

Two Worcester Homes In Maryland Garden Tour

KNOW HILL — Two of the Worcester County homes to be featured in the Maryland Garden Tour will be the two homes in the Worcester County Garden Tour.

The homes are among several historic places, churches and a rose garden to be open to the public. "Worship on the Delaware Trail" is the picturesque name given to the gracious old home well preserved and restored by Mr. and Mrs. Quill. This home lies on the southern corporate

line of Berlin. Within a circle of trees in front of the home stands a stately old English elm (perpetrated by its owners to be the second oldest living elm in Worcester County).

FROM HISTORICAL information available it was learned that Elizabeth Parrell built this home around 1825. It is said that when Mr. Parrell returned from a trip to Washington he brought with him a sketch of a picture window which he incorporated in the plan for the home and which now enhances its beauty.

BEYOND the living room was the original kitchen which now serves as the dining room. Some years ago the fireplace in this room was sealed over and years later, when Mr. Quill was restoring the home he found behind the false front, pots and pans hanging from their original hooks and arms.

Golden Quarter Farm, the center of Franklin Parrell, is located three miles east of Berlin. Legend has it that the name was derived from the vast swarms of coveys that bloom and fill the nearby fields every spring.

The spacious living room directly ahead has an owner of attractive a massive chimney and fireplace in which there are five separate fires, which at one time must have served the early occupants as a fine source of winter heat.

This tree is known as the Aron Elm and its girls and lady coves of ring around the tree - story from England by a member of the family. The English elm tree in the garden branches make it a landmark of the Revolution.

Baby Oyster Transplant Begins

ANNAPOLIS (AP)—The Department of Tidewater Fisheries began transplanting seed oysters Monday at two of the state's main seed-growing areas on the Eastern Shore.

Department director Joseph H. Manning said 20 boats worked in Holland Straits off Somerset County and 20 in The Bay off Dorchester County, to begin operations which probably will continue for a month.

A total of 60,000 to 80,000 bushels of baby oysters will be transplanted to public bays.

The spot count on the shells being transplanted averaged in excess of 50 baby oysters to the bushel and ranged as high as 1,000 per bushel. The seed was from the 1959 and 1961 spawning seasons.

Manning said that with good growing conditions it should result in at least 700,000 more bushels by the time the oysters are of market size in the 1964 season.

He said the seed is about twice as much as the state transplanted last year in an intensified oyster cultivation program which is just beginning to show substantial results.
