

### DHS ANNOUNCES APC AND AHP GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

The Department of Health Services has made the following announcements:

# "Advanced Practice Clinician Grant (APC)

The Wisconsin legislature has <u>authorized the APC program</u> to create and support clinical training opportunities for Physician Assistants (PAs) and Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs). APRNs include nurse practitioners, certified nurse-midwifes, clinical nurse specialists, and certified registered nurse anesthetists. The goal of the grant is to expand the use of PAs and APRNs to increase access to health care. There will be a 3-year period of performance for the \$500,000 annual funds allocated.

Preference is given to programs serving rural areas of the state, however programs serving urban and suburban areas are also welcome to apply.

- Applications are due by 11:59 p.m. central time April 5, 2024.
- Applications submitted after this date and time will not be reviewed.

## Allied Health Professional Education and Training Grant (AHP)

The Wisconsin legislature has <u>authorized the Department of Health Services</u> (DHS) to distribute grants to health care consortia to establish education and training programs for allied health professionals. Up to \$3 million in 2024–2025 is allocated to support partnerships of hospitals, health systems, and educational providers to increase the availability of quality education and training opportunities for critical allied health positions. This will be a one-year period of performance. Preference is given to partnerships serving rural areas of the state, however partnerships serving urban and suburban areas are also welcome to apply.

- Applications are due by 11:59 p.m. central time April 5, 2024.
- Applications submitted after this date and time will not be reviewed.
