based on a model implemented in the Commonwealth of Virginia that would enable medics, corpsmen and medical technicians to transition to civilian jobs, while they work and earn their credential. Heroes is working with 35 volunteers from across the State to develop a similar program for Wisconsin. The program offers three career pathways for transitioning service members and veterans to find their career in civilian healthcare.
