STRATEGIC PLAN WORK GROUP ACTIVITY

WCMEW started out at what will be a very active 2023 with five work groups convening their first meetings. Over 50 WCMEW partners, representing health systems, schools, colleges, and programs, and state agencies are represented on the groups. Below are descriptions of the groups:

- Promoting Healthcare Careers and Recruiting Professionals
 - This group will focus on the "front end" of the education and training pathway. Its initial work will include creating an inventory of active programs and their effectiveness. Next, the group will disseminate best practices.
- Strengthening Our Physician Education and Training Pathways
 - Two groups were created: one that will evaluate education and training pathways for physicians and another for nursing. Each group will identify shortages in capacity, determine root causes, and recommend solutions and action plans.
- Retaining Professionals
 - This group will focus on retention of healthcare professionals. Its activities will include research causes of workforce dissatisfaction and current efforts to reduce; and identifying and disseminating best practices.
- Redesigning Care Delivery
 - This group was created in recognition of the likelihood that, despite our best efforts in accomplishing the above, the shortage will still be significant. The group is charged with assessing current models of care and recommending improvements; and creating and disseminating an action plan.

Starting with the new incoming class in July, the Program will increase from 4 residents to 6 residents per year. WiNC congratulates Dr Manal Soliman, Program Director and the MCW-Prevea Faculty and Residents for their work resulting in a successful ACGME site visit last year and now having the opportunity to expand.
- WiNC is also pleased to have two case studies in the current Wisconsin Medical Journal. The series runs monthly January through June and highlighted by a one-day in person Workshop in March. Topics being covered include; the value of GME, Academic Leadership, transition from physician to rural program director, and advancing critical reasoning skills along with monthly sessions around the clinical learning environment, curriculum development, evaluation & assessment, and remediation. Gov. Evers, DHS Awards \$1 million in Grants to Help Reduce Disparities in Behavioral Health Care System – WI DHS

Gov. Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) have awarded \$1 million in grants to increase access to mental health and substance use care for underserved communities. Ten organizations will each receive \$100,000 to develop projects that build on the ability of behavioral health professionals to support people with diverse values and beliefs.
