## WRPRAP Provides New Grants to Support Emergency Medicine and Hospitalist Fellowships – UW Department of Family Medicine

The Wisconsin Rural Physician Residency Assistance Program (WRPRAP) provided new grants to support development of an emergency medicine fellowship in Ashland and a hospitalist fellowship within Aspirus Health as well as continuing grants for the Medical College of Wisconsin Psychiatry residency program in Wausau and the UW Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology rural residency track.

# <u>Dane County budget includes over \$600,000 to support medical workforce</u> – **Fitchburg Star**

The 2023 Dane County budget, which was signed into law by County Executive Joe Parisi two weeks ago, includes more than \$600,000 in funding for a groundbreaking trauma recovery program to support the medical workforce.
