- A report on workforce strategic planning activities. The Task Force has been involved in identifying action steps based on the goals previously identified. WORKFORCE STRATEGIC PLANNING ACTIVITIES

WCMEW's Task Force on workforce strategic planning held its third meeting on August 22. The group discussed strategies regarding:

- Creating Awareness and Engaging Other Stakeholders the group considered what other groups to reach out to, and how to increase awareness of the impending workforce crisis.
- Promoting Healthcare Careers and Recruiting Healthcare Professionals it was suggested





















- that a first step could be to gather more information about what organizations are doing to promote careers, and be more specific about actively pursuing diverse backgrounds.
- Strengthening Our Education and Training Pipeline –convening stakeholders should be the first priority.
- Retaining Workers make enhancing work environments a year 1 priority.

- WAFP hosted a student and resident leadership summit on August 22, 2022 at the Renaissance Milwaukee West Hotel. The event was made possible through a grant from the American Board of Family Medicine.
- Medical schools, residency programs and others participated in the American Academy of Family Physician National Conference for Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students at the end of July. WAFP provided funding for 32 students to attend. WAFP also sponsored a reception for all residency programs, residents, and students in attendance.
- WAFP is beginning the new residency year by once again attending each program and providing an information session on Family Medicine in WI.
- WAFP is working with each medical schools to ramp up student engagement with WAFP and promote attending residency training in WI and practicing in WI.
