### Wisconsin Collaborative for Rural GME (WCRGME)

WCRGME held it's bimonthly meeting on September 15th. A large group gathered to learn more about Primary Care Programs offered by the Department of Health Services. Jaime Olson (DHS Division of Public Health) provided an update on the National Health Service Corps, Substance Abuse Disorder Grants, J-1 Visa Waivers, and other recruitment incentives designed to keep providers in Wisconsin.

Lisa Dodson, MD, also shared an update on the 2022 WiNC/WCRGME GME Leadership Academy which will start in January 2022 offering training to new residency faculty to better prepare them for their roles as core faculty, associate program director, or program director.

Several Wisconsin programs and WCRMGE will be partnering with the Rural Residency Program Development (RRPD) Technical Assistance Center. Ryan Spencer, MD, from the UW OB/Gyn Residency Program will be serving as director of the central hub and Lou Sanner, MD, will be serving as lead advisor. A team will be supporting programs in development through advising and technical assistance.

WCRGME sites shared updates which included a potential new program in Anesthesiology at Marshfield Clinic as well as expansion of the Emergency Medicine Fellowships at both Marshfield Clinic (1 additional position) and Monroe Clinic (1 additional position).
