WCMEW QUARTERLY COUNCIL MEETING

The WCMEW Council convened its quarterly meeting on August 15. The main discussion items included:

- A report on workforce strategic planning activities. The five work groups have each created recommendations and strategies to address their section of the overall workforce strategy.
- The 2023 Summit is being finalized. The day's agenda includes an opening session where the strategic planning work groups will share their results, followed by a Q&A. The remainder of the day includes 10 separate presentations on workforce trends, education and training programs, challenges, and success stories.

WCMEW DATA COLLABORATIVE

The WCMEW Data Collaborative held its bi-monthly meeting on July 24th. The main topic was a report on results from 2022 RN Survey presented by Susan Zahner, Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs, Wisconsin-Madison School of Nursing. Highlights include:

- The number of RNs who renewed their licenses in Wisconsin in 2022 (97,100) was an increase of 5,658 (6.2%) over 2020.
- Approximately 71% of RNs licensed in Wisconsin were educated in Wisconsin.
- Just over half (50.9%) of RNs hold a bachelor's degree in nursing as their highest nursing degree, with 30.9% having an associate degree as their highest nursing degree.
- Overall, 87.9% of respondents reported being employed, 84.0% were employed as a nurse, and 8.2% were retired.
